Course Description/Student Learning Outcomes:

Civics

Students pursue a deeper understanding of the institutions of American government. They compare systems of government in the world today and analyze the history and changing interpretations of the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the current state of the legislative, executive, and judiciary branches of government. These standards represent the culmination of civic literacy as students prepare to vote, participate in community activities, and assume the responsibilities of citizenship.

Economics

In addition to studying government, students will understand the operations and institutions of economic systems. Studied in a historic context are the basic economic principles of micro- and macroeconomics, the influence of the government on the economy, and the challenges and changes that have occurred in relation to the American economy.

- 2. Achievement evidence collected within each grading category:

Grades are based on point production and completion of work. Points are based on the teacher's assessment of the student's reading, writing, thinking, speaking, listening skills and work performance. Students will be informed of the aligned quantity, weight, and due dates of assignments in each grading category as much in advance as possible.

3. Grading scales:

As AVHS is based on a point system, grades will be earned by students when they complete each set of 5 credits, at 75 points. The grades are determined by the average number of points students earn per grading period, excluding their lowest grading period.

4. Homework/outside of class practices (AR 6154):

Students are encouraged to complete all assigned coursework during their allotted class time. Typically students should be able to earn 1-2 points a day based on completion of coursework. As a rule, any work not completed in class must be completed as homework if the student wishes to earn credit at a timely pace. Alternatively, students can also utilize Period 6 to make up work after school.

8. Revision practices:

Depending on the specific assignment, revisions are encouraged to help students develop historical-thinking skills. The majority of work is eligible for revisions.

9. Extra credit practices:

Students will only be given extra work if they earn all available points in the previous grading period.

10. Additional grading practices:

For students who want to receive CP credit for this course, they must complete all of the culminating unit assessments along with regularly completing their formative coursework above proficiency.
