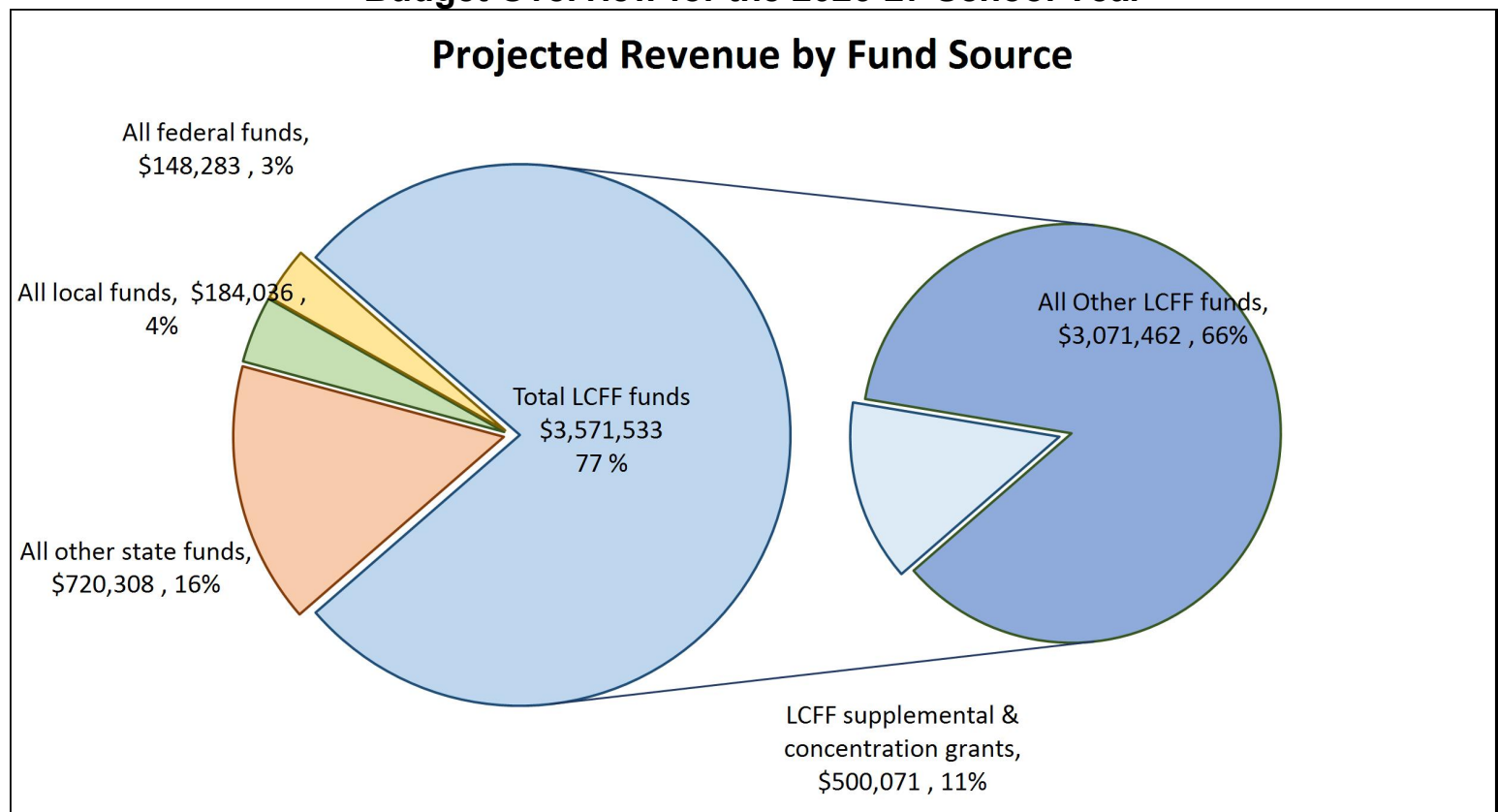

### Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

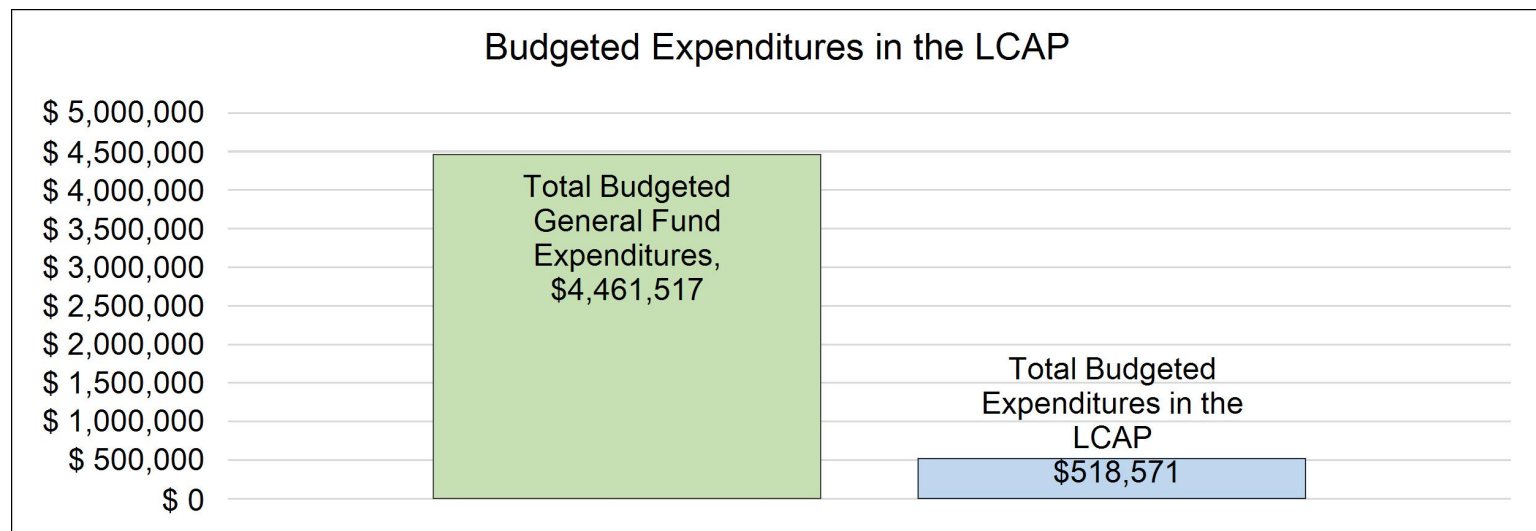


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Shaffer Union Elementary School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Shaffer Union Elementary School District is \$4,624,160, of which \$3,571,533 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$720,308 is other state funds, \$184,036 is local funds, and \$148,283 is federal funds. Of the \$3,571,533 in LCFF Funds, \$500,071 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

This chart provides a quick summary of how much Shaffer Union Elementary School District plans to spend for 2026-27. It shows how much of the total is tied to planned actions and services in the LCAP.

The text description of the above chart is as follows: Shaffer Union Elementary School District plans to spend \$4,461,517 for the 2026-27 school year. Of that amount, \$518,571 is tied to actions/services in the LCAP and \$3,942,946 is not included in the LCAP. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

General Fund expenditures not included in the LCAP primarily consisted of routine operational costs necessary to maintain the daily functioning of the district. These expenditures included