### Coaches Handbook- Board Approved July 2024

**Post-Season Play Requirements**: In order for a ENHS team to be eligible to compete in the NSCIF post season playoffs in Team Sports (Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Baseball, and Softball) the team must meet a minimum requirement in at least one of the three criteria prior to the NSCIF opt out date determined for each sport season. (This is typically a couple days prior to the seeding committee meeting and may be before the last scheduled contest).

- a. Win at least half of their overall matches (excluding league matches against higher division opponents).
- b. Win at least half of their league matches.
- c. Win at least half of their division matches.

\*\* This policy at one time matched the Northern Section Playoff criteria that was in place for a majority of sports except boys basketball. Currently Northern Section Playoff qualification criteria differ from sport to sport. Here are the current guidelines for the sports we offer;

<u>Football</u>- 3 wins are required to qualify as playoff eligible. From the teams that qualify the top 8 in Div 4 will be selected and put into playoff bracket.

<u>Basketball</u>- Each division will have a 16-team bracket regardless of number of schools in the division. All schools will qualify regardless of record.

<u>Baseball/Softball</u>- For the first time, the criteria for baseball and softball match each other.

### I. DIVISIONS

- Division II will constitute the top 8 teams
- Division III will constitute the next 8 teams
- Division IV will constitute the next 10 teams
- Division V will constitute the next 10 teams
- Division VI will constitute all remaining teams
- Division VII will constitute teams opting out of Division 6 who meet Division VII criteria.\*\*

Division II will be a 6 team playoff bracket

Division III will be a 6 team playoff bracket

Division IV will be an 8 team playoff bracket

Division V will be an 8 team playoff bracket

Division VI will be an 8 team playoff bracket

Volleyball- In order to qualify for section playoffs, teams must meet one of the following three criteria:

- a. Win at least half of their overall matches (excluding league matches against higher division opponents).
- b. Win at least half of their league matches.
- c. Win at least half of their division matches.


The NSCIF Volleyball brackets will be flexible: If a school qualifies with the above criteria, then they will be seeded into the playoff bracket.

Common Northern Section Guideline that exists in all team sports guidelines. The basic premise for all divisions is that the League finish is the most important part of the regular season for any team. Therefore, teams will not be seeded out of their league finish (e.g., a third place team will not be seeded ahead of a second place team from the same league, however, a 2nd place team from one league may be seeded below a 4th place team from another league).

\*\*In regards to the school policy of a .500 record to qualify for playoffs, the ENJUHSD board determined that the decision whether to allow a team who currently does not meet .500 requirements by the opt out date is a decision determined by the coach, athletic director and Principal/Superintendent based on factors as potential for reaching .500 by playoffs and consideration of factors such as injuries, trend of competitiveness, potential seeding expectations, strength or lack of division/league/non-league scheduling etc.



5. <a href="PUBLIC COMMENT">PUBLIC COMMENT</a> (Request to move Reports/Updates before presentations, add Activities Director)

J. Malone stated the Parking is better, but there's room for improvement. Would like to see more gravel added to the parking lot so that it is not as muddy. Wants to know if we can install cameras in gym, would like to have them outside also. There have been some fights but with no cameras being available they are not able to know exactly what happened.

### 6. PRESENTATION / DISCUSSION

- 6.1 2025-2026 District of Choice Report Stinson required to file report with State by October 15th.
- 6.2 Outline of differences between Inter-District and District of Choice Stinson provided a handout showing enrollment variances over the years, including background, history, and a timeline. Moore asked how, in 2015, the district reduced DOC (District of Choice) enrollment to zero. Stinson explained that the Board at that time directed the Superintendent not to accept DOC students. IDT (Interdistrict Transfer) previously allowed more flexibility, but that is no longer the case. Engler noted that the Board is required to annually establish how many DOC students will be accepted. Van Dyke cautioned that removing ourselves from the DOC program would be "shooting ourselves in the foot." She added that IDT no longer functions as it once did, while the district might want to be selective, it no longer has that same discretion. Stinson added that the district previously denied applicants who did not meet specific criteria, such as behavior, attendance or grades. In 2018, capacity was maintained. Fales discussed enrollment by zip code, noting the loss of approximately 15-20 students due to limited space in sports. He expressed concern that in-district enrollment is declining and felt that reducing DOC and IDT numbers could be a positive trend. He disagreed with increasing out-of-district enrollment and suggested setting capacity limits and revisiting the related policy. Moore emphasized that any policy changes would need to be reviewed by legal counsel, as they could affect current litigation. Gillespie reported current enrollment numbers for the feeder schools as follows: 29 as a whole class for in-district or sibling, actual counts are (PG 21, Browns 10, Marcum 21). Fales suggested that understanding the breakeven point would be helpful, noting that additional grant opportunities could help sustain programs without cuts. Engler stated that the break-even point was previously calculated at 290 students. Peterson noted that some positions were posted very late, which likely reduced the applicant pool-Jake's position, for example, was not posted until July, after most administrators had already been hired elsewhere. She added that grants are designed to enhance programs, not supplant them, and that each has clear allowable and unallowable uses. Peterson asked if there had been discussions with Nicole

