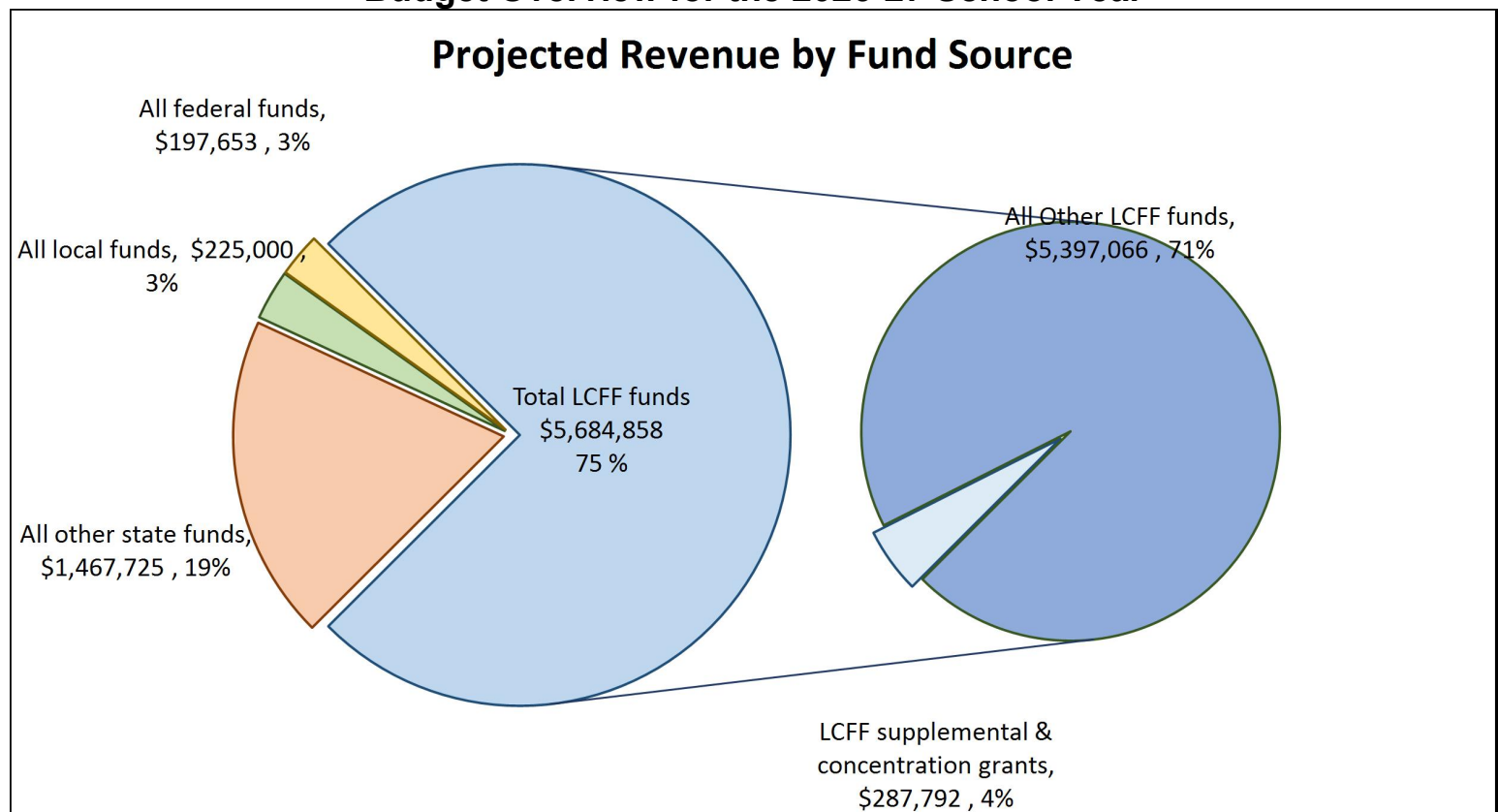

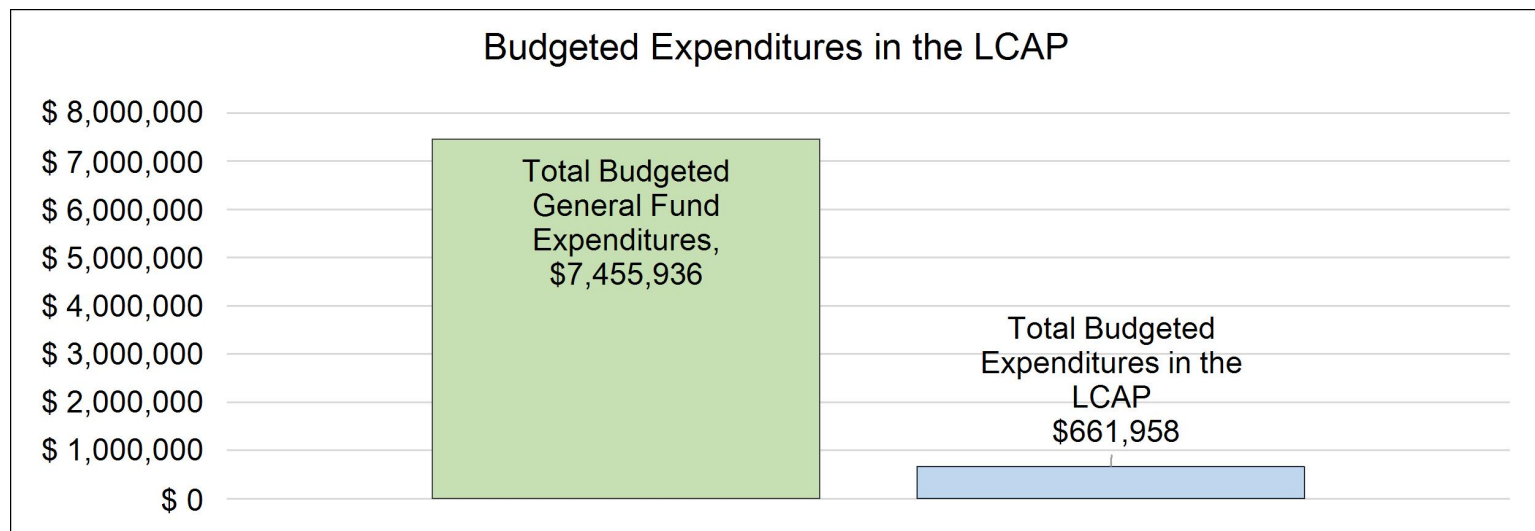


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Dixon Montessori Charter School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Dixon Montessori Charter School is \$7,575,236, of which \$5684858 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1467725 is other state funds, \$225,000 is local funds, and \$197653 is federal funds. Of the \$5684858 in LCFF Funds, \$287,792 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

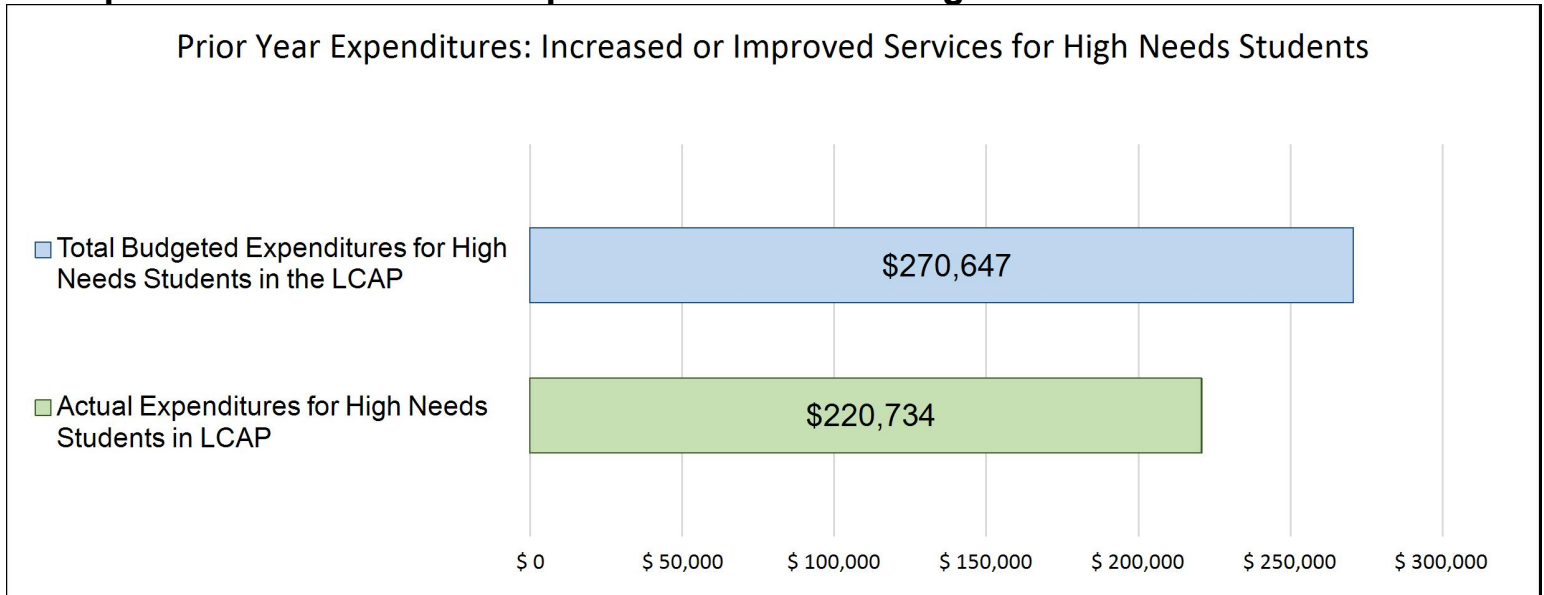

Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) is a public charter school located in Dixon, California, serving students in transitional kindergarten (TK) through 8th grade. DMCS emphasizes hands-on learning, student-centered instructional excellence, and character building. As a WASC-accredited independent charter authorized by Dixon Unified, DMCS serves a diverse student population of approximately 450–500 students. Our dedicated team of educators is committed to providing a supportive environment through a range of programs, including art, music, physical education, and immersive projects.

In alignment with our mission of continuous improvement, DMCS utilizes Equity Multiplier funding to specifically address equity gaps and enhance outcomes for underserved populations. These resources are strategically deployed to hire specialized staff, provide targeted professional development, and implement academic interventions. Through collaboration with families and community partners, DMCS remains dedicated to fostering social-emotional development and ensuring equitable access to excellence for all students.

Reflections: Annual Performance

Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) consistently performs above both the Dixon Unified School District (DUSD) and the State of California averages across all three tested content areas—English Language Arts (ELA), Mathematics, and Science. This positive trend signals strong instructional alignment, effective use of adopted curricula, and a focused commitment to academic achievement and growth.

Summary across all subjects:

- More students meet or exceed standards compared to state and district peers.
- Fewer students are scoring at Level 1 (Not Met), indicating success in minimizing severe underperformance.
- A substantial portion of students fall into Level 2 (Nearly Met), suggesting a major opportunity for targeted support to boost overall proficiency.

Indicator: English Language Arts – California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)

Based on the 2024-2025 CAASPP data for English Language Arts/Literacy, Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) continues to demonstrate strong academic performance compared to both the Dixon Unified School District (DUSD) and the overall State of California.

- 19.16% of DMCS students Exceeded the Standard (Level 4), which significantly outperforms the DUSD average of 10.10% and remains competitive with the State average of 22.29%.
- 37.28% Met the Standard (Level 3), representing a substantial lead over both DUSD (22.05%) and the State (26.53%).
- 22.30% Nearly Met the Standard (Level 2), which is closely aligned with the State (21.76%) and slightly lower than DUSD (25.87%).
- Only 21.25% of DMCS students Did Not Meet the Standard (Level 1), a figure that is dramatically lower than DUSD (41.98%) and noticeably better than the State average (29.43%).
- This distribution shows that 56.44% of DMCS students met or exceeded state standards—an increase from the previous year's 50.92%—reinforcing the school's success in instructional effectiveness and student engagement., and continuing a trend of pulling away from state and local averages.

Reflection on Strengths

Instructional Rigor and Support:

- The high percentage of students exceeding or meeting the standard demonstrates that DMCS has established strong foundational instruction in English Language Arts. This may reflect teacher's effective use of the curriculum and alignment with state standards.

Effective Differentiation:

- The comparatively low percentage of students in Level 1 suggests that DMCS is successfully identifying and supporting struggling readers through RTI intervention strategies, such as small group pull out instruction and small group instruction in classrooms.

Equity in Outcomes:

- Surpassing state and district performance indicates that DMCS may be implementing more equitable teaching practices or supports for underserved groups, which should be further explored and replicated.

Reflection on Areas for Growth

Addressing “Nearly Met” Students:

- With 22.30% of students in Level 2, there is a substantial group that is close to meeting the standard. This cohort presents an opportunity for targeted acceleration, especially through strategic use of formative assessments and data-driven instruction.

Consistency in Advanced Achievement:

- While the Level 4 rate is strong, it is slightly below the state average. Continued professional development around higher-order thinking, writing, and text analysis skills can help more students move from Level 3 to Level 4. The adoption of the EL Education curriculum is also

expected to enable more students to go from standard met to standard exceeded because the new curriculum consistently embeds higher level thinking skills.

Implications for LCAP Goals

Goal 1: Improve academic outcomes in English Language Arts across all subgroups.

-Action: Strengthen intervention supports for Level 2 students and enhance enrichment opportunities for Level 3 students to advance into Level 4. This needs to be done at a programmatic level. Next year the K1 classes will be piloting a new intervention method which we expect to expand access to support and to enrichment simultaneously.

Goal 2: Close the achievement gap.

-Action: Use disaggregated Dashboard data to identify underperforming subgroups (e.g., English Learners, Students with Disabilities) and tailor supports accordingly.

Goal 3: Enhance teacher capacity.

-Action: Provide targeted PD on the new ELA curriculum and data use, specifically focused on lifting students from “Nearly Met” to “Met” or “Exceeded.”

Indicator: Mathematics – California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)

2024 CAASPP Data:

-45.42% of DMCS students met or exceeded standards, outperforming the state average (35.54%) and nearly doubling the district rate (23.96%).

-Standard Exceeded (Level 4): 18.68% (More than double the district's 7.66%).

-Standard Not Met (Level 1): 30.77% (Significantly lower than the district's 48.43%).

Reflection on Strengths:

-The high percentage of students in Level 4 highlights the effectiveness of the Math curriculum and instruction. Our students demonstrate a deeper conceptual understanding than peers in traditional settings.

Areas for Growth & LCAP Alignment:

-Targeted Remediation: While we outperform the district, 30% of students remain in Level 1. We will intensify Tier 2 and Tier 3 intervention blocks and utilize diagnostic assessment data for real-time differentiation and pull out intervention.

-Fluency Support: We are focusing on mathematical fluency to help "Nearly Met" students gain the confidence needed to reach grade-level mastery.

Indicator: Science – California Science Test (CAST) Performance

Overview of Performance

The 2024 CAST results reveal that Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) is a regional leader in science instruction. DMCS students significantly outperformed both the Dixon Unified School District (DUSD), Solano County, and the State of California, demonstrating the success of our early and rigorous implementation of the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS).

- Exceeded Standard (Level 4): 15.38% — More than four times the district average (3.51%) and significantly higher than the state (9.89%).
- Met Standard (Level 3): 24.36% — Surpassing both DUSD (15.06%) and the State (20.81%).
- Standard Not Met (Level 1): Only 6.41% — Remarkably lower than the district (17.84%) and the state (15.45%).
- Overall, 40.66% of DMCS students met or exceeded standards, placing the school well ahead of local and state benchmarks.

Reflection on Strengths

- Culture of Excellence: Our high "Exceeded" rate (Level 4) indicates that our students are doing more than just memorizing facts; they are critically applying scientific concepts—a core tenet of the Montessori method.
- Effective Tier 1 Instruction: With only 6.41% of students in Level 1, our core instructional strategies are reaching nearly every student, ensuring a high floor for scientific literacy.
- Hands-On NGSS Integration: Our success stems from a commitment to inquiry-based learning and cross-disciplinary STEM projects. The upcoming Moon Tree project will serve as a lighthouse initiative to further deepen student engagement in life and physical sciences.

Reflection on Areas for Growth

- Accelerating the "Nearly Met" Cohort: Over half of our students (53.85%) sit in Level 2. This "bubble group" represents our greatest opportunity for growth. We will focus on integrating reading comprehension and structured scientific writing (Claim-Evidence-Reasoning) into the lab environment.
- Vertical Alignment: We are committed to refining our K–8 science scope and sequence to ensure that scientific inquiry builds progressively as students move through the planes of development.
- Equitable Access: While overall performance is high, we are prioritizing disaggregated data analysis to ensure that English Learners and Students with Disabilities have full access to high-level enrichment and STEM opportunities.

Implications for LCAP Goals

- Goal 1 (Proficiency): Target the 53.85% of students in Level 2 for movement into Level 3 through scaffolded inquiry and small-group lab instruction.
- Goal 2 (NGSS Mastery): Invest in professional development focused on "three-dimensional learning" and provide robust funding for hands-on lab materials and tools.
- Goal 3 (Experiential Learning): Utilize hands on learning to bridge the gap between classroom theory and real-world ecological stewardship.

Teachers	Staff Meetings: Regular weekly staff meetings provided opportunities for teachers, the Executive Director, principals, and other school personnel to contribute insights and feedback on LCAP priorities and goals. Staff meetings served as a way to share information, to react to data, and to plan for the future. Teacher Rep Meetings: Teacher representatives met with administrators once monthly to review data, analyze trends, and plan to improve performance. This team is instrumental in connecting our goals and reality. The teacher reps provide a wealth of information, wisdom, and solutions that help bring our written goals to fruition.
Administrators	The Executive Director, Academic Services Admin, Dean of Students, and Chief Business Official meet weekly to ensure the school is running in alignment with the Charter, WASC, and LCAP goals. ELAC	ELAC Meetings: The Academic Services Administrator consulted with the ELAC committee monthly on all matters related to school operation, programs, and planning, ensuring alignment with the needs of English Learner students.

Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) incorporated several key elements into its LCAP, reflecting a commitment to address stakeholder priorities and enhance educational outcomes for all students. These include:

- Inclusion of a Focus Goal: Educational partner feedback highlighted the importance of providing targeted support for English Learner (EL) students to improve language proficiency and academic achievement. As a result, DMCS included a Focus Goal specifically aimed at enhancing services and resources for EL students to support their linguistic and academic development.
- Expansion of Metrics: In addition to the statutorily required metrics, DMCS expanded the range of metrics used to assess student progress and school performance. This expansion was influenced by feedback from educational partners, who emphasized the importance of holistic assessment measures that capture student growth, social-emotional development, and other key indicators of success beyond traditional academic benchmarks.

-Adjustment of Target Outcomes: Target outcomes for certain metrics were adjusted based on input from educational partners, who provided insights into realistic and attainable goals for student achievement and progress. These adjustments ensured that targets were ambitious yet achievable, reflecting the collective aspirations of the school community.

-Inclusion of Performance by Student Groups: Educational partner feedback underscored the need to disaggregate data and analyze performance by student groups to identify and address disparities. In response, DMCS included a comprehensive analysis of performance by various student groups in the Measuring and Reporting Results subsection of the LCAP, enabling targeted interventions to support underserved populations.

-Allocation of Budget Expenditures: Budgeted expenditures within the LCAP were influenced by educational partner feedback, which informed decisions regarding resource allocation and prioritization of initiatives. Feedback from stakeholders guided the identification of strategic investments aimed at improving services for unduplicated students and enhancing overall student outcomes.

-Analysis of Effectiveness: DMCS conducted a thorough analysis of the effectiveness of specific actions outlined in the LCAP to achieve stated goals and objectives. This analysis, informed by educational partner feedback, guided continuous improvement efforts and informed decision-making processes for future planning cycles.

Overall, the engagement of educational partners played a pivotal role in shaping the development of DMCS's LCAP, ensuring that the plan reflects the diverse perspectives, priorities, and aspirations of the school community. By incorporating stakeholder input into goal-setting, metric selection, budget allocation, and program implementation, DMCS aims to foster a collaborative and inclusive approach to improving educational outcomes for all students.

Equity Multiplier Funds Consultation:

-As DMCS received Equity Multiplier funds, specific efforts were made to consult with educational partners at schools generating these funds. The focus goal for each applicable school was developed in collaboration with these partners to address disparities and improve outcomes for underserved student groups.

Overall, DMCS prioritized meaningful engagement with educational partners to foster transparency, collaboration, and shared ownership of the LCAP development process. By soliciting diverse perspectives and incorporating stakeholder feedback, DMCS developed a comprehensive plan that effectively addresses the needs of all students and promotes equitable access to quality education. Some training areas include GLAD, mathematical thinking, Montessori, SEL, Restorative Justice, PBIS, and more.

Continuous Improvement: We recognize the importance of continuous improvement. Setting goals to improve student achievement ensures that the school remains committed to excellence and doesn't become complacent with its current success. 2. Holistic Approach: While DMCS may excel in certain subject areas, it's essential to ensure that students are performing well across all disciplines. By focusing on improving achievement in standardized test scores, English Learner reclassification, and local assessments, the school aims to provide a well-rounded education that prepares students for success in all areas. 3. Equity and Inclusion: We are committed to improving our results for our students who speak a language other than English at home. We want to ensure that all students, regardless of their background or language proficiency, have access to the resources and support they need to succeed academically. 4. Data-Driven Decision Making: By using standardized test scores, English Learner reclassification data, and local assessments, DMCS can continue to identify areas for improvement and tailor interventions to address specific student needs. This data-driven approach allows us to make informed decisions about curriculum, instruction, and support services. 5. Accountability: It allows the school to track progress over time and hold ourselves accountable for meeting targets. This accountability fosters a culture of transparency and ensures that resources are allocated effectively to support student achievement.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

In the 2025-26 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School pursued its academic achievement goal through increased efforts in curriculum alignment, renewal of tiered interventions, and renewal of data-informed SST Process. This goal was carried out through targeted professional development, a clear focus on increasing student proficiency in Montessori pedagogy in TK-1, English Language Arts (ELA) intervention expansion, continuation of SIPPS intervention as a Tier 1 support, Mathematics intervention, a more clear SST process that expanded tier 2 support, and piloting Learning Labs in two K1 classrooms.

Successes Experienced

-ELA: Teachers continued to use the Collaborative Classroom curriculum along with supplemental materials. The curriculum is expiring at the end of the school year and will need to be replaced for 2026-2027 (curriculum adoption procedures are in place now). A curriculum committee was formed and they recommended the EL Education K-5 ELA curriculum to the Executive Director. As a result the EL Education curriculum was approved K-5 for the 2026-2027 school year.

-Math: The Eureka and Zearn math programs were used schoolwide and integrated into both whole-group and small-group instruction. Students accessed both digital lessons and live instruction aligned with the California Math Framework. In TK-1 rooms we saw an increase in Montessori material usage due in large part to our Montessori Coach.

-Science: Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) were hit by classroom teachers this year using Mystery Science. The Amplify curriculum was used in Middle School. Teachers reported that Mystery Science was engaging and rigorous, but that they needed pre-packaged materials to reduce prep hours (Mystery Boxes).

- ELD continues to have a dedicated full time qualified teacher
- WIN opportunities were expanded by increasing the amount of time WIN was available in the master schedule
- SIPPS reading instruction is fully integrated into our program and is showing to be very effective in building readers at an early grade level.

Challenges Experienced

- We need to ensure that the school is using curriculum that is vertically and horizontally aligned, is consistent, and is approved by the Executive Director. Adopting the new EL Education curriculum and it's internal formative assessments is expected to move the school toward vertical and horizontal alignment.
- DMCS is in need of a better way to use benchmark data to drive instruction and intervention.
- Further vertical and horizontal alignment of pacing guides, report cards, and curriculum is needed.
- UDL training
- Mystery Boxes are needed to help teachers use their prep and planning time effectively.
- A shift from Montessori coaching to systemic Montessori training with certification is needed
- PBL training
- PLC training
- EL Education training including inservice days and continual coaching is needed.

- Special Education is in a building phase. We are pushing toward a full inclusion model and the shift has been hard on some teachers and staff. More training and practice are needed.

The shift from pull out services to full inclusion for special education has resulted in increased staff cost.

The actions taken by Dixon Montessori Charter School during the 2024-25 school year were moderately to highly effective in advancing student achievement in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science.

While Dixon Montessori made meaningful academic gains, the full effectiveness of its LCAP actions was limited by implementation variability and data constraints. Targeted improvements to formal data use, vertical and horizontal alignment, and coaching structures will be essential to maximizing impact in the next cycle.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Following an in-depth review of academic performance data and reflection on implementation during the 2024-25 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School has made several key adjustments to its planned goals, metrics, target outcomes, and actions for the 2025-26 LCAP cycle. These changes are designed to address areas of inconsistency, expand on successes, and ensure all students are equitably supported in meeting or exceeding state academic standards.

Several actions have been refined or added based on implementation reflections:

Tier 2 Intervention

- Increased RTI intervention blocks 4x/week or shift to the Learning Lab intervention model
- Math support was inconsistent due to limited personnel. New staffing will allow consistent intervention delivery

Assessment Tools

Overall Implementation

During the 2025-26 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School implemented multiple strategies to support its goal of attracting, developing, and retaining high-quality staff. These efforts were anchored in five key areas:

- Retention & Recruitment Initiatives: The school launched targeted hiring campaigns beginning in February. Retention was supported through formalized induction or program mentorship for new teachers. Educational grants used to train/develop staff. Stipends used for leadership opportunities.
- Credentialing & Compliance Support: Leadership prioritized hiring fully credentialed teachers and collaborated closely with county offices to verify and document credentialing status. Teachers working on intern credentials received targeted support to clear their credentials within the expected timeframes.
- Compensation & Working Conditions: Teacher salary scales were reviewed and revised to stay competitive with surrounding districts and charter schools. The school preserved smaller class sizes, full benefits, and competitive daily prep time.
- Professional Development & Growth: The school delivered high-quality PD aligned to teacher feedback—especially in the areas of SIPPS, Montessori, and PBIS (for behavior management).
- Workplace Culture & Communication: Improved internal transparency and communications via a shared calendar and weekly updates contributed to a more collaborative and informed staff community.

1. Early Recruitment & Hiring Campaigns

Effectiveness: Moderately Effective

Evidence: The school filled the majority of its teaching positions before the start of the school year, and teacher vacancy on Day 1 was reduced to one position (compared to two the prior year). However, high demand for credentialed teachers statewide limited the pool.

Conclusion: Early recruitment helped minimize vacancies, but Dixon still faces regional competition for qualified candidates.

2. Credentialing & Intern Support

Effectiveness: Highly Effective

Evidence: Credential compliance improved from with three intern teachers receiving extra support to remain on track for full certification.

Conclusion: The school's structured support for credentialing has contributed meaningfully to the quality of instruction and compliance.

3. Teacher Prep Time & Working Conditions

Effectiveness: Effective

Evidence: Daily prep time of approximately 1.5 hours was preserved, and staff cited this as a key contributor to job satisfaction on the spring survey. Smaller class sizes also remained a strong retention factor.

Conclusion: These conditions are helping to stabilize the workforce, though prep time continues to be a topic for ongoing feedback.

4. Professional Development Opportunities

Effectiveness: Effective

Evidence: 100% of staff participated in the school's PD offerings, with strong participation in curriculum-specific trainings like SIPPS and With Out Tears. Feedback indicated PD was increasingly relevant to staff needs.

Conclusion: PD is a key driver of staff development and retention, especially when aligned to teacher-identified needs.

5. Staff Recognition and Workplace Culture Efforts

Effectiveness: Moderately Effective

Evidence: Staff appreciation was built into monthly meetings and informal acknowledgments. While these efforts were valued, survey results indicated that more structured or varied recognition practices would be welcomed.

Conclusion: Positive steps were made, but more intentional systems (e.g., staff awards, leadership opportunities) could increase staff morale further.

6. Compensation Review

Effectiveness: Effective

Evidence: Dixon Montessori continues to stay ahead of surrounding districts in total compensation packages.

Conclusion: Aggressive adjustments to staff salaries continue to help recruitment and retention efforts.

7. Educational grants used to train/develop staff

Effectiveness: Partially Effective

Evidence: More teachers need to use the educational grants provided by the school. This is expected to increase when DMCS implements it's own Montessori Training Center.

8. Improvement of Transparency

Effectiveness: Effective

Evidence: Staff survey reports, administrative notes, monthly calendars, staff meetings, and morning announcements all contributed to increased transparency which was well received on staff surveys.

9. Training on Specific Curriculum

Evidence: While some curricula came with several trainings (Montessori, SIPPS, Handwriting With Out Tears), others had no trainings (TCI, Zearn, Collaborative Classroom)

During the 2025-26 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School made meaningful progress toward maintaining a clean and safe facility by actively partnering with Dixon Unified School District (DUSD). Several proactive systems were introduced and refined, including structured communication with the lessor, formal facility assessments, and improved maintenance tracking.

The school executed key actions including:

- Conducting more frequent walkthroughs with DUSD maintenance and our own custodial staff
- Hiring crossing guards to increase safety for drop off and pick up
- Prioritizing immediate response to safety hazards (e.g., plumbing, playground equipment) through the use of SchoolDude and Facilitron
- Increasing transparency with staff and families around facility maintenance and cleanliness
- Working with DUSD to build a fence around the back of the school
- Working with DUSD to replace all soap and hand sanitizer modules throughout the campus

While some actions aligned closely with the implementation plan, others were delayed or adapted due to staffing limitations and scheduling conflicts.

Evidence: While communication with DUSD improved significantly, some work orders took more than two weeks to complete due to district staffing shortages and supply chain issues for repairs. The school and the district were able to complete the back fence, improve response time and effectiveness for work orders, and begin the Prop 39 rental agreement. Still needed are paint, roofing, HVAC, and asphalt repair.

When students feel safe, valued, and connected to their school community, they are more likely to engage in learning, exhibit positive behavior, and achieve academic success. Enhancing school climate thus serves as a foundational element in promoting student achievement.
3. Safety and Security: Ensuring the safety and security of students, staff, and visitors is of utmost importance for any educational institution. By prioritizing safety measures and creating a secure environment, Dixon Montessori aims to mitigate potential risks and provide peace of mind to all stakeholders, allowing them to focus on teaching, learning, and community-building.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School continued our targeted efforts to enhance school climate, safety, and community connectedness. Implementation prioritized expanding Tier 1 and Tier 2 behavior and emotional supports.

Social-Emotional Learning (SEL): The Second Step curriculum was deployed across all elementary grade levels with stronger scheduling fidelity than in previous cycles. Middle school curricular adjustments remain an ongoing conversation with the leading strategy to engage students being AVID.

Behavior and Climate Systems: Significant improvements have been made to the PBIS system leading DMCS to be recommended for the California PBIS Platinum award (this is the highest level possible). The school developed our own behavior tracking software to log positive and negative incidents, providing the Dean of Students with critical data to guide targeted interventions. While Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) framework structures are now roughly 85% complete for their initial rollout phase, a significant rise in documented classroom behavior referrals presented a major operational focus this year.

Safety and Operations: The School Safety Plan was successfully reviewed, staff were fully trained at the start of the year, and all mandatory emergency drills were completed. Crossing guards and designated arrival/dismissal staff maintained physical safety parameters daily.

Attendance Outreach: The office assistant dedicated 50% of their capacity to enforcing the school attendance plan and executing tiers of re-engagement, which directly correlated with a dramatic shift in our chronic absenteeism data.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Budgeted expenditures were implemented as planned across all actions. Estimated actual expenditures closely aligned with budgeted allocations to support behavior software, safety protocols, and attendance intervention personnel.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

PBIS & Behavior Tracking Software (Actions 4.1, 4.2, 4.3): Partially Effective

-Evidence: Behavioral incidents and classroom referrals climbed significantly to 132 incidents (compared to a baseline of 59). While this spike indicates a temporary strain on school climate, it also reflects highly consistent staff usage of the tracking software and a rigorous adherence to documentation protocols. With Tier 1 PBIS infrastructure now 85% established, these proactive tracking efforts are expected to yield lower discipline numbers in subsequent years as positive reinforcement systems mature.

Attendance Procedures (Action 4.6): Highly Effective

-Evidence: Chronic absenteeism dropped sharply to 2.3%, a substantial improvement from the 6.7% baseline. Dedicated attendance tracking and aggressive re-engagement tiers successfully kept students engaged. However, staff note that while independent study (IS) contracts technically lowered the official chronic absenteeism percentage on paper, maximizing actual "in-seat" physical attendance remains the ideal target for optimal learning.

SEL Curriculum Implementation (Action 4.7): Mostly Effective

-Evidence: 7th-grade student sense of belonging reached an impressive 88.14% (well exceeding the 80% target), and staff connectedness rose to 91%. Quantitative tracking shows a decreased volume of students requiring intensive counseling services, proving that Tier 1 SEL supports are stabilizing peer relationships. To sustain this, the school would benefit from a formalized, school-wide master schedule for SEL delivery and the exploration of an updated middle-school-specific curriculum (such as AVID).

Based on the reflections and data from the 2025–26 school year, the following adjustments will be prioritized moving forward:

- Discipline & Classroom Support: In response to the elevated referral numbers (132), resources will be directed toward strengthening proactive classroom management training and reinforcing restorative, mediation-based behavior systems to support teachers.
- Middle School SEL Alignment: Due to varying instructional pacing in upper grades, the school will investigate more age-appropriate, engaging alternative curricula tailored for middle school students to supplement or replace current programs.
- Fidelity of Attendance: Attendance monitoring will shift focus from merely qualifying for Independent Study contracts to actively reducing the overall number of missed seat-days, ensuring students are physically present in class whenever possible.

During the 2025–26 school year, Dixon Montessori Charter School (DMCS) successfully advanced its strategies to cultivate active, meaningful partnerships with families, local businesses, and community organizations.

Parent Governance and Feedback: The school sustained steady parental involvement, keeping a strong contingent of 4 DMCS parent representatives active on the Board of Directors. Broad feedback was gathered through our biannual satisfaction surveys, which maintained a solid participation rate.

Communication Surge: Our primary success this year was a massive expansion in community outreach via ParentSquare. Driven by the dedication of our staff, communication volume surged exponentially to over 3,600 annual posts, drastically increasing transparency and day-to-day engagement.

Community and Business Partnerships: Staff continued to foster deep roots within the broader city ecosystem, maintaining a strong organizational presence with the Chamber of Commerce and local service groups. Additionally, we successfully mapped out 5 active local business partnerships to enrich our school community.

Challenges: While large-scale campus community events consistently drew over 1,000 attendees in total, a recurring challenge remains coordinating and scaling smaller, specialized volunteer initiatives that accommodate the schedules of working families.

Expenditures were implemented as planned to support community outreach, translation services, and partnership development. There are no material differences between budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for this goal.

Board Representation & Parent Organization Input (Actions 5.1, 5.2): Effective

- Evidence: Maintained 3 DMCS parent board members and logged 13 collaborative meetings between parent organizations and the Executive Director including Coffee with the Director, Charter School Advisory Committee meetings, and the Executive Director joining PTO meetings.
- Impact: Ensured the parent voice directly shaped school governance, driving strong coordination for marquee school community events.

Biannual Satisfaction Surveys & Large Scale Events (Actions 5.3, 5.4): Effective

- Evidence: Maintained a parent survey response rate exceeding 60% and drew an estimated aggregate attendance of over 1,000 community members across our annual calendar events.
- Impact: Provided an open feedback loop for campus safety and culture while fostering a welcoming, inclusive environment on campus.

ParentSquare Communication Model (Action 5.5): Highly Effective

- Evidence: Total annual communications sent via ParentSquare grew dramatically from a baseline of 180 to an incredible 3,628 total posts (consisting of 276 school posts, 597 class posts, and 2,308 group posts).
- Impact: This massive increase in targeted, accessible updates significantly reduced information gaps, leaving families feeling highly informed and deeply connected to daily classroom life.

Chamber of Commerce & Business Alliances (Actions 5.6, 5.7): Effective

- Evidence: Established 5 active local business partnerships while the Executive Director maintained an active leadership role as a Chamber Director and Chair of the Education Committee.
- Impact: Elevated DMCS's visibility and institutional reputation within the city of Dixon, opening doors for localized student resources and future program support.

While the fundamental goal of developing active parent and community partnerships remains unchanged, reflections from the 2025–26 cycle will drive the following refinements for the upcoming year:

- Streamlining Communication Depth: Following our massive expansion to over 3,600 ParentSquare posts, the focus will shift from cohesion and volume to streamlining and efficiency to ensure critical school-wide updates do not get lost in group-level notification fatigue.
- Formalizing Business Structures: With 5 active local business partnerships now established, the school will focus on formalizing these relationships into sustainable, year-over-year commitments to support experiential learning and enrichment.
- Targeted Volunteer Paths: To address the challenge of inconsistent attendance at smaller volunteer events, the school will work alongside the PTO and ELAC to design flexible, micro-volunteer opportunities that better align with the varied availability of our parent community.

- **LCFF Carryover — Percentage:** Specify the LCFF Carryover — Percentage identified in the LCFF Carryover Table from the prior LCAP year. If a carryover percentage is not identified in the LCFF Carryover Table, specify a percentage of zero (0.00%).
- **Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year:** This percentage will not be entered; it is calculated based on the Projected Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year and the LCFF Carryover —

Percentage. ***This is the percentage by which the LEA must increase or improve services for unduplicated pupils as compared to the services provided to all students in the coming LCAP year.***

- **Goal #:** Enter the LCAP Goal number for the action.
- **Action #:** Enter the action's number as indicated in the LCAP Goal.
- **Action Title:** Provide a title of the action.

- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**
