Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses have local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region. Colusa Alternative Home School is a K-12 Independent Study program that focuses on delivering high quality educational experiences in a Home School environment. Students and parents, with the support of district staff and curriculum, are offered a variety of approved classes to meet the needs of the learner. Parents and students have the option of completing their studies at home and utilizing the Home School resource center that was established during the 2004 - 2005 school year. District teaching staff meets with each student and parent a minimum of one hour per week to review work completed and provide materials for future assignments. The teachers offer tutoring hours to further support their students.
