Most CSU campuses have local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region. 2025-26 School Description and Mission Statement

Douglas City School District is a single-school district located in Trinity County, California, serving approximately 155 students in grades Transitional Kindergarten through grade eight. The District encompasses approximately 125 square miles of mountainous terrain characterized by scattered residences, no local industry, and a limited number of small businesses.

Douglas City Elementary School is staffed by a Superintendent/Principal; two administrative secretaries; a business manager; nine full-time certificated classroom teachers; a special education teacher; a part-time intervention teacher; a part-time physical education teacher; and instructional aides for Spanish, music, art, and technology. Additional support staff include ten classroom aides, two special education aides, two bus/van drivers, two part-time custodians, a maintenance/transportation

supervisor, a cook, and a cook's assistant. The After School Program is staffed by a site coordinator and five instructional assistants.

The administrative team works collaboratively with the Governing Board, staff, and parents to ensure a positive and supportive school environment. Parents are actively involved through participation in the Parent Advisory Committee and Booster Club and regularly volunteer to support school activities and programs.

Douglas City School District is committed to excellence and high levels of student achievement. The District's goal is for all students to meet or exceed state academic performance standards. Its vision is to develop lifelong learners equipped with the knowledge and skills necessary to participate fully as productive citizens in the twenty-first century. The District strives to provide a safe, clean, drug-free, nurturing, and technologically current learning environment in which every student is valued and supported to succeed. The District is committed to implementing high-quality, research-based instructional programs that promote student learning, achievement, and self-worth.

Student discipline is primarily managed by classroom teachers or instructional aides in accordance with District policies and is referred to the Principal when necessary. Parents are kept informed of student behavior concerns, and their collaboration is sought in developing and implementing strategies to support positive behavior changes. The school counselor and wellness liaison provide services to whole classes, small groups, and individual students to support the development of personal, social, and behavioral skills.

Douglas City Elementary School is committed to maintaining a safe, orderly, and respectful learning environment. At the beginning of each school year, students and parents receive a handbook outlining school programs, rules, and behavioral expectations. Staff members utilize a team-based approach to instruction and discipline, ensuring that all students are supported by all staff members regardless of classroom assignment. High expectations for success are held for every student. Strong home-to-school communication is maintained through written correspondence, phone calls, email, messaging applications, conferences, and newsletters.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Douglas City Elementary School facilities are modern, well-lit, well-ventilated, well-equipped, and fully compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The majority of the school buildings were constructed within the past 25 years. The campus includes eleven classrooms, a multipurpose room with kitchen, an office and staff preparation area, a large storage facility, and a bus garage.

The playground is spacious and features basketball courts, tetherball courts, pickleball courts, and volleyball courts. A well-maintained track surrounds a large grass field used for soccer, football, and softball. A six-foot cyclone fence encloses the entire playground area.

School facilities and playgrounds are inspected monthly to ensure a safe and secure environment for students. In addition, a representative from the North California Schools Insurance Group conducts a comprehensive inspection of the District every two years to identify and address any potential safety concerns. The District employs two part-time custodians, providing a combined total of nine hours of custodial service per day, as well as a part-time maintenance supervisor.

The District maintains an active Safety Committee composed of the administrator, teachers, classified employees, and parents. The Safety Committee meets approximately five times per year and establishes annual goals related to both the physical and social-emotional safety of the school environment. Additionally, the Superintendent participates monthly in a countywide Safe Schools Collaborative that includes county office personnel, school staff, county agencies, and law enforcement.

Douglas City School is committed to providing a safe, clean, drug-free, nurturing, and technologically current learning environment in which every student is valued and supported to achieve success. The school provides individual Chromebooks for all students in grades TK–8 and offers an After School Program that operates daily until 5:30 p.m.

New playground equipment was installed in the summer of 2010.

The roof over the kitchen portion of the multi-purpose room building was replaced in 2011 along with the installation of a new heating/air conditioning system for the cafeteria/gym. The roof over the shed and the office were replaced in 2016.

Carpeting was replaced in room 2 and room 12 in summer of 2016 and in rooms 1, 9 and Special Education in summer of 2017. Room 4 and the computer lab had carpet replaced summer of 2018. Office carpet was replaced summer of 2019.

Administrative office and playground side of buildings were painted in summer of 2016. Rooms 5 and 6 were painted in summer of 2017 as well as backsides of the playground classrooms. The gym was painted summer of 2018.

New gravel was added to the playground summer of 2016.

The playground blacktop was resurfaced summer of 2017 and the parking lot was resurfaced summer of 2018.

New heat pumps were installed in rooms 8, 9 and the office in spring 2017. Rooms 1-4 and 6 & 7 had new heat pumps installed in summer 2018.

The linoleum in the gym bathrooms was replaced in summer of 2017.

The roof over rooms 1-4, special education room and outside bathrooms was replaced summer of 2020. Gutters on that wing were replaced where needed.

New windows were installed in rooms 8-10 and the office in 2016. In 2021, new windows were installed in rooms 1-4, 5-7, special education and the outside bathrooms.

Safety film on all windows was installed winter of 2021.

The track was leveled and resurfaced with decomposed granite summer 2022.

3 new water filling stations were installed summer 2022.

The bus barn roof was replaced in 2023.

The flooring in the gym bathroom and cafeteria kitchen was replaced in 2024.

The playground, quad, and parking lot were all newly sealed in summer 2024.

The large shade structure was put up on the playground summer 2024.

Picnic tables were purchased for seating outside every classroom in fall 2024.

New HVAC was installed in rooms 1-4 and the kitchen in summer/fall 2025.

A new warming oven, double ovens, stove, serving counter and steam tables were installed in the cafeteria kitchen July 2025.

All classrooms received new chairs and desks in August 2025.

Additional outdoor lighting was installed December 2025.
