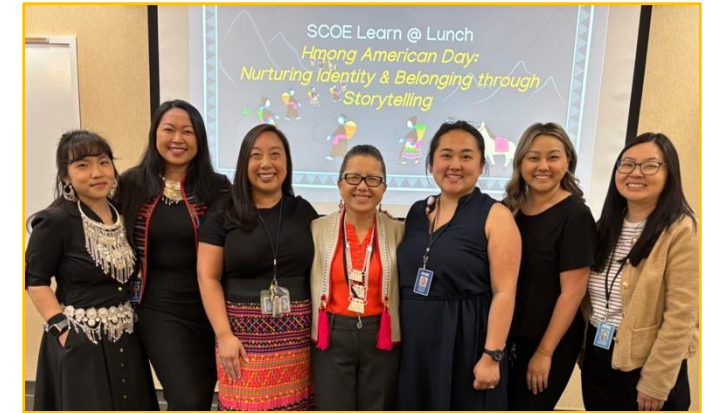

# Inclusivity and Belonging Within SCOE

- Provided cross-departmental support and collaboration including:
  - Facilitating learning sessions
  - Participation in work groups
  - Engaging in thought-partnership/consulting
- Communicated resources, updates, and learning opportunities through the monthly DEI newsletter
- Facilitated sessions on Inclusivity and Belonging at the monthly New Employee Orientation
- Launched the second cohort of the SCOE Equity Leaders Fellowship Program in partnership with the National Equity Project (NEP)
- Offered Employee Affinity Group spaces, such as the Black, Indigenous, People of Color Affinity Group
- Learn at Lunch sessions held monthly to offer SCOE staff a fun and engaging way to dive into conversations around diversity, equity, and inclusion





# Inclusivity and Belonging Within SCOE, Part 2

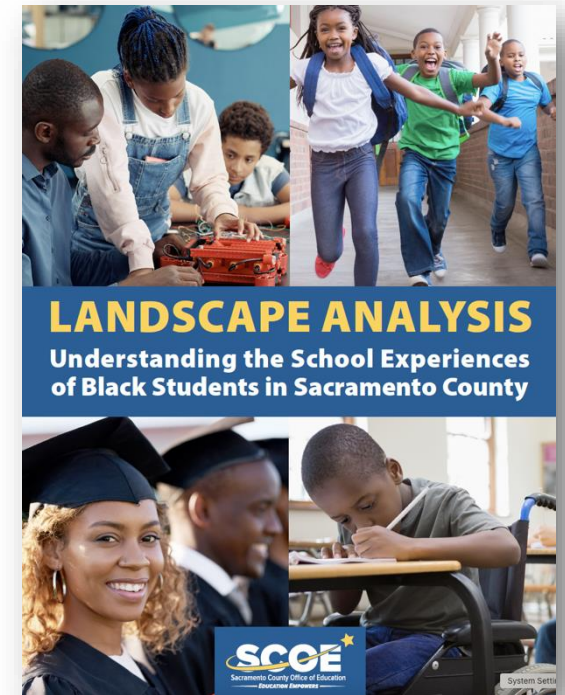
- Provided monthly opportunities for SCOE staff to grow their equity lens by reading books centering diverse identities and lived experiences through the Growth Track Book Club
- Coordinated 2 full-day learning sessions by the National Equity Project on Coaching and Managing Towards Equity and Designing Effective Meetings
- Launched a 2-Part Inclusion Academy for SCOE Departments on intentionally aligning efforts in supporting students with disabilities. Representation from 14 departments across the organization were present.
- In collaboration with the SEL team, launched a new offering, the SEL and Equity Walk and Talks—engaging, community-building opportunities that encourage connection and discussion around equity and social-emotional learning





# Inclusivity and Belonging Externally

- Facilitated learning sessions at statewide and local conferences
- Offered professional learning sessions through the National Equity Project (NEP)
- Held quarterly Equity Leader Network convenings for equity leaders across the Sacramento County LEAs
- Facilitated professional development workshops for districts upon request
- Continued working on the countywide landscape analysis to better understand the state of Black students in Sacramento
  - Conducted interviews/focus groups with educators, community members, families, and students to identify existing strengths, resources, and needs of black students; held two convenings
  - Published a culminating report and presented it to the County Board of Education on May 20
- In partnership with the Los Angeles County Office of Education, SCOE was awarded the California Center for Inclusive Colleges grant. The CCIC will help expand postsecondary opportunities for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.





# California Includes

- Hosted a 3-Part Inclusion Academy for LEAs, providing 9 Districts, 1 COE, 1 CBO, 3 Charter Schools with Professional Learning and Coaching on strategically planning for inclusivity and belonging for students with disabilities.

# Senior Extension Program

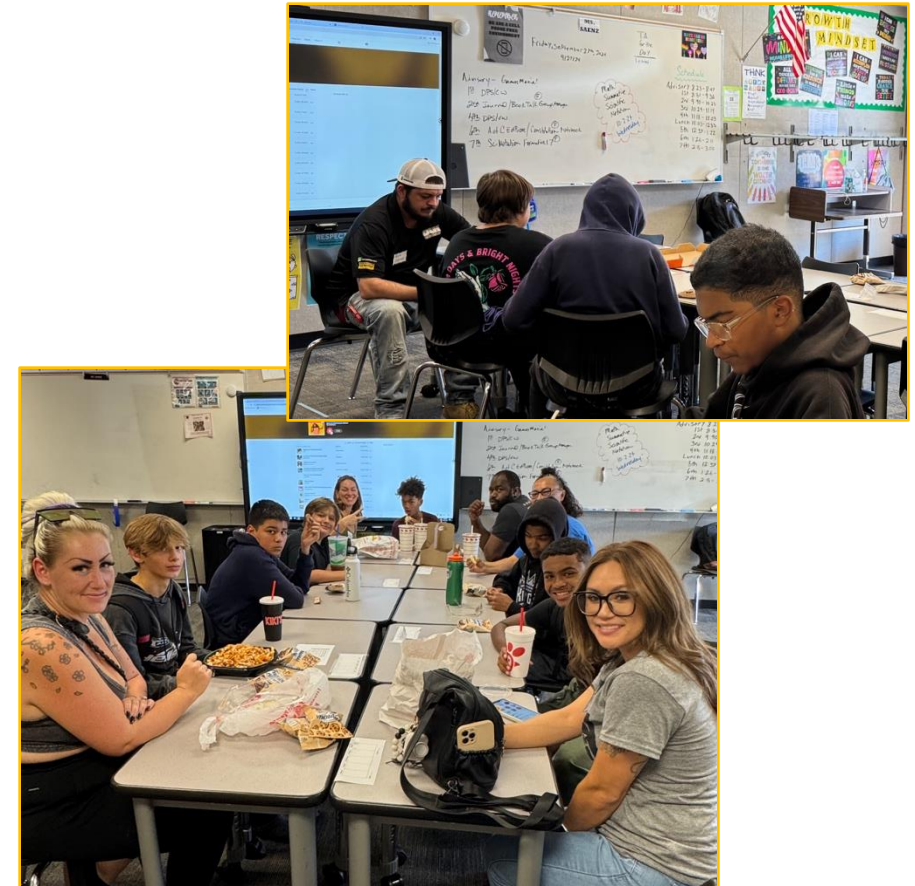
- **Enrollment**—360 students enrolled in Senior Extension