utilities, insurance, transportation, facility maintenance and repairs, administrative costs, food service operations, debt obligations, and other unrestricted expenditures that support the overall operation of the school district.

Additionally, the district utilized General Fund resources for expenditures related to maintaining facilities, operational supplies, contracted services, and other costs that benefit all students but are not specifically tied to LCAP goals, actions, or services. These expenditures ensured the continued operation of district programs and services while supporting a safe, functional, and effective learning environment for students and staff.

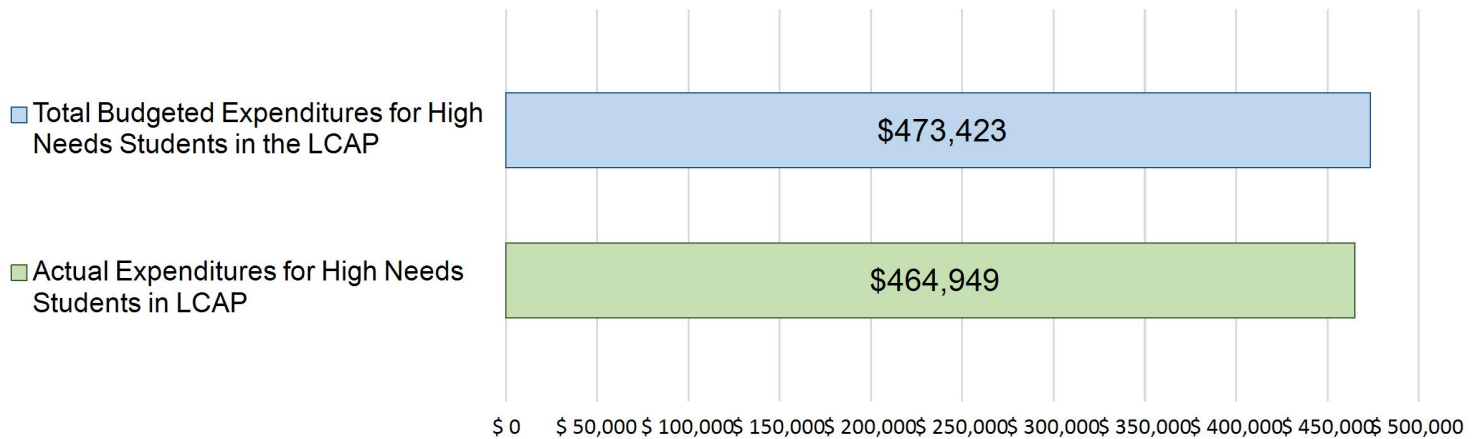
## Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

## Update on Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in 2025-26

Prior Year Expenditures: Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students



This chart compares what Shaffer Union Elementary School District budgeted last year in the LCAP for actions and services that contribute to increasing or improving services for high needs students with what Shaffer Union Elementary School District estimates it has spent on actions and services that contribute to increasing or improving services for high needs students in the current year.