since Beebe's departure, suggesting that such a conversation about IDT might help alleviate the current situation. Plumas Lake Parent (Sampley): Shared that their family chose this school because of its smaller size and strong community atmosphere. Their children have participated in school programs since age five and have always felt accepted until tonight. Expressed disappointment in feeling unwelcome despite years of support and involvement. Noted that, although a new high school is planned for Plumas Lake, it will not be completed soon, and families choose this district for the small-school environment. Fales responded that he does not want families to feel unwelcome but expressed concern about ensuring that those who are local have priority. He suggested exploring whether preferred IDT students could be prioritized. Engler asked whether there are more discipline issues among in-district or out-of-district students. Gillespie stated that, in the past two years, most issues have involved in-district students. Roddick commented that reducing enrollment might increase athletic opportunities but would not change classroom dynamics. Coach Kyler asked who would be the first to go if reductions were implemented.

- 6.2 <u>Vaping Policy Review options</u> Discussion on options provided. Moore: thinks it's all too light, life has consequences, in favor of one and done. VanDyke: doesn't believe 21 days is enough. Discussed practice vs. no practice. Lauppe: came and spoke for the coach's input. Stated he had a student last year who vaped and if he would've got a year out, he wouldn't be where he's at today. Caldwell: they're young, no one will punish them as hard as a coach. Malone: 1st offense, harsher for different areas. Parent: 1st offense, if they have a 2nd offense, do you add it. Harsher punishment for alcohol & drugs, than vape. 21 days needs to be harsher. Roddick: are we able to determine what they are vaping? Bramhill: okay with 30/45/90. VanDyke: willing to negotiate days & no practice for 1st offense (wants it to read 30 days). Bramhill: can we have sheriff come to determine whether their vape has marijuana or not? Stinson responded that we have reached out to local law enforcement and they say that they do not have the staff to meet this need. Engler: 90 on 2nd offense, but won't go to 30 on first.
- 6.3 Board Policy on Spending Limits without prior Board approval Moore: wants to see lower spending threshold, based on need, etc. Engler wants the policy tightened up. Wants to see known expenditures. Add it to the budget and spelled out on what we are spending. Any expenditure over the set threshold needs to be approved by the Board (would like a cheat sheet or different layout of expenditure report) Thoughts for Board: Non-routine large expenses must come to the Board; set parameters. Easier budget report to comprehend. (Reach out to Maggie/Marcum on expenditure reports to see what they print/use)
- Discussion re: Freshman Baseball team- Fales: Asked if the coaching stipend is required. Views 6.4 this as a one-year commitment due to the large freshman class. Noted that the Swiss Sports Club will contribute \$1,000 and possibly the Little League may also sponsor. Coach Kyler: Reported that he has held two meetings with the following interest levels: Varsity - 15 players, JV - 14 players, and Freshman - 17 players. Expressed concern about uniform costs; however, last year pull-over jerseys were purchased for \$40 each and parents covered the cost, allowing players to keep their jerseys. He noted that scheduling has been difficult due to the lack of board or administrative commitment. Other schools are interested in scheduling games but will not finalize until a freshman team is confirmed. Field availability is adequate; indoor practice time should be more available to baseball since softball already has outdoor hitting space. Neil: Mentioned that there is also outdoor hitting space for baseball and a net available somewhere on campus for use. Engler: Commented that logistically this is a challenge and asked if it could instead operate as a travel team. Coach Kyler: Responded that forming a travel team would be difficult because travel ball shuts down during the high school baseball season, so players would not participate. Moore: Noted a potential bias as he has a student involved in the program but expressed support for allowing coaches the opportunity to build the program. He is in favor of establishing a freshman baseball team. Roddick: Shared that transportation needs to be reviewed, as clubs have faced challenges when vans were unavailable. VanDyke: Expressed concern that approving this could set a precedent for other sports wanting to add freshman teams under similar circumstances. Moore: Suggested that there may be alternative ways to address transportation needs. Noted that the program has not had this many interested players in over 30 years. Coach Kyler: Reported that this is the first year of fall ball and participation has been strong. Parent: Asked what the main obstacle isbudget or player numbers. Bramhill: Asked if adding a team would maintain compliance. Coach Kyler: Reported that eight potential games are already on the schedule. Engler: Emphasized the need to review Title IX implications and noted that field maintenance would fall on the coaches. Asked how officials would be handled. Board Discussion: Consensus was to bring back a formal proposal for consideration. Board Direction: Fales – yes; VanDyke – yes; Engler – yes; Bramhill – yes; Moore – yes. The Board requested the item be brought back as an Action Item in November.