- Students received wrap-around services that included:

  - College Tours
  - Academic Lab Classes
  - Pregnant and Parenting Support
  - Cash for College and FAFSA presentations
  - Monthly meet and greets





# Community Action for Responsive Education (CARE) Program

- 11 Classrooms in five districts
  - Served over 225 students this year
- Maintained Student Benefits
  - Small class sizes – 22 students or fewer
  - Sense of community
  - Streamlined communication with family
  - Study skills/Curriculum support
  - Additional opportunities included 916 Ink, art integration with Milton510, mentoring, and field trips
- Provided students access to wrap-around services to support their academic and personal growth
- Outcomes: Improved attendance, engagement/behavior, and academic achievement





# El Centro and Valley Oak Youth Academy (VOYA)

- Students participated in the SOAR program to earn college credits, and a total of 42 enrolled in college courses; 86 courses were passed this year with C grades or better.
  - 14 high school students were Dually enrolled through LTCC
  - 2 graduates were selected to pilot a summer bridge program at American River College while still in custody
  - 9 students completed the NCCT 400-hour pre-apprenticeship program
- Celebrated 4 AA Degrees with transfer
- 4 students transferred to California State University, Sacramento, through Project Rebound; 1 student transferred to University of California Davis
  - 10 students are attending community college through LRCCD
  - 3 graduates from Re-Ignite Hope Welding program
  - 8 students received Resiliency Scholarships
- Library/Media Teacher selected as SCOE Teacher of the Year 2026





# College and Career Readiness

- Hired Dual Enrollment (DuE) Coordinator to serve SCOE schools as well as regional DuE efforts
- Processing the hire of three counselors to join the teams to serve students at El Centro Jr./Sr. HS, Elinor L. Hickey Jr./Sr. HS, Nathaniel S. Colley Jr./Sr. HS, and Senior Extension programs
- Transitioned student referral process from feeder districts/school to Informed K12 (online process) to automate and streamline the student transfer process from districts
- Continued mentoring in El Centro and added Colley, Hickey, and CARE schools
- Continued to offer Any Given Child and Sacramento Healthy Hearts to regional schools
- Girls at El Centro participated in weekly empowerment sessions with Earth Mama Healing, Ms. T's Empowerment Through Dance
- All El Centro students participated in mentoring through Links Mentoring and Mentor CA
- Hosted over 300 counselors at the third annual SCOE Counselor Spring Institute at California State University, Sacramento, focused on the American School Counselor



# Career Technical Education (CTE)

- Established CTE Professional Learning Community (PLC) and began work to update course outlines, content and embedding of entrepreneurship strand to all courses
- Continued partnership with SAFE Credit Union to host Budget Cents financial literacy simulations with SCOE students
- Obtained a Strong Workforce K12 grant to implement virtual reality modules to give access to career exploration for SCOE students
- Organized field trips for SCOE students to visit Los Rios Community Colleges
- All 13 SCOE CTE staff attended Educating for Careers conference in February to engage in high-quality professional development
- Took delivery of a brand-new food truck and coffee cart to be utilized for SCOE Enterprises Farm-to-Fork work-based learning (WBL) opportunities
- Continued to provide networking Community of Practice and one-on-one meetings for District CTE leaders.



# Youth Voice Initiatives

- SCOE Schools Student Advisory Committees (SAC)
  - Year 3 completed at Elinor L. Hickey and Nathaniel Colley Jr./Sr. High Schools
  - Activities: Team building, project planning and implementation, and regular meetings with administration
  - Focus Areas: Teacher–student relationships and illicit substance abuse among teens
  - Achievements: Campus-wide screenings of *Fentanyl High*, increased availability of harm mitigation resources, and educational field trips
- Youth Fellowship Program (SCOE YFP)
  - Goal: Increase youth engagement in policy development affecting student well-being
  - Support: Training in professionalism, mentoring, and networking
  - Current Status: Five fellows employed with various departments, including first senior fellow
- Sacramento County Superintendent's Student Advisory Council
  - Launch: 15 students selected representing 5 LEAs
  - Purpose: Promote civic awareness, leadership development, and engagement among county youth; develop recommendations for implementation
- Youth Civic Summit
  - SCOE convened a two-day summit with specific educator and student learning pathways
  - Culminated with a student panel discussing policy recommendations





# New Civic Engagement Initiatives

- Civic Engagement
  - SCOE Schools Student Advisory Committee completed Year 3 with ongoing activities focused on harm mitigation and educational field trips
  - Launched Superintendent's Student Advisory Council (15 students, 5 districts)
  - SCOE convened a two-day Youth Civic Summit with specific educator, student learning pathways, and culminating in a panel discussion
- K–8 Civic Education Pathway
  - SCOE adopted age-appropriate criteria for awarding Certificates of Civic Recognition to upper elementary and middle school students
  - SCOE piloted a three-day professional learning series focused on the integration of civic education into existing curriculum for upper elementary teachers
- State Seal of Civic Engagement
  - 602 seals were issued to 11th and 12th grade students in five Sacramento County districts in the 2023–24 school year (2024–25 numbers are reported in November)
  - Community of Practice (CoP) continues to be held every other month for district civic leaders
  - Hosted Youth Civic Summit with student-led policy recommendations





# Youth Voice and Civic Engagement Activities

- WorkAbility team and teachers supported students with:
  - Mock interviews
  - Resumé writing
  - Job applications
  - Additional employment skills
  - Community college tours, ARC which included various departments: Automotive, Electrician, Music Production. Included a tour of the Culinary program and lunch at the ARC Oak Café.
- Students and families participated in **Friday Night Live** events focused on preventing underage drinking and promoting healthy, safe choices
- **Student Council officers** led a campaign for voter pre-registration and registration during Voter Education Week and ran the Presidential Mock Election
- All students took part in the **Budget Cents** program, sponsored by SAFE Credit Union. The program teaches essential financial skills such as budgeting, saving, and setting financial goals.





# Foundations: Programs for Students with Extensive Support Needs

- Provided virtual independent study program to students with individual needs requiring an alternative educational option, identified by their IEP team
- SCOE Admin. Team developed a Professional Development Schedule that included monthly trainings related to the AAC, Lumio, MOVE refresher, Crisis Prevention Intervention (CPI) training, etc., as well as, PLC days for teams to start implementing the PLC process
- Provided site teams weekly/monthly meeting opportunities for team planning, collaboration, and debriefing to support their programs
- Staff participated in a Needs Assessments in the Fall and Spring to identify programming needs, strengths, and areas for growth to provide solution-focused feedback
- Programs participated in community-based instruction to provide students with opportunities to build daily living skills in real-life settings





# Foundations: Mobility Opportunities via Education (MOVE)

- MOVE is a research-based program shown to improve functional mobility skills for those with severe physical disabilities.
- SCOE MOVE International Trainers serve as coaches to support MOVE implementation within our Foundations Academy programs on a monthly basis throughout the year.
- June 2025
  - SCOE will host a basic provider training to support new SCOE staff and collaborating district staff.
- MOVE Model sites continue to include:
  - Prairie Elementary
  - Dry Creek Elementary
  - Markofer Elementary
  - Hillsdale Preschool





# Foundations: Leo A. Palmiter Jr./Sr. High School Emotional/Behavior Supports Program

## ■ CTE Opportunities

- Culinary Arts, Horticulture, and Construction (NCCT) programs
- Culinary students earned ServSafe and Food Handlers Certificates
- NCCT students participated in the Design-Build Competition and were awarded "Best Craftmanship Award"
- Students engaged in career exploration through Virtual Job Shadow

## ■ Leveraged Civic Opportunities

- WorkAbility team and teachers worked with students on mock interviews, resumé writing, job applications, and additional employment skills; community college tours – American River College which included various departments: automotive, electrical, music production, culinary program, and lunch at the ARC Oak Café
- Students and families participated in Friday Night Live events focused on preventing underage drinking and promoting healthy, safe choices
- Student Council officers led a campaign for voter pre-registration and registration during Voter Education Week and ran the Presidential Mock Election

  - Collaborated with the Department of Rehabilitation to support students after high school
- Family & Community Engagement
  - Hosted events including:
    - Back-to-School Night
    - Friday Night Live community events
    - School to World Award Assembly
    - School Site Council
    - High School Orientation
    - 8th Grade Promotion and High School Graduation





# Foundations: Preschool

- Continued partnership and collaboration with SETA Head Start
- Equity and anti-bias work-embedded strategies within the classroom for students and staff
- Implemented California Social Emotional Foundation of Early Learning (CSEFEL) with students to enhance learning and social-emotional well-being
- Implemented new protocols for assessing students to support their transition to kindergarten in collaboration with our districts



# Foundations: Infant Development Program

- Equity and anti-bias work embedded in early intervention practices with children and families
- Services are offered in person
  - Virtual and hybrid options for services offered if families still have concerns about health and safety
- Partnership with WarmLine and MIND Institute to support Infant Development Program
- Part of Quality Child Care Collaborative grant from First 5 to serve childcare providers
- Partner with UC Davis Medical Center and Sutter Health to have medical students and residents join teams to support families
- Staff and parent training in implementing California Social Emotional Foundations of Early Learning (CSEFEL) strategies with families and their children



# Special Education: Seeds of Partnership

- California Department of Education (CDE) Technical Assistance partner to CDE staff, LEAs, Family Centers, Community Partners, and parents throughout California as part of the statewide system of support
- Collaborated/participated in various county and statewide initiatives
- Coordinated technical assistance support to the California Family Empowerment Centers and assisted in the application process to expand the number of centers in California to 33, encompassing all counties
- Provided resources, information, and assistance directly to programs or through the Seeds of Partnership website and newly established Family Empowerment Center website
- Developed and administered collection and reporting of statewide parent survey data as part of the CDE Special Education Compliance and Improvement Monitoring process
- Served as part of the SCOE Family and Community Engagement coordination team





# Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA)

- Provided special education technical assistance and support to seven county school districts (Arcohe, Center, Elverta, Galt Elementary, Galt High School, Robla, and River Delta) and one independent charter school (Natomas Charter), as well as SCOE Special Education Programs
- Provided professional development to 500+ school leaders, staff, parents, and community members, including:
  - Reclassification of Dually Identified Students
  - Least Restrictive Environment and Inclusion
  - IEP Compliance Monitoring
  - Data Quality and Compliance
  - Alternative Pathway to a Diploma





# Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) – Part 2

- Conducted Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) sessions with LEAs and families to align the interests of both parties with the needs of the student.
- SELPA increased staff capacity with ADR strategies through enhanced ADR training and participation in the Strauss Institute's ADR program.
- Using an equity lens, SELPA provided technical assistance to LEAs to align Differentiated Assistance, LCAP, and special education priority areas to create better outcomes for students.
- Certificated and Classified staff retention was a priority for SELPA this year. A newly hired SELPA Coordinator provided support to new and emerging education specialists across our SELPA's nine districts.
- Coaching, training, technical assistance, and resource development were all part of the work of the SELPA Coordinator.



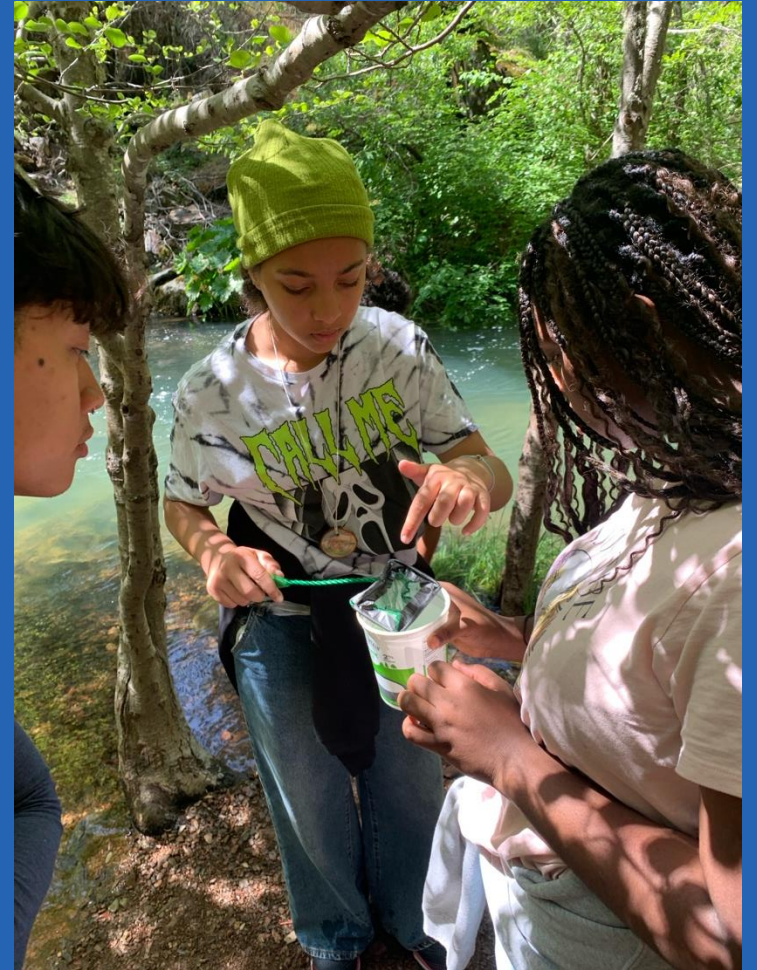
# Reentry Programs

- Highlight Staff Professional Development during 2024–25
  - Risk and Needs Assessment Training
  - Interactive Journaling and Evidence-Based Facilitation training
  - Fidelity Coaching certification for all managers
  - CPR/First Aid Certification
- Program Expansion
  - Executed contract to service in El Dorado.
  - Implemented Atlas virtual curriculum delivery platform to expand SCOE Reentry services to participants residing in remote areas
  - SCOE Reentry was invited to participate in several think tanks and pilot programs centered around improving case management and the user experience in CDCR's ARMS database

# Universal Prekindergarten (UPK)

- UPK Collaborative quarterly meetings invite 66 Sacramento early learning school leaders (districts and charters) together to disseminate State information, provide SCOE updates, collaborate on UPK and UTK implementation, answer questions, and share ideas related to enrollment, workforce, family/community engagement, curriculum and assessment, facilities, and funding. Individual Technical Assistance and support is offered through email, Zoom, and phone calls.
- Developing ECE Spanish-speaking cohort for FCC professionals in collaboration with Chabot College
- Designing a targeted media campaign to highlight “Family Choice” to general public when it comes to building awareness of the various early learning and care (UPK) programs in county
- First Family Playfest event at SMUD’s Safetyville (Rancho Cordova) with 240 family members, 70 community partners, and 15 Early Learning staff
- 51 outreach events this fiscal 2024–25 so far. Expanding social media pages on FB (123 followers), IG (196 followers), LinkedIn (368 followers)
- Facilitated 8-part Book Study Series for *Creating Equitable Environments for Young Boys of Color* and UPK/TK Professional Learning TK Modules and Community of Practice with School of Education 21CSLA program





# Sacramento County READS Literacy Initiative

## Joyful Literacy (PK–Grade 2)

- Comprehensive approach to early literacy including building language as well as integrated social and emotional skills, focuses on literacy environments, higher order thinking skills and foundational literacy skills; supports educators, leaders, expanded learning staff, librarians, and families with evidence-based (science of reading), playful and engaging activities. Resources are open source and downloadable on the Joyful Literacy Padlet.
- We provided 34 sessions (Expanded Learning series of 4 sessions, SJCOE's 2 sessions, 3 Saturday Academies sessions, and 8 CoPs (counted as one session and participants are only counted once).

# Sacramento County READS Literacy Initiative – Part 2

## **Joyful Literacy, *continued***

- Presentations including major conferences such as the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) annual conference, National Head Start Family Engagement Conference, the California Association for the National Education of Young Children (CAAEYC), The 26th International Fathers and Families conference, and the California Association for Bilingual Education (CABE) conference.

## **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library – Soft Launch**

- A partnership between SCOE, United Way Capital Region, and key community partners will launch Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Sacramento County this year. The program gives each child from birth to age five a specially selected book each month. SCOE will focus on under-resourced communities in the county and supplement the program with a family newsletter, books in multiple languages, and events to help parents use storybooks with their children using Joyful Literacy strategies.





# Preschool Coaching and Mentoring Support: Quality Improvement Efforts

- Includes professional learning, technical assistance, monetary incentives (Quality Improvement, Quality Improvement Plus, Early Learning PBM, and Quality Rating and Improvement System) supporting programs who serve children birth to 5 and their families
- Detailed numbers:
  - 20 early learning site leaders engaged in leadership development
  - 291 early learning and care programs engaged in quality-building work that includes professional learning, coaching, mentoring, and technical assistance
  - 180 educators responsible for the care and education of over 15,000 infants, toddlers, and preschoolers engaged in hybrid Coaching Companion platform focused on teacher: child interactions, supporting children's social-emotional development, Teaching Pyramid/Pyramid Model, and inclusion
- Distributed \$1,079,957 in block grants and incentives as part of the quality improvement system
- Professional Learning: 800 participants



# Workforce Support

- Early Education Teacher Development (EETD) grant program (CDE) through Sacramento Empowering Early Educators (SacE3) supported the early childhood workforce in Sacramento County, increasing the number and skills of preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Kindergarten teachers.
- Financial support through stipends:
  - CSUS – 16 educators to earn a Bachelor's degree in Child and Adolescence Development; they will graduate in Spring 2026.
  - Los Rios Community College – 115 aspiring TK teachers, state preschool teachers, and child care providers have received stipends for coursework.
  - SCOE Internship and residency programs – 30 aspiring TK teachers
  - distribute \$550,000 in professional growth stipends to 700 early learning educators
  - Reimbursed the cost of initial family child care license fees for 50+ new providers
  - Provided first free fingerprinting service to 40 early learning educators to take next step in profession, including apply for family child care license, secure an early childhood job in home or centers, apply for Child Development Permit



