

The Glenn County Office of Education, in partnership with Glenn 2 Greatness and regional partners (WUSD is a regional partner), has begun planning the Paraprofessional Registered Youth Skills Model (PRYSM-see flyer below). This new apprenticeship program will support youth ages 16–24 by providing paid, career-connected learning, mentorship, wraparound services, and a pathway to teaching credentials. The goal is to create more opportunities for local students while strengthening the future teacher workforce. □ I have been working with Glenn2Greatness to apply for a new grant called Save the Children, part of California's Comprