



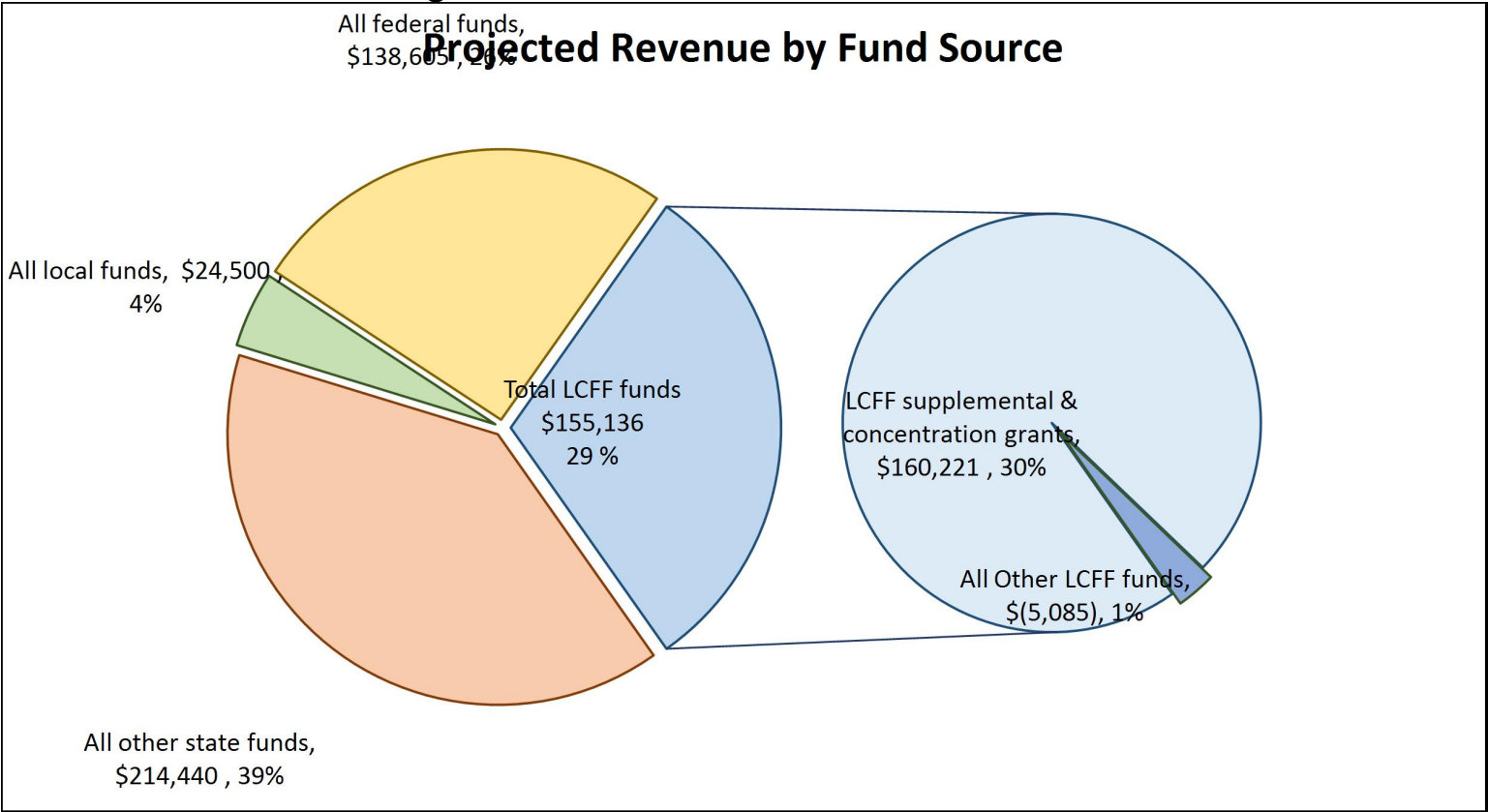

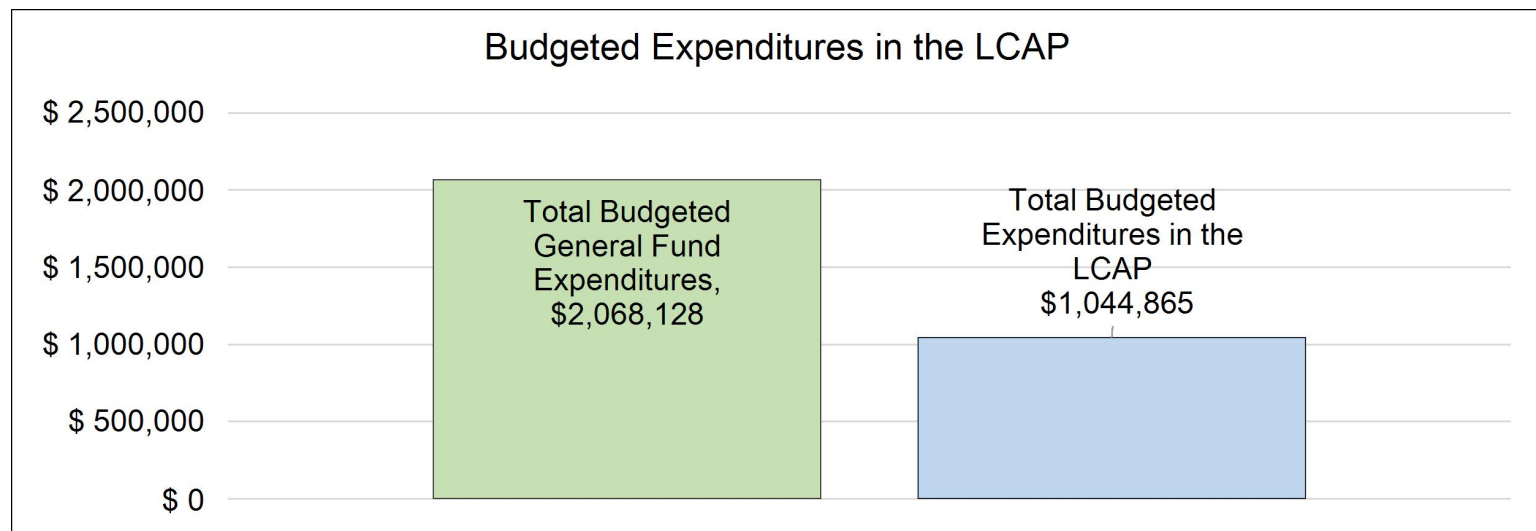


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Dunsmuir Jt. Un. High School District and Dunsmuir High School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Dunsmuir Jt. Un. High School District and Dunsmuir High School is \$1930681, of which \$155136 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$214440 is other state funds, \$24500 is local funds, and \$138605 is federal funds. Of the \$155136 in LCFF Funds, \$160221 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

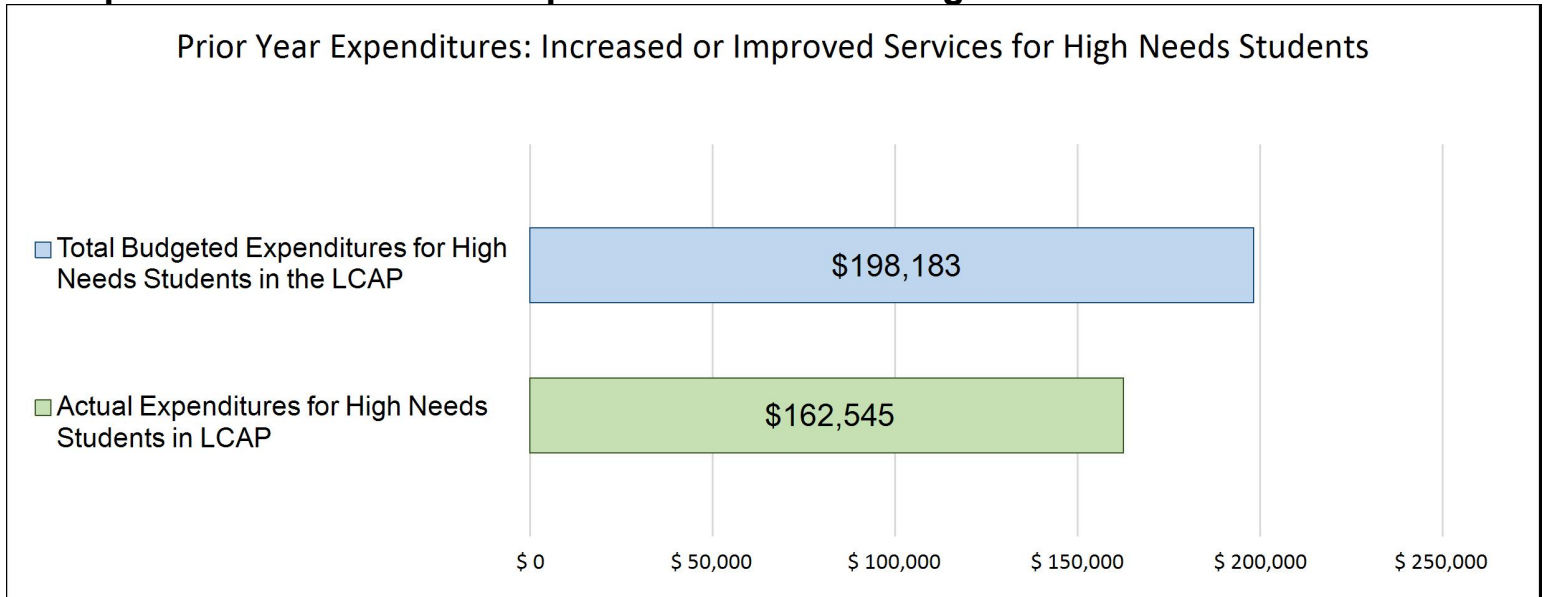
General fund expenditures not included in the LCAP are used for general operating costs including salaries and benefits, cafeteria, utilities, maintenance, and supplies.

In 2026-27, Dunsmuir Jt. Un. High School District and Dunsmuir High School is projecting it will receive \$160221 based on the enrollment of Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students. Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA. LEAs may also provide information about their strategic plan, vision, etc.

Dunsmuir is a small town of less than 2 square miles, home to about 1,500 people. The town has historic interest as a train and logging town, but currently offers few economic opportunities beyond a few motels, restaurants, and small shops. There are forestry and resource management opportunities in the surrounding towns of McCloud, Weed, and Siskiyou County at large. The town itself is bisected by the Sacramento River, which starts upstream in Mt. Shasta City. This provides great areas for fishermen. I-5 runs through the town, but it is still considered rural, even frontier, due to its distance from urban areas - an hour to Redding, CA, and an Hour and a half to Medford, OR.

The high school has one campus. It was constructed when Dunsmuir was more populous, so it has ample room to serve our 62 students (24-25 school year). The gym roof suffered damage from extreme snow loads in 2023 and was recently opened in time for our basketball season. The rest of the campus is clean and safe. It is safe and accessible to all staff and students.

The goal at Dunsmuir High is to provide students with challenging experiences that include quality academic, vocational, visual/performing arts, and extracurricular programs and activities. Providing an educated, upbeat, creative staff, a supportive community, and innovative coursework is also of utmost importance. Students are offered opportunities to take risks, allowing them to grow personally and experience success and failure, which will provide the learning and maturing experiences necessary for successful futures. Feeder schools are separate school districts - Dunsmuir Elementary and Castle Rock - but we also take students from McCloud, Weed, and Mt. Shasta who want the supportive environment we provide, with small class sizes and lots of choices.

The Household income figures (74.8% low income) qualify us for several grant opportunities. The students embody the social problems that accompany this condition - behavioral and health issues, but are largely accepting of each other and supportive of each other. We currently have no foster youth and no English learners. Race does not appear to be a factor in grades, behavior, or attendance. This may be because we have a high percentage of students with two or more races. Approximately 24% of our students require the services of our Special Ed teacher.

Dunsmuir High received LREBG funds previously but expended them in total prior to 6/30/2025. Therefore, the LREBG funds are not addressed in the LCAP.

We do qualify for Title I, Part A. These funds are used in Goal 3, Action 5, to fund salaries for Math 1A and Consumer Math to ensure our students have basic math skills. They are also utilized in Goal 4, Action 5 to cover a portion of the salary for the staff assigned to administer site council, ESSA requirements, and use of Title IA funds, as well as fees associated with professional development and mentoring. We qualified for CSI last year and have rollover funding to send this year, as utilized for Success 101 elevated (Goal 1, Action 1); Expanded World Language (Goal 1, Action 2), and Summer School (Goal 1, Action 7). We did not qualify for additional funding for 25-26, so the CSI portion of the LCAP is not applicable.

DHS receives Supplemental and Concentration funding (RS 0000, sometimes 1400) and is utilized as follows: Add a chemistry class (Goal 1, Action 3) Maintain our academic resilience classes (Goal 1, Action 3); Masters Stipends and substitutes for professional development absences (Goal 1, Action 6); Independent Study (Goal 1, Action 7); Special resources extended to non special ed students (Goal 2, Action 2); Expand Student Advisor roll (Goal 3, Action 1); Add a Drama Class, and a drama and a yearbook club (Goal 4, Action 3). 15% of the funds received for Concentration (RS 0053) are spent on Goal 3, Action 4, for an addition to the robotics class schedule.