# Professional Development Support

- *Early Learning at the Heart of It All Conference April 2025* served 250 early learning and care educators
- Professional Growth Advisors (PGA): trained 26 PGAs and advised over 500 participants/advisees





# California Preschool Instructional Network (CPIN)

- Led 11 regions in providing over 600 professional learning sessions statewide
- Served over 14,000 educators throughout the state
- Sacramento Region 3 provided 37 professional learning sessions across the ten-county Capital Service Region and statewide, representing over 90 hours of training for 1,097 early care and education professionals



# Increasing Access to Healthy Development

## HELP ME GROW (HMG)



- Help Me Grow Sacramento System provides Connection, Access, Resources, Empowerment, and Support to families across Sacramento County. Supported children and families through:
  - Providing developmental information and approximately 600 Ages & Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) Screenings
  - Completed Family Action Plans (FAP) and conducted 900 Home Visits with families to support families with needs identified through screening and/or in their FAP
  - Through 500 referrals, connected families with mental/behavioral health resources along with referrals for further evaluation as indicated by screening result or parent concern to ALTA Regional, Infant Development Program, and/or School Districts for further evaluation

## EARLY HEAD START (EHS)

- 100% staffed, 87% enrolled serving prenatal to 3-year-olds; 27% of enrolled children have an IFSP (individualized family service plan)
- SCOE EHS Program has been awarded \$200,000 for Farm to Family – Families will receive monthly produce boxes with matching recipes, plus a children's book tied to the contents. During group events, families will explore the produce through hands-on cooking activities and storytime, encouraging healthy eating and early literacy.



# Family and Community Engagement/VOICE

- Developing ECE Spanish-speaking cohort for FCC professionals in collaboration with Chabot College
- Designing a targeted media campaign to highlight “Family Choice” to general public when it comes to building awareness of the various early learning and care (UPK) programs in county
- Hosted first Family Playfest event at SMUD’s Safetyville (Rancho Cordova) with 240 family members, 70 community partners, and 15 Early Learning staff
- Coordinated 51 outreach events in 2024–25 so far. Expanding social media pages on Facebook (123 followers), Instagram (196 followers), and LinkedIn (368 followers)





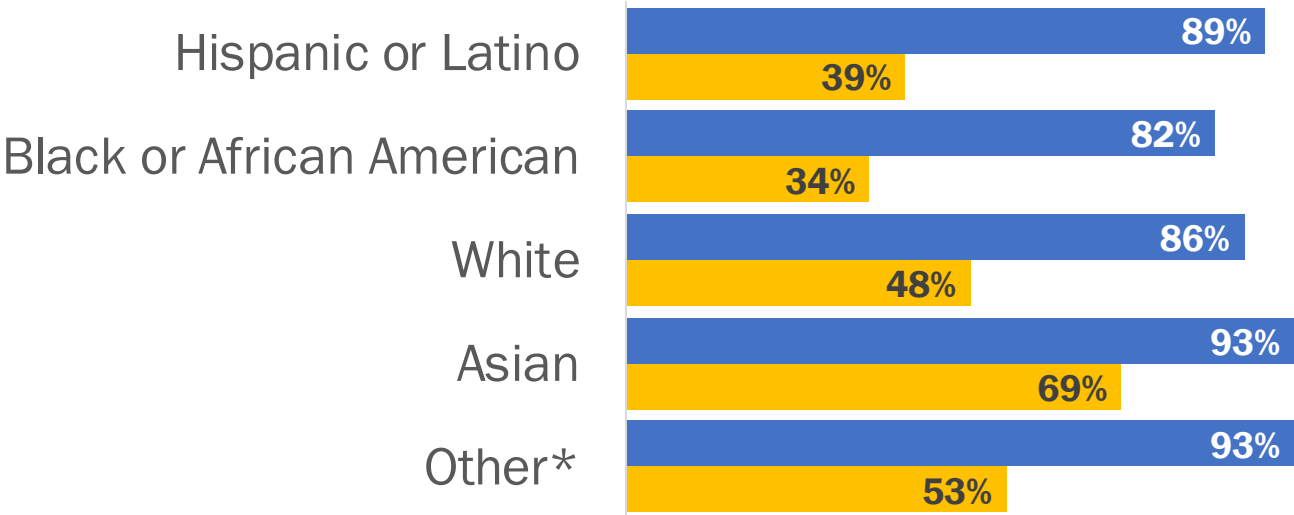
# Local Planning Council (LPC)

- Conducted a Sacramento County Parent and Provider Survey to collect data on the needs of families and providers. The data collected will be used to inform the 2026–2031 Sacramento County Needs Assessment Plan.
- Received a grant from Start Early to participate in the Community Systems Mapping Pilot. The Systems Map will coordinate with other community agencies throughout Sacramento County to collect data and resources available to families in 7 key areas including community populations, Healthy Beginnings–prenatal and child health, economic indicators and mental health, and quality early learning and care.
- Identified annual Zip Code Priorities for Sacramento County that inform child care funding levels and resource needs for families and providers.