The text description of the above chart is as follows: In 2025-26, Shaffer Union Elementary School District's LCAP budgeted \$473,423 for planned actions to increase or improve services for high needs students. Shaffer Union Elementary School District actually spent \$464,949 for actions to increase or improve services for high needs students in 2025-26.

The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$8,474 had the following impact on Shaffer Union Elementary School District's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

The total actual expenditures for actions and services to increase or improve services for high needs students were slightly lower than originally budgeted due to some planned activities and purchases not being fully implemented during the year. While all major actions remained in place, including technology support, paraprofessional staffing, class size reduction, and student intervention programs, certain enrichment opportunities, incentives, and supplemental supports were utilized at lower levels than anticipated.

The difference in expenditures had minimal impact on the overall implementation of services. High needs students continued to receive academic interventions, technology access, individualized support, and expanded learning opportunities throughout the year. The district recognizes that additional enrichment activities and attendance incentives could have further strengthened student engagement and school connectedness and plans to fully utilize these resources in future years. Overall, the district was able to maintain the intended level of support for English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low Income students while continuing progress toward improved academic outcomes, attendance, and student engagement.

## Plan Summary [2026-27]

### General Information

As of the start of the 2026/2027 school year, Shaffer Union Elementary School District (SUESD) continues to serve as a cornerstone of education in Litchfield, California, within Lassen County. SUESD educates approximately 246 students in grades Transitional Kindergarten through 8th and remains committed to providing high quality instruction and comprehensive support to a diverse student population.

According to the California School Dashboard, the current demographics reflect the following: 61.8% of students are socioeconomically disadvantaged, 2.8% are English Learners, 0.4% are foster youth, 0.4% are experiencing homelessness, and 12.6% qualify for special education services. Student ethnicity data reflects 68.3% White, 21.1% Hispanic, 6.1% Two or More Races, 2.4% American Indian, 1.6% African American, and 0.4% Asian students. The instructional team includes 12 classroom teachers and 1 special education/intervention teacher and one music teacher. Instructional support is strengthened by paraprofessionals, including bilingual support staff. Classified staff members ensure the continued operation of critical services across campus. The superintendent/principal leads district efforts, aligning programs and operations with strategic goals and state accountability standards.

SUESD sustains multiple initiatives that prioritize student achievement and student well being. Daily breakfast and lunch, including salad bar options, are served in the cafeteria. Tutoring in English Language Arts and Mathematics is available before and after school, with additional supports for English Learners and students identified for academic interventions through Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) funds. Local partnerships ensure wraparound support for homeless and high need students. The district also works closely with local preschools to support a successful transition into Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten.

Support for students advancing to high school remains a priority. SUESD and Lassen High School District collaborate to ensure a smooth transition from 8th to 9th grade. This includes high school staff visits, enrollment support, and orientation opportunities. Efforts are made to meet the unique needs of students with IEPs, 504 Plans, and English Learner profiles.

Extracurricular programs continue to enhance the student experience. Students participate in the Lassen County Elementary Athletic League sports seasons, including cross country, volleyball, basketball, track and field, and flag football. Academic accomplishments are recognized through Pride assemblies and trimester awards celebrations.

Students also benefit from annual field experiences to destinations such as Wemple Farms, Hole in One Ranch, the Biz Johnson Trail, and educational and cultural institutions in Redding and Reno. Participation in Lassen County Office of Education events further enriches student learning and engagement.

The Parent Teacher Organization remains a strong partner in supporting classrooms, coordinating field trips, organizing events, and sponsoring behavior incentive programs. SUESD continues to prioritize family involvement and recognizes that scheduling conflicts and transportation barriers can limit participation for some families. Flexible engagement opportunities continue to be developed through varied event times, communication methods, and family activities.

Communication strategies include annual notices, monthly newsletters, social media, the district website, phone calls, and weekly student bulletins. The district also offers adult education opportunities, including English language, literacy, and Citizenship classes in the evenings to support broader community needs.

The SUESD campus continues to function as a true community hub, hosting events ranging from recreational programs to community meetings, supporting not only students but families and local residents as well.

Major facilities improvements continue across the district, including the construction of a new Transitional Kindergarten building and the installation of a modern septic system. In response to ongoing staffing shortages impacting rural schools across California, SUESD continues recruiting qualified educators, including internationally recruited teachers, to ensure consistent, high quality instruction in every classroom.

SUESD does not receive Equity Multiplier funds.

## Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

Throughout the 2025/2026 academic year, educators at Shaffer Union Elementary School District (SUESD) remained committed to fostering a positive school culture, strengthening instructional practices, and improving student outcomes. A continued focus was placed on improving student reading proficiency and overall academic achievement through the implementation of the Professional Learning Community (PLC) model. Weekly collaboration meetings allowed staff to analyze student data, align curriculum and essential standards, develop targeted interventions, and strengthen Response to Intervention (RTI) supports for individual student needs.

Recognizing the increasing social emotional and mental health needs of students, SUESD continued to expand counseling and wellness supports for students and families. Partnerships with local agencies, including the Lassen County Sheriff's Office and Lassen County Office of Education, continued to support efforts related to student attendance, student safety, and interventions for at risk student populations, including English Learners, Foster Youth, homeless students, and socioeconomically disadvantaged students.

The district continued investing in campus improvements and student engagement initiatives. Facility improvements included continued work on the new Transitional Kindergarten building project and septic system upgrades. SUESD also expanded opportunities for student engagement through athletics, assemblies, House Team competitions, field trips, and schoolwide positive behavior activities designed to improve school connectedness and student morale.

The district continued implementation of its Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) framework and revised behavior systems to better promote student accountability, positive decision making, and recognition of student success. The House Team system remained a significant part of school culture, fostering leadership, collaboration, and school pride among students across all grade levels.

California School Dashboard (2025) data continued to highlight areas of both growth and need. SUESD maintained focus on improving academic achievement in English Language Arts and Mathematics while addressing areas identified for improvement, including chronic absenteeism (SED, SWD, White) and suspension rates (Hispanic, SED, SWD, White) student groups. Reducing chronic absenteeism and strengthening student engagement will remain major priorities moving forward.

Academic performance data, including NWEA MAP assessments and local benchmark data, demonstrated continued growth in both Math and English Language Arts. This progress reflected the district's continued commitment to evidence based instructional strategies, targeted intervention supports, after school tutoring opportunities, and professional development focused on effective instructional practices and technology integration. Staff continued training in programs and strategies designed to support literacy, writing, and differentiated instruction.

Support for English Learners continued through targeted intervention services, instructional supports, designated ELD instruction, after school academic assistance, and annual ELPAC meetings with families to review student progress and language acquisition goals.

Looking ahead, SUESD will continue refining and strengthening the PLC process to ensure instructional consistency, high expectations, and academic excellence for all students. The district remains committed to high quality professional development, data informed decision making, rigorous standards aligned curriculum, and providing equitable opportunities for all students.

As SUESD enters the 2026/2027 school year, the district's mission remains clear: to provide every student with equitable opportunities for success through continuous improvement, strong relationships, and student centered learning.

Additionally, the district does not have any unexpended Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds.

SUESD receives training and support from the Lassen County Office of Education (LCOE) to address attendance issues identified through the California Dashboard (2025) due to students with disabilities and Hispanic student subgroups being in DA for chronic absenteeism and suspensions. SUESD will continue collaborating with LCOE to analyze the underlying causes of suspensions and attendance problems. Once these issues are thoroughly understood, SUESD will develop and implement a strategic plan, with ongoing support from LCOE, to improve student attendance and reduce suspensions. Goal 1 action 3 and goal 3 action 4 will be focusing on these needs.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

The development of the 2026/2027 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) for Shaffer Union Elementary School District (SUESD) was significantly influenced by feedback and input provided by a wide range of educational partners. The district remained committed to ensuring meaningful stakeholder engagement throughout the development process so that the LCAP reflects the priorities and needs of students, staff, families, and the broader community.

Feedback Collection Process:



Monthly School Site Council and Parent Advisory Meetings continued to provide structured opportunities for parents, staff, teachers, administrators, and community members to discuss concerns, priorities, and recommendations regarding district programs and student achievement.

Open House events, board meetings, athletic events, assemblies, and other school activities provided additional opportunities for informal and formal feedback from families and community members throughout the school year.

Surveys, including the California Healthy Kids Survey, local stakeholder surveys, and self reflection tools, were utilized to gather input from students, staff, and families related to school climate, student engagement, safety, communication, and academic support systems.

Direct consultations, meetings, phone calls, and emails with parents of students with disabilities, advocates, and families of unduplicated pupils helped ensure that the needs of English Learners, Foster Youth, homeless students, and students with disabilities were considered throughout the LCAP development process.

#### Key Areas Influenced by Stakeholder Feedback:

**Academic Support and Interventions:** Parents, teachers, and staff emphasized the continued importance of targeted academic interventions and individualized support systems. As a result, the district will continue after school tutoring programs, small group interventions, Response to Intervention (RTI) supports, and Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) services focused on English Language Arts and Mathematics.

**Social Emotional and Mental Health Supports:** Stakeholder feedback highlighted the increasing social emotional and behavioral needs of students. SUESD will continue counseling services, student wellness supports, and partnerships with outside agencies to provide behavioral interventions, attendance support, and mental health resources for students and families.

**Technology Integration and Instructional Resources:** Families and staff expressed continued support for classroom technology upgrades and instructional technology tools. The district will continue investing in classroom technology, interactive instructional displays, student devices, and professional development focused on effective technology integration into classroom instruction.

**Behavioral Support Systems and School Culture:** Feedback regarding student behavior, school climate, and student engagement resulted in continued refinement of the district's Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) systems and Positive Behavior Plan. The House Team program will continue to expand opportunities for student leadership, school connectedness, and positive school culture development.

