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Getting Ready for Kindergarten (K) A Family Checklist for Incoming Kindergarten Students

We're excited to welcome your child to Kindergarten this August! While our classrooms are warm, nurturing, and full of joyful learning experiences, Kindergarten is not a play-based environment. Families should expect an age-appropriate level of structure, routine, and academic readiness as part of the school day.

Our Kindergarten program balances exploration and hands-on activities with early skill development in language, math, social-emotional growth, and independence. Below is a list of helpful skills and habits that support a confident transition into K. Every child develops at their own pace—this list is simply a guide to help you prepare your child for the exciting year ahead.

1. Social	l & Emotional Readiness
	Can separate easily from parents or caregivers at drop-off
	Takes turns, shares materials, and cooperates in small groups
	Manages and can name basic feelings and needs using words or by asking an adult for nelp
□ I	Demonstrates kindness, empathy, and respect for others
	Wins and loses gracefully
□ I	Listens and follows two- or three-step directions
	Listens to a short story without interrupting
	Understands the adults they will interact with on campus (teachers, principal, staff) and knows they are safe people to go to for help
	Understands that it's okay to go to the nurse if they do not feel well and that they will not be getting shots
	Shows curiosity and a positive attitude toward learning
2. Indep	oendence & Self-Management
a f	Bathroom skills – student does not wear a pull-up get on and off the toilet without assistance, wipe effectively and with an appropriate amount of toilet paper, flush without ear, pull up and button/snap pants, keep bathroom/stall door shut while in use, keep blothes on until door is closed
	Wash hands, wipe face, and blow nose, (cough, sneeze into elbow)
	Takes care of personal belongings (coat, backpack, lunchbox)
	Opens food containers and manages lunchtime tasks, can drink from a cup/container Follows simple classroom routines (lining up, cleaning up)
3. Early	Language & Literacy
□ F	Recognizes and can write first name using correct letter case
□ F	Recognizes most uppercase and some lowercase letters
□ I	dentifies the beginning sound in familiar words
□ I	Holds a book correctly and knows that text moves left to right
□ F	Recognizes some common sight words (e.g., "the," "and," "is")

4. Early Math & Number Sense	
☐ Counts to at least 20 and recognizes numbers 0–10	
☐ Understands that numbers represent quantities ("5" means five things)	
☐ Can compare small groups (more/less/same)	
☐ Recognizes and names basic shapes and colors	
☐ Sorts, classifies, and patterns objects by size, color, or type	
☐ Understands position words (over, under, next to, behind)	
5. Fine & Gross Motor Skills	
☐ Holds a pencil, crayon, or marker with correct finger grip	
☐ Cuts along lines or around shapes using child scissors	
☐ Draws simple pictures and basic shapes (circle, square, triangle)	
☐ Can run, jump, hop, and skip with balance and coordination	
☐ Catches, throws, or kicks a ball with reasonable control	
6. Thinking, Curiosity & Problem-Solving	
☐ Asks questions about how things work or why things happen	
☐ Tries different ways to solve problems before asking for help	
☐ Stays focused on a task for 10–15 minutes	
☐ Takes pride in completing work and learning new things	
7. Family Tips for Readiness	
☐ Read with your child daily and talk about stories and pictures	
☐ Practice name writing, counting, and letter sounds in fun ways	
☐ Encourage independence through chores and daily routines	
☐ Provide opportunities for play with other children	
☐ Talk positively about Kindergarten and what to expect	

If, after reviewing this list, you notice that your child is missing *several* of these readiness skills, it may be a sign that they could benefit from additional support before the start of school. While children grow and develop at different rates, these foundational skills are important for a successful transition into a Kindergarten classroom, where routines, independence, and early academic learning are an expectation and part of the daily experience.