DHS does not receive Equity Multiplier funds or Differentiated Assistance funds, and does not have English Language learners.

The Budget represented here is based on the figures available as of May 23, 2025. If approved budgets change due to State or Federal budget changes, this LCAP will be realigned as necessary after the 15-day revision period.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

DHS has been struggling with attendance issues and suspensions. Although Chronic Absenteeism is not shown in the dashboard for high schools, we are still concerned that attendance has not returned to pre-Covid levels, despite several actions adopted to change this. Suspensions reduced last year, but 2024-25 suspensions increased due to inappropriate behavior, to vaping and to use of controlled substances. The student group that creates both of these situations and lowest performing student group for 2023 dashboard suspensions results is All Students and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged in the CA Dashboard indicator of Suspension.

State test scores come in under state averages, except in science. Thus far in School Year 24-25, about 35% of our students have at least one F - despite daily tutoring opportunities and academic resilience programs. (Less than 10% of these are students with disabilities). About 40% of our students, are on the honor roll, (an increase from last year). Theoretically, CAASPP test scores should be higher. Many students

do not believe the tests help them at all and are not motivated to finish them or do their best. We hoped to put a new action in place last year to assign seniors a grade for tests taken however, we were not able to implement that. Lowest performing student groups in the suspension rate indicator are 'All students' and 'Low income students' at the District level and at Dunsmuir High School. In 2025 CA Dashboard there were no indicators with students performing in the lowest performing level.

Dunsmuir High School has \$4,839 in unexpended LREBG funds. These funds will support Goal 2, Action 2, Social and Emotional Support, including wraparound counseling, behavior supports, attendance outreach, and wellness interventions for students. This action is selected because the needs assessment identifies chronic absenteeism, suspensions, low grades, and student wellness as ongoing concerns, particularly for low-income students and students with disabilities. The action aligns with allowable LREBG uses under EC Section 32526(c)(2) by supporting academic learning recovery and social-emotional well-being. It addresses needs identified through EC Section 32526(d) by improving attendance, reducing suspensions, and supporting coursework completion.

Goal 1 was fully implemented. There were no substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions. Action 1.1 related to college courses was successful, with a high percentage of students enrolling in and completing college courses. Action 1.6 regarding professional development was challenging due to low teacher attendance. Moving forward, the goal is to provide more relevant and engaging professional development opportunities.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Action 1.1 - Additional funds were allocated to action 1.1 as CSI funding ran out in December of 2025. More was spent as January-June 2026 salaries were not included in the original LCAP.

Action 1.2 - Additional funds were allocated to action 1.1 as CSI funding ran out in December of 2025

Action 1.3 - Additional funds were allocated to action 1.3 to enhance existing courses and student support classes.

Action 1.5 - We had zero students take the College Placement tests.

Action 1.6 - We spent less money than budgeted since we lost a staff member who would have attended additional workshops if present. The amount of PD expenditures for 25-26 has been lowered to more closely align with what we experienced in 24-25.

Axction 1.7 - Additional funds were allocated to action 1.7 to enhance summer School and independent study programs to support student achievement.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Action 1.1 was effective, as 20% more students enrolled in a college course. (metric 1.3)

Action 1.2 was effective as 20% more students were enrolled in a pathways course. (metric 1.3)

Action 1.3 was effective, as 8.7% more students completed A-G courses. (metric 1.6)

AR classes are utilized effectively for Edgenuity time as well as by students who need to make up credits for graduation or are doing independent study.

Action 1.3 was effective, resulting in a 4.1% increase in the student graduation rate. (metric 1.1)

Success is measured by A-G counts and percentages, Graduation rates, and college enrollment numbers.

Action 1.4 was effective as 4.1% more improvement in student graduation rate. (metric 1.1)

The dual enrollment push has been successful, as evidenced by the increase from 40% to 71% (metric 1.2).

Action 1.5 was effective because there was an increase 13.3% pertaining to the math CAASP score (metric 1.5)

Success is measured by College enrollment data via student tracker - Metric 1.10, an increase of 39.3%

Action 1.6 was effective, as 20% more students enrolled in a pathways course. (metric 1.3)

Action 1.7 was effective as 4.1% more improvement in student graduation rate. (metric 1.1)

 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