**Support for English Learners:** Stakeholders expressed the importance of maintaining designated ELD supports, intervention opportunities, and tutoring services for English Learners. In response, the district will continue targeted instructional supports, ELPAC review meetings with families, and interventions designed to improve language acquisition and academic achievement.

#### Continuous Improvement and Monitoring:

Data informed decision making continues to remain a major priority throughout the district. Stakeholders reinforced the importance of analyzing student achievement data and monitoring progress through Professional Learning Community (PLC) collaboration meetings. Staff will continue reviewing NWEA MAP data, California School Dashboard indicators, attendance data, behavior data, and local assessment results to guide instructional decisions and interventions.

Professional development opportunities requested by staff will continue to focus on effective instructional practices, standards aligned instruction, literacy strategies, technology integration, student engagement, and differentiated supports for diverse learners.

Facility improvement priorities identified through community feedback will continue to guide ongoing campus improvements, including classroom modernization projects, updated student and staff technology, and facility upgrades associated with the Transitional Kindergarten expansion project.

#### Transparent Communication and Accountability:

SUESD will continue maintaining consistent communication with educational partners through newsletters, social media updates, phone calls, the district website, parent meetings, and public board meetings. The district remains committed to transparency and ensuring stakeholders have multiple opportunities to provide feedback regarding district goals, actions, and expenditures.

The School Site Council and Parent Advisory Committee reviewed the LCAP throughout the development process and provided recommendations prior to final approval. Educational partner input helped shape district priorities and ensure alignment with identified student and community needs.

#### Looking Ahead:

For the 2026/2027 LCAP, the district will continue several actions and services that demonstrated positive impact on student achievement, school climate, and operational effectiveness, including:

Action 1.1 (Facilities): Continued facility improvements and campus modernization efforts guided by identified facility needs and Williams inspection findings.

Action 1.2 (Technology): Continued support for classroom technology, student devices, infrastructure upgrades, and instructional technology integration.

Action 1.4 (Teacher Induction Program): Ongoing support for new teachers through mentoring, induction participation, and professional growth opportunities.

Action 2.2 (Professional Development): Continued implementation of professional development opportunities focused on standards aligned instruction, data analysis, literacy, technology integration, and evidence based instructional practices.

Action 3.7 (Counseling Services): Continued counseling and wellness services to support student social emotional well being, attendance improvement, and behavioral intervention needs.

As SUESD enters the 2026/2027 school year, the district remains committed to continuous improvement, equitable opportunities for students, strong stakeholder collaboration, and providing a safe, engaging, and supportive educational environment for all students.

## Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

### Goal Analysis [2025–26]

Shaffer Union Elementary School District successfully implemented the actions and services associated with Goal 1 during the 2025–2026 school year. The district maintained 100% appropriately credentialed and assigned teachers and continued to provide all students with access to standards-aligned instructional materials. No Williams deficiencies were identified related to instructional materials, and all students had access to the resources necessary to participate fully in the educational program.

The district continued investing in professional development, instructional support, intervention services, technology access, and data-driven instructional practices. Staff utilized NWEA MAP assessment data, classroom assessments, and collaborative planning processes to identify student needs and adjust instruction accordingly. Teachers participated in professional learning opportunities focused on effective instructional strategies, data analysis, intervention implementation, and student engagement.

A significant success during the 2025–2026 school year was the improvement in student academic growth. NWEA Language Usage growth increased from the 38th percentile in 2024–2025 to the 53rd percentile in 2025–2026, exceeding the district goal of reaching the 50th percentile. Similarly, NWEA Reading growth improved from the 38th percentile to the 56th percentile, also surpassing the district's target. These gains reflect the positive impact of targeted interventions, instructional improvements, and increased use of assessment data to guide instruction.

The district maintained stable staffing and continued to provide access to a broad course of study for all students. English Learner progress toward English proficiency remained relatively consistent at 21%, slightly above previous years. While English Learner reclassification rates increased modestly from baseline levels, the district recognizes the need for continued focus on language acquisition supports and reclassification efforts to meet long-term goals.

Facilities conditions remained largely unchanged from previous years. While the district maintained safe and functional learning environments, Williams facility ratings continued to identify areas rated as fair rather than good. Facility improvements remain a priority as funding opportunities become available.

Overall, the district successfully implemented the planned actions associated with Goal 1 and achieved measurable improvements in student academic growth. Continued emphasis on instructional quality, intervention supports, English Learner services, and facility improvements will remain important as the district works toward sustaining and expanding these gains in future years.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several material differences existed between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures during the 2025–2026 school year.

For Action 1.1, expenditures exceeded the budget due to a larger than anticipated facilities security project. Additional funds were required to complete campus lock and security improvements. This was a one time expense and is not expected to continue in future years.

For Action 1.2, expenditures were lower than originally budgeted. Funds allocated for technology replacement were not fully utilized during the school year. These funds will be carried forward and utilized during the 2026–2027 school year to purchase replacement computers and technology devices for students.