# Preparing for College: There Is No Gap with AVID

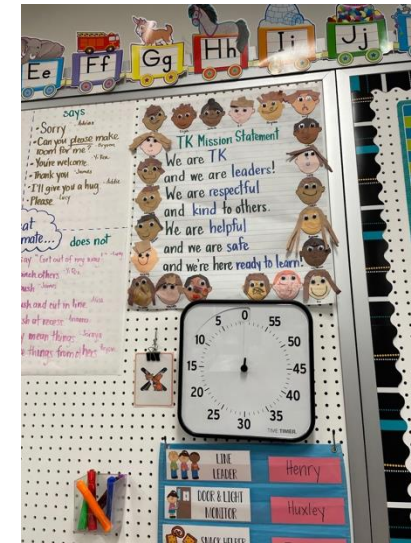

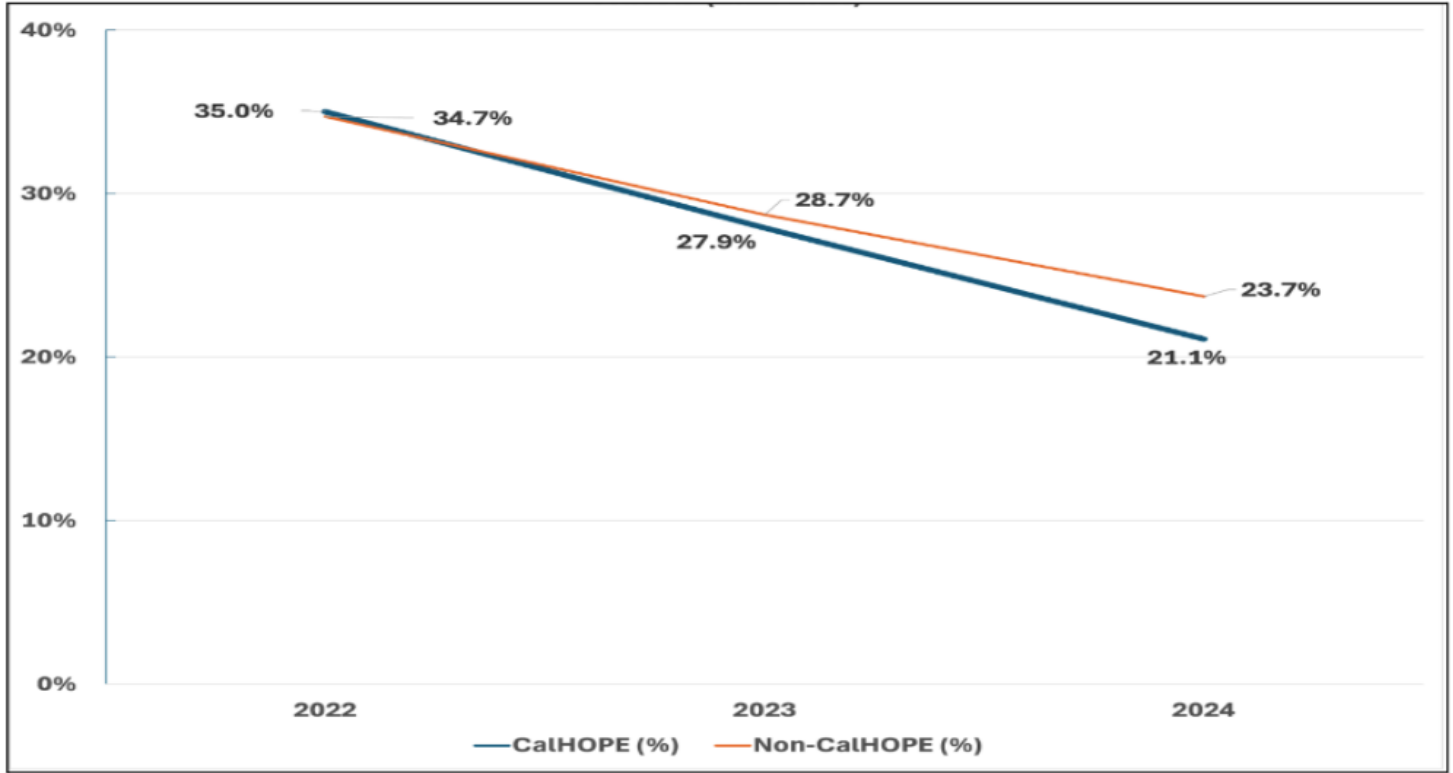

# Project Teach Countywide

- Provided technical assistance to LEAs
- Supported 365 students experiencing homelessness with barriers to accessing school and enrolled 35 students back into school
- Distributed 373 CDE student rights posters to LEAs and 97 to community agencies in 18 different languages
- Trained on the needs and statutory rights of youth experiencing homelessness for LEAs, SCOE staff, shelters, and community agencies
- Partnered with 30 shelter locations, successfully serving 100% of family and youth shelters countywide
- Distributed tangible items to shelters, including 233 backpacks with school supplies, 550 dental kits, 431 hygiene kits, and 20 fall and summer baskets





# Project Teach College Initiative

**Supporting transition-aged youth (ages 18–24) who are homeless, pregnant, or parenting children ages 0–5, in need of housing support, who are enrolled in a participating college.**

**In our first year:**

- Received 38 referrals
  - Served 21 children ages 0–5
  - Program successfully housed 12 families
- **Services for ages 0–5:**
- 6 children received early intervention referrals and services
  - 6 children connected to an early learning program
  - 22 ASQ screenings conducted





# Project Teach SCOE-Enrolled Students

- 276 SCOE students have received support to access education, stabilize school enrollment, and received a Community Resource Folder
- Resource diaper bags distributed to 17 pregnant and parenting students to support their 20 children ages 0–5
- Conducted determinations for reduced credit graduation for SCOE students experiencing homelessness
- Supported college and career readiness for 60 graduating students experiencing homelessness





# Prevention and Early Intervention

- Served 33 middle schools and 15 high schools in Sacramento County through on-campus chapter meetings, student leadership trainings, and school site faculty advisor trainings, serving 1,700 students monthly
- Provided Friday Night Live (FNL) Mentoring at four middle schools and four high school sites allowing 85 students to build mutually beneficial relationships while learning important life skills
- Office of Traffic Safety grant provided pedestrian and bicycle safety education to five middle schools and thousands of community members throughout the county through bike rodeos, safety courses, on-foot safety trainings, helmet fitting distributions, and educational presentations





# Prevention and Early Intervention – Part 2

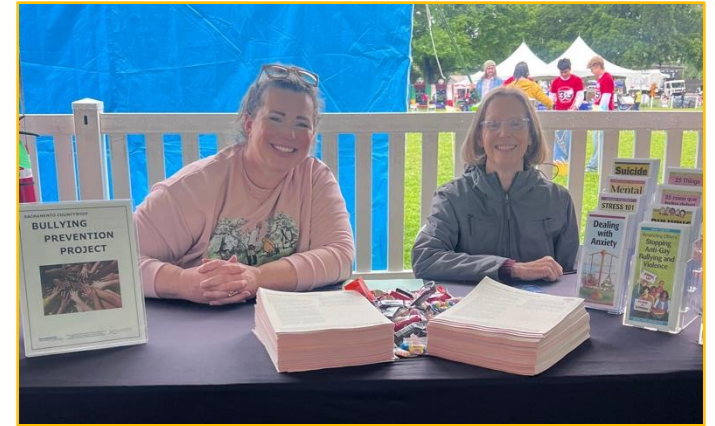
- Provided technical assistance and support to 13 districts for Tobacco-Use Prevention Education
- Sacramento County Coalition for Youth (SCCY) continued the Future Forward marijuana prevention (for youth) and the *Talk They Hear You* Campaign (for parents), impacting thousands of community members through television commercials and transit media
- Hosted a screening of the documentary, *Fentanyl High*, followed by a panel discussion with more than 350 registrants and a waiting list