### 7. REPORTS / UPDATES

- 7.1 Athletic Director Coulter reported: Volleyball is currently in 3<sup>rd</sup> place in league, 1<sup>st</sup> in division, should be 2/3 in playoffs; Football in 4<sup>th</sup> place in league and 3<sup>rd</sup> in division. Basketball season is coming, have 28 games scheduled for girls and 27 games for boys; LOTG flyers & schedule are ready. Wrestling schedule is complete, with 2 tourneys at home. No conflicts for sports schedule. Spring schedule in the works, will be completed shortly.
- 7.2 <u>Director of Guidance</u> Gillespie reported: Welcome back dance was well attended by Frosh & Soph. Grade checks done one, some coaches want reports more often, trying to work with the coaches. SAT on Wed, PSAT on Thurs. Honor Roll/Principals List awards Friday. Progress reports will go out next week. Senior projects are good. CAASP scores going on dashboard, celebrating 3's and 4's with Chipotle lunch. Emreana Glenn got all 4's on all 3 tests!

  <u>Activities Director</u> Roddick reported: HOCO, Bonfire, a successful week with lots of participation. Floats were amazing; Massey was a big help with the cars, good feedback. Saturday dance was wonderful, over 150 attended. Blood drive on Nov. 4th, need community members, need people. Working on Thanksgiving feast. Snow Day/Talent show coming up and then Courtwarming the first week after break.
- 7.3 <u>Board of Trustees</u> Fales stated that Cooper made a good point on the # of kids per household, 1-2 kids per household and West Park is 2.5. Engler stated those numbers were negotiated 18 years ago, so they stuck with that number. Drive/Drop-off parking (Jill); Supervisor Meeting (Fales)
- Superintendent/Principal updates Stinson reported: Bus Driver position open; Admin position open; science teacher and math teacher positions open; CTE Patient Care Coordinator position open (not certificated). This month our character recognition is "S" Spirited – be enthusiastic, engaged, etc. looking for kids who exemplify this character. We are 1 of 9 districts within SCOE Group partaking in the medical insurance study. SCSOS taking care of 67% of the cost, our portion is \$2,900. Trying to find more affordable health insurance program. Nov 3rd and Nov 14th, options will be presented by consultants, then take to ENTA. Let them compare and see if they want to make a switch. Must be brought to the December Board meeting. Likely to be more significant increases. NVSIG will also be giving us proposals as well, so we can see it. No impact on the district but want to give employees that option too. Vape and cell phone issues have gotten better. Presence in the guad is there plus random restroom visits. Also, messaging is out there more. Limiting restroom use, no backpacks during breaks and lunch. Behavior issues we've been dealing with include rudeness, disrespect, disruptions and lowlevel bullying. Trying to be proactive and let kids know the expectation. We have negotiations tomorrow (11, 12 and Article 17) sun shined from last year. Flu Clinic will be on campus tomorrow from 2:30-6:00 pm, hosted by Sutter County. (ALSO: See Superintendent Notes attached) Moore: would like a discussion about how it's been going without the 3rd Administrator. Wants to know if it makes sense to fill that position. Wants to know if that money can go to the teachers. VanDyke: would like updates now and again down the road on how it's going.