For Action 1.3, expenditures were underspent by approximately \$7,496. This was a one time expense and is not expected to continue in future years.

The district remains committed to utilizing these resources to support student achievement, staff development, and the continued improvement of educational programs and services.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under Goal 1 contributed to improved student outcomes and strengthened the district's educational program. The continued use of NWEA MAP assessments, regular data analysis, intervention services, and professional development provided staff with the tools needed to identify student needs and adjust instruction throughout the year. These efforts resulted in academic growth that exceeded district targets in both Reading and Language Usage.

Investments in staffing, instructional materials, and technology were effective in ensuring that students had consistent access to high quality instruction and standards-aligned curriculum. Maintaining fully credentialed teaching staff and access to instructional resources supported the district's ability to provide a stable learning environment and implement instructional programs with fidelity.

Professional development focused on instructional practices, assessment data, and intervention strategies proved beneficial as teachers increasingly utilized student performance data to guide classroom instruction and provide targeted support. The district also saw continued benefits from maintaining intervention opportunities and monitoring student progress throughout the school year.

Some actions produced more limited results. While English Learner students continued to receive designated supports and language development services, growth in English proficiency and reclassification rates remained relatively flat. This suggests that additional strategies may be necessary to accelerate language acquisition and support students in meeting reclassification criteria.

Facility-related actions were effective in maintaining safe and operational school facilities; however, they were less effective in advancing facility ratings toward the district's desired outcomes. Future facility improvements will likely depend on available funding sources and long-term maintenance planning.

Overall, the district's instructional and student support actions demonstrated the greatest impact on progress toward the goal, while English Learner outcomes and facility improvements remain areas requiring continued focus and refinement.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on the review of student achievement data, stakeholder feedback, and implementation outcomes from the 2025–2026 school year, no significant changes were made to the overall goal. The district will continue to prioritize academic achievement, access to high quality instruction, and equitable educational opportunities for all students.

Several actions have been refined to better address identified areas of need. Additional emphasis will be placed on strengthening mathematics and English Language Arts instruction through targeted interventions, expanded use of assessment data, and continued professional development focused on evidence-based instructional practices. The district will also continue efforts to improve outcomes for English Learners through enhanced language development supports and closer monitoring of student progress toward proficiency and reclassification.

Metrics and target outcomes remain largely unchanged, as current data indicates that the selected measures continue to provide meaningful information regarding student performance and program effectiveness. However, the district will continue to analyze local assessment data, stakeholder survey results, attendance trends, and other indicators to ensure actions remain responsive to student needs.

Reflections on prior practice reinforced the importance of maintaining intervention services, supporting teacher professional growth, utilizing data-driven decision making, and strengthening communication with families. These areas will continue to serve as priorities in the coming year as the district works to sustain academic gains and address ongoing areas for growth.

## Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Shaffer Union Elementary School District implemented the majority of the actions and services associated with Goal 2 as planned during the 2025–2026 school year. The district continued to focus on providing a safe and supportive learning environment, increasing student engagement, improving attendance, implementing state standards, and promoting positive school culture through ongoing programs, activities, and student supports.

The district maintained regular attendance monitoring, parent communication efforts, student recognition programs, counseling services, student leadership opportunities, and family engagement activities designed to strengthen school connectedness. Staff continued to receive

professional development aligned with state standards and instructional best practices, resulting in improved implementation ratings across multiple academic content areas.

A significant change during the 2025–2026 school year was the transition from the California Healthy Kids Survey to the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey. This locally developed survey provided data more closely aligned to the district's goals and priorities while establishing new baseline measures related to student engagement, school climate, safety, motivation, and staff perceptions. As a result, some metrics cannot be directly compared to prior years, but the new data provides more targeted information for future planning and continuous improvement efforts.

The district experienced success in maintaining a zero percent middle school dropout rate and continued progress in reducing chronic absenteeism compared to baseline levels. Implementation of attendance interventions, communication with families, and student support systems contributed to these outcomes. Additionally, the district demonstrated growth in the implementation of state academic standards, reflecting the effectiveness of ongoing professional learning and instructional support.

Challenges continued in the areas of student attendance, student motivation, and school climate. Average attendance remained below the district target, and stakeholder survey results indicate that additional efforts are needed to strengthen student engagement, increase student voice in decision making, and improve perceptions regarding academic success and school connectedness. These areas will remain priorities as the district continues refining programs and supports to better meet the needs of students and families.

Overall, the district successfully implemented the planned actions associated with Goal 2 and gained valuable information through the new stakeholder survey process. The results will help guide future actions aimed at improving student engagement, attendance, school culture, and educational outcomes.

#### An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several material differences existed between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures during the 2025–2026 school year.

For Action 2.1, expenditures were approximately \$5,000 lower than budgeted. These funds were not fully utilized during the school year and will be available to support student enrichment and supplemental intervention.

For Action 2.2, expenditures exceeded the original budget due to negotiated salary increases and related personnel costs that were higher than initially projected.

