Board Approves New Structure for Budget Transparency

At its September meeting, the Board of Trustees approved transitioning the Board Budget Advisory Committee (BAC) into the Superintendent's Budget Advisory Committee (SBAC).

This shift creates a more streamlined process for open conversations and information sharing. Because district staff bring budget recommendations to the Board, the SBAC will serve as a forum for expanded input before recommendations are formally presented.

All current Budget Advisory Committee members will be invited to serve as founding members, with additional parent, staff, and community representatives appointed for balanced participation. Meetings will follow the district's budget calendar and remain open to the public. SBAC input will directly inform the Superintendent's recommendations to the Board.


Talent Strategy – Recruitment, Retention, and Respect: Attract and retain excellent staff through investment in growth and maintaining a positive workplace.




The Annual Campaign supports both teacher innovation and systematic excellence—sustaining the programs that make our schools exceptional.

A Day in the Life of a Superintendent

We won the chance to be "Superintendents for the Day"—an opportunity to step into the superintendent's job and see how our whole district runs. We visited schools, attended real meetings, and met with Board members, police, and firefighters to learn how major decisions are made.

We got this chance because it was an auction item at the Rodeo last spring. That means our day also helped the Las Lomitas Education Foundation, which supports STEM, arts, libraries, languages, mental health, and great teaching and learning.

And here's what we learned:

Joshua, an 8th grader, shared, "I learned that being a superintendent is harder than it seems. The job of a superintendent is to run multiple schools with the help of the school board. Some things that are fun are that you get to meet with the firefighters and police to make sure the district is safe and running well. But in the end, being a superintendent is a wonderful job."





Jeremy, a 6th grader, explained, "As the superintendent, I learned I'm the only employee of the school board, and the Board chooses another board member for the council if one leaves. They must also be chosen by the majority to be appointed to the board and become a member. As all the teachers are my employees, it is like an hourglass."

Jonathan, a 4th grader, added, "At the fire station, I learned that they visit schools to ensure that all the school's fire alarms and fire extinguishers are in working order. I also learned that they each have their own dorms and have a very big gym. Also, being a superintendent is hard work."

After a full day, we left with a new respect for everyone who helps our schools. Being a superintendent is tough—but it matters, and we're glad we had the opportunity to try it.