# Prevention and Early Intervention – Part 3

- Supported and provided technical assistance to 12 Sacramento County school districts for Bullying Prevention Programming serving over 37,000 students who received bullying prevention curriculum, services, and supports
- Supported 34 suicide prevention trainings throughout the county with 1,695 participants to date receiving crisis intervention and suicide prevention trainings
- Provided 49 skill-dense mentoring sessions to date with 11 mentors supporting 20 residents in two housing units within the Youth Detention Facility (YDF)

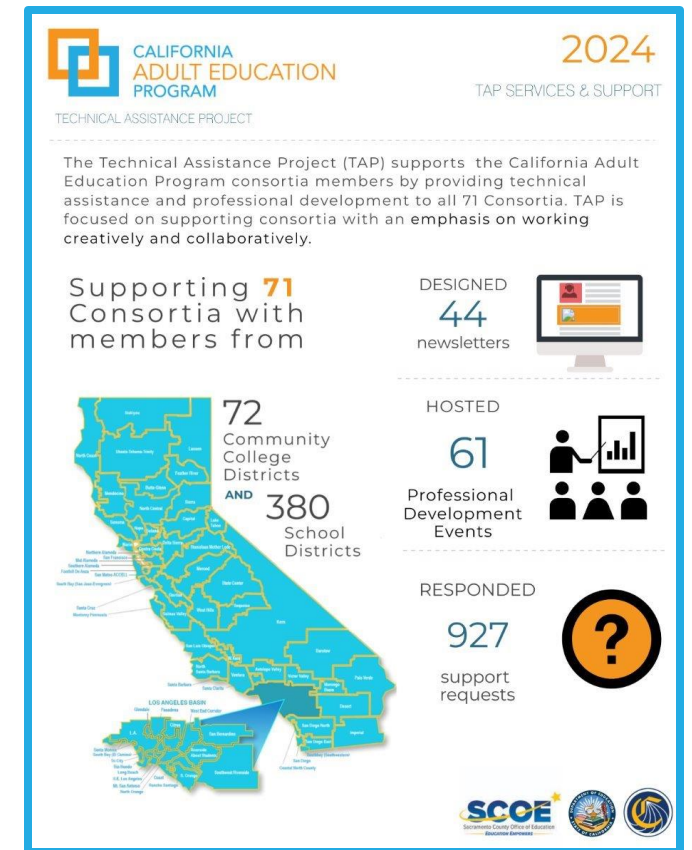

# Adult Education: CAEP TAP

## California Adult Education Program Technical Assistance Project (CAEP TAP)

- Provided targeted technical support for new legislation Carryover Compliance guidance and expanded technical support for 33 consortia that exceeded the 20% carryover threshold.
- Distributed a bi-monthly newsletter to nearly 4,000 CAEP consortia leads, members, and partners.

# Adult Education: OTAN

## Outreach & Technical Assistance Network (OTAN)

### Training

- Between July 1, 2024, and March 31, 2025, OTAN delivered 123 trainings, including 29 focused on AI, and presented 88 conference presentations with 32 AI-related sessions. For example, at one statewide adult education conference, we led 29 sessions with nearly 1,100 in total attendance making up over 15% of all open informational sessions. Our post-training surveys showed a 93% high satisfaction rate from participants.

### Accountability and Reporting Support

- OTAN delivers essential guidance to more than 300 adult education agencies, ensuring accountability and compliance with federal and state grant requirements. This includes key components such as the Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP) and student technology intake survey, as well as office hours, reminders, and status checks to support effective implementation.





# Adult Education: OTAN – Part 2

## Digital Leadership Academy (DLAC)

- OTAN's Digital Leadership Academy (DLAC) teams are advancing steadily in their two-year journey and presented their mid-year reports on May 15–16, 2025. This year, OTAN was honored with the 2025 Outstanding State Innovation of the Year award from the Coalition on Adult Basic Education (COABE), recognizing DLAC's impact in advancing adult education through innovative technology integration and leadership development.
  - Now, participants can also earn Continuing Education Units (CEUs) through a partnership with Sacramento State, further reinforcing DLAC's commitment to professional growth and innovation in adult education.





# Adult Education: OTAN – Part 3

## Technology and Digital Learning Symposium (TDLS)

- OTAN's annual hybrid conference dedicated to advancing technology integration in adult education featured 61 sessions in 2025, covering topics from AI to digital equity. Of the 300 attendees (198 in person), 92% rated the keynote highly; nearly 70% reported increased knowledge post-sessions, and over half felt confident implementing their learnings independently. OTAN's commitment to offering TDLS in a hybrid format reflects a dedication to equitable and inclusive access, ensuring that both in-person and virtual participants can engage fully in the learning experience.

## California Adult Education Digital Learning Guidance (DLG)

- OTAN is revising the DLG, bringing together a diverse group of educators, administrators, and experts across the state and nationally to ensure the Guidance advises adult educators on implementing effective and meaningful digital learning experiences within adult education. The updated DLG will be published in Fall 2025.



# Adult Education: OTAN – Part 4

## Canvas Learning Management System

- We continue to provide free instances and licenses to adult schools across California to bring Canvas to adult education programs. We hosted our first regional OTAN Canvas Summit in Sacramento in May and hope to replicate this in other regions around the state next year to bring customized, in-person training to numerous localities.

## California Adult Education Students Succeed

- OTAN received 51 nominations of outstanding adult learners from adult education agencies around California. Four students will be selected for recognition at the CAEP Summit in September and the ACSA Leadership Summit in November. OTAN is honored to have managed this program for the field for many years.