For Action 2.4, expenditures were consistent with the approved budget, and no material difference existed between budgeted and actual expenditures.

The district will continue to monitor expenditures closely to ensure resources are aligned with student needs and district priorities.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions and services associated with Goal 2 have demonstrated varying levels of effectiveness. Efforts focused on standards implementation, attendance monitoring, family communication, student support services, and school climate initiatives have contributed to maintaining a safe and supportive learning environment while supporting student success.

Actions related to professional development and standards implementation were effective, as evidenced by improved Local Indicator ratings across English Language Arts, English Language Development, Science, and History Social Science. Staff demonstrated increased capacity to implement state standards and utilize instructional practices aligned with district expectations.

Attendance-focused actions produced mixed results. While average daily attendance remained below the district's target, chronic absenteeism remains significantly lower than baseline levels. This suggests that attendance interventions, family outreach efforts, and student support systems have had a positive impact, although continued attention is needed to further improve student attendance and reduce chronic absenteeism.

The district's efforts to maintain student engagement and connectedness were effective in supporting a zero percent middle school dropout rate and maintaining opportunities for student participation in school activities, leadership opportunities, athletics, music, and extracurricular programs. These opportunities continue to provide students with meaningful connections to school.

The implementation of the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey provided valuable baseline data regarding school climate, student engagement, safety, and staff perceptions. Survey results indicate that additional work is needed to strengthen student voice, student motivation, perceptions of academic success, and overall school connectedness. While many supports are in place, the data suggests that these actions have not yet resulted in the level of impact desired by the district.

Overall, the most effective actions were those related to standards implementation, student support systems, and attendance interventions. Areas identified for continued improvement include increasing student engagement, strengthening school climate, improving attendance outcomes, and creating additional opportunities for students to actively participate in school decision making and leadership activities.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on stakeholder feedback, attendance data, school climate information, and implementation results from the 2025–2026 school year, the district will maintain the overall focus of Goal 2 action 1 by ensuring the programs and support allow for student success. The transition to the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey provided more targeted information regarding student engagement, school climate, safety, and staff perceptions, resulting in the establishment of new baseline data for several metrics.

Reflections on prior practice highlighted the need for increased emphasis on student voice, student motivation, school connectedness, and attendance improvement. As a result, the district will continue expanding opportunities for student leadership, participation in decision making, and engagement in school activities. Additional efforts will also focus on strengthening positive behavior supports, student recognition programs, and strategies that promote a positive and inclusive school culture.

The district will continue implementing attendance interventions and family outreach efforts while exploring additional strategies to address chronic absenteeism and improve overall attendance rates. Ongoing collaboration with families, community partners, and student support personnel will remain an important component of these efforts.

No significant changes were made to the overall goal. However, several metrics were updated to reflect the transition from the California Healthy Kids Survey to the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey. These revised metrics provide more locally relevant data and will allow the district to better monitor progress toward improving student engagement, school climate, safety, and academic readiness over time.

The district will continue to monitor implementation through stakeholder feedback, attendance data, local indicators, and survey results to ensure actions remain responsive to the needs of students, staff, and families.

## Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Shaffer Union Elementary School District successfully implemented the majority of the actions and services associated with Goal 3 during the 2025–2026 school year. The district continued to focus on maintaining safe schools, strengthening positive student behavior, supporting student social-emotional well-being, reducing disciplinary incidents, and increasing family engagement and participation in school programs.

The district maintained counseling services, student support systems, attendance and behavior monitoring practices, family engagement activities, parent communication systems, and opportunities for student involvement in extracurricular programs, athletics, music, leadership activities, and community events. School staff continued to emphasize relationship building, positive behavior supports, and early intervention strategies to address student needs before they escalated into more significant disciplinary concerns.

A notable success was the continued reduction in student suspension rates. The district's suspension rate declined from 14.4% in 2023 to 8% in 2025, surpassing the district's target of 10%. Additionally, the district maintained a 0% expulsion rate, reflecting the effectiveness of intervention strategies, restorative practices, counseling supports, and collaborative problem solving efforts with students and families.

Family engagement efforts continued through School Site Council, Parent Advisory Committee meetings, PTO activities, parent conferences, school events, and regular communication with families. Local Indicator ratings demonstrate that the district has achieved full implementation and sustainability in building the capacity of families to engage in advisory groups and decision making processes. The district also maintained strong implementation in providing families with information and resources to support student learning and development.

A significant change during the 2025–2026 school year was the transition from the California Healthy Kids Survey to the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey for several school climate and engagement measures. This shift established new baseline data related to family perceptions, student well-being, and school climate. While the new survey limits direct year-to-year comparisons in some areas, it provides more locally relevant information to guide future planning.

Challenges remain related to student social-emotional wellness and student perceptions of adult relationships on campus. Survey results indicate that some students continue to experience difficulties managing stress and anxiety, while perceptions of strong adult connections varied across grade levels. These findings reinforce the importance of maintaining counseling supports, social-emotional learning opportunities, and relationship-building efforts throughout the school community.

Overall, the district successfully implemented the planned actions associated with Goal 3. Positive outcomes in student discipline and family engagement demonstrate meaningful progress, while social-emotional wellness and student connectedness remain important areas for continued attention and improvement.

#### An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several material differences existed between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures during the 2025–2026 school year.

For Action 3.1, expenditures were approximately \$3,000 lower than budgeted. The district had planned additional student incentive and recognition activities that were not fully implemented during the school year. The district plans to expand these efforts in future years to further support student engagement and positive school culture.

For Action 3.2, expenditures exceeded the budget by approximately \$2,046. The district utilized additional counseling services beyond what was originally anticipated to meet student needs. Beginning in the 2026–2027 school year, the district will transition to a part time on site counseling model, resulting in increased costs and expanded student support services.

For Action 3.3, expenditures were approximately \$1,200 lower than budgeted. The district had planned additional community engagement and outreach activities that were not fully implemented during the school year. The district intends to expand community involvement opportunities and partnerships in future years.

For Action 3.4, expenditures were lower than budgeted as the district did not fully utilize available funds for attendance incentives, student recognition programs, and schoolwide engagement events. Additional incentive options and campus events could have been implemented to further encourage positive attendance. Given that attendance continues to be an area of focus, the district plans to increase the use of these resources during the 2026–2027 school year to support improved student attendance and engagement.

The district remains committed to evaluating program effectiveness and ensuring resources are strategically utilized to meet student and community needs.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions and services associated with Goal 3 have been effective in improving school safety, reducing student discipline incidents, and strengthening family engagement opportunities. The most significant evidence of effectiveness is the continued reduction in suspension rates, which decreased from 14.4% at baseline to 8% in 2025. This improvement suggests that behavior interventions, counseling supports, positive behavior systems, and proactive communication with families are contributing to a more positive school environment.

The district's efforts to prevent student exclusion from school were also effective, as demonstrated by maintaining a 0% expulsion rate. Staff have continued to utilize intervention strategies and student support systems that allow behavioral concerns to be addressed while keeping students engaged in school.

Family engagement actions have shown positive results as evidenced by the district achieving a Level 5 rating in building family capacity and supporting participation in advisory groups and decision making. Families continue to participate in School Site Council, Parent Advisory Committee meetings, PTO activities, parent conferences, and school events. The district also maintained a strong rating in providing families with information and resources to support student learning at home.

The effectiveness of actions related to student well-being and school climate produced mixed results. While many supports remain in place, survey results indicate that a significant number of students continue to report challenges related to stress, anxiety, and emotional wellness. Student perceptions regarding caring adult relationships also varied across grade levels, with some groups reporting lower levels of connectedness than desired. These findings suggest that existing supports are beneficial but may not yet be sufficient to meet the needs of all students.

The implementation of the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey provided new baseline information regarding parent perceptions of school climate and family engagement. These results will help the district better target future actions and monitor progress in areas that were not previously measured through local survey tools.

Overall, Goal 3 actions have been most effective in reducing disciplinary incidents, maintaining safe learning environments, and strengthening family engagement systems. Continued focus is needed in the areas of student connectedness, social-emotional wellness, and ensuring that every student feels supported by caring adults on campus.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on stakeholder feedback, discipline data, student wellness information, and family engagement results, the district will maintain the overall focus of Goal 3 action 2 and getting a part time in person counselor to support student social-emotional needs and strengthen school connectedness.

The most significant change involves the adoption of the Lassen County Office of Education stakeholder survey metrics, which replaced several California Healthy Kids Survey measures during the 2025–2026 school year. These updated metrics provide more locally relevant data regarding student well-being, school climate, family engagement, and perceptions of school safety. As a result, new baseline data has been established and will be used to monitor future progress.

Reflections on student survey results highlighted the need for continued emphasis on social-emotional supports, student wellness, and positive adult-student relationships. The district will continue to provide counseling services, student support programs, and social-emotional learning opportunities while exploring additional strategies to strengthen student connectedness and improve student perceptions of support from trusted adults on campus.

The district will also continue implementing family engagement activities and communication strategies that have contributed to strong Local Indicator ratings. Efforts to increase family participation and collaboration in school decision making will remain a priority.

No significant changes were made to the overall goal. However, actions supporting student wellness, relationship building, and school climate will receive increased attention as the district works to build upon successes in discipline reduction while addressing areas identified through stakeholder feedback and survey data.

- **LCFF Carryover — Percentage:** Specify the LCFF Carryover — Percentage identified in the LCFF Carryover Table from the prior LCAP year. If a carryover percentage is not identified in the LCFF Carryover Table, specify a percentage of zero (0.00%).
- **Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year:** This percentage will not be entered; it is calculated based on the Projected Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year and the LCFF Carryover —

Percentage. ***This is the percentage by which the LEA must increase or improve services for unduplicated pupils as compared to the services provided to all students in the coming LCAP year.***

  - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
  - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

### **Contributing Actions Annual Update Table**

Pursuant to EC Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
  - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

## **LCFF Carryover Table**

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
  - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
  - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**

- If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.