- Rocklin Family of Schools operates ARCA within San Juan Unified School District boundaries, serving grades TK–5
- Board approved charter for five-year term through June 30, 2025 (extended through June 30, 2028 – Ed. Code, § 47607.4)



## Capital College and Career Academy (CCCA) Charter School

- Board approved charter for five-year term through June 30, 2028
- CCCA successfully opened on August 3, 2023, with 50 students enrolled in 9<sup>th</sup> grade
- In 2024–2025, approximately 115 students enrolled in 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grades

- Held a year-long series of 12 training sessions intended for new assessment coordinators, known as the New Coordinator Training, for more than 2,300 total attendees

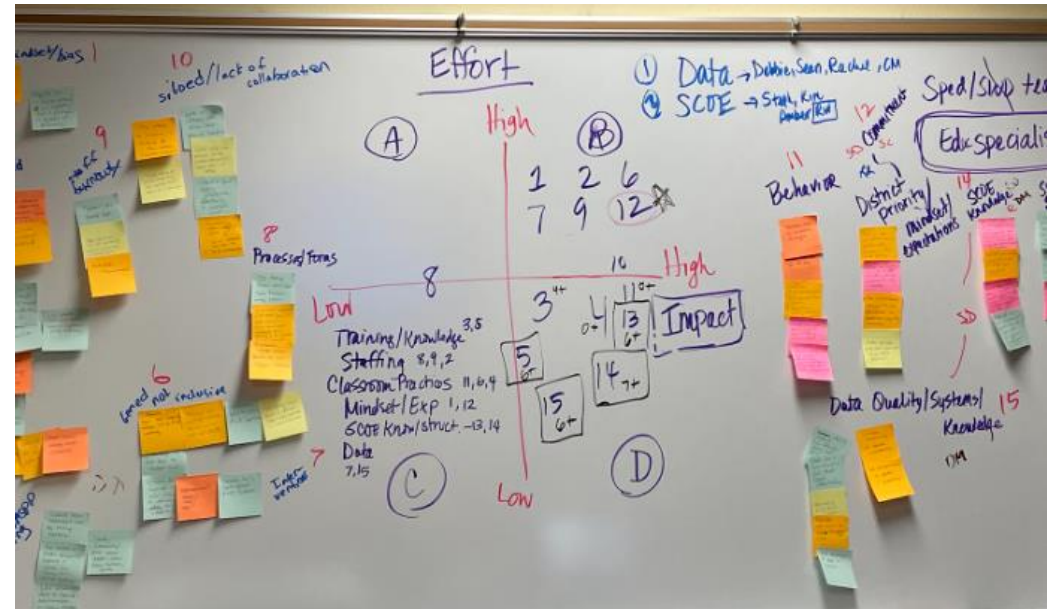

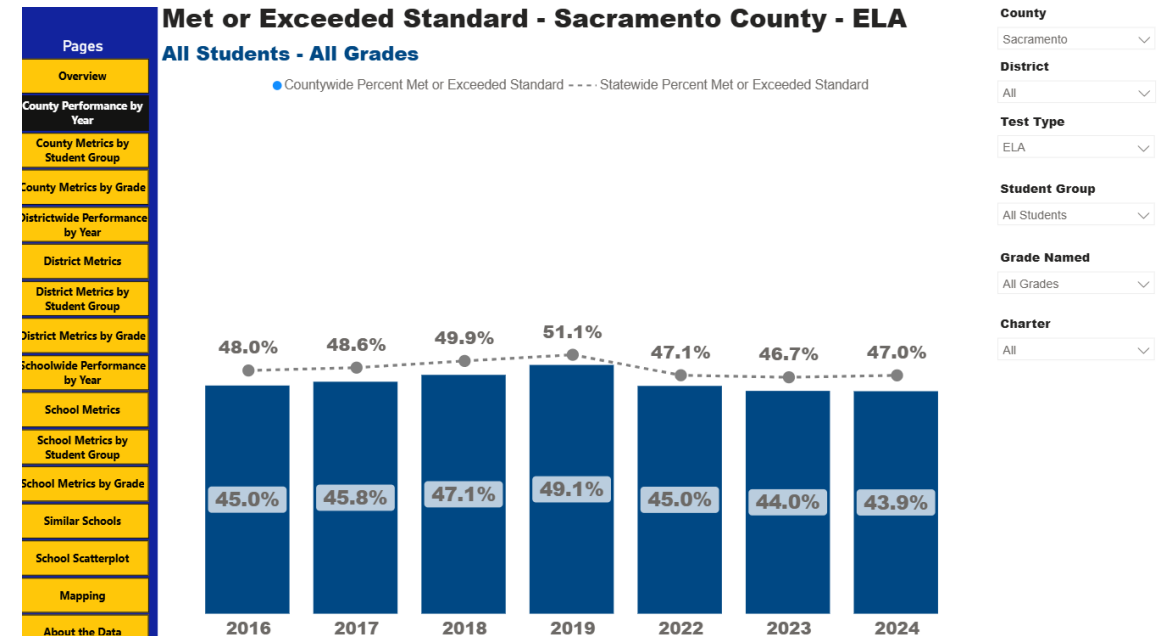

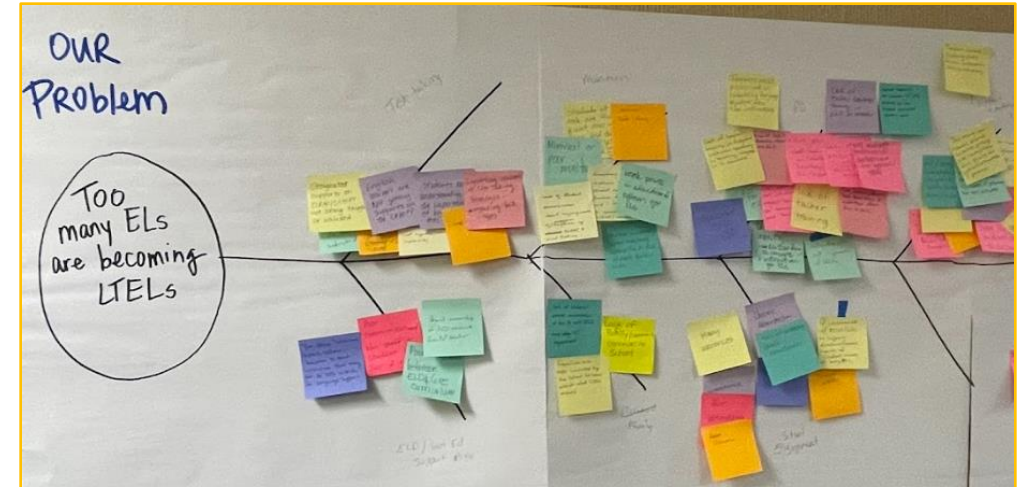

# California Community Schools Partnership Program (CCSPP)

## Capitol Area Regional Transformational Assistance Center (R-TAC)

### ■ Highlights

- Expanded transformational support to assist new CCSPP Cohort 3 Implementation Grantees in the region, encompassing 30 LEAs and 87 sites across 10 counties in the Capitol Area
- Provided grant writing support to prospective CCSPP Cohort 4 Implementation Grantees in the region, contributing to the successful award of grants to 11 LEAs encompassing 41 sites across 5 counties.
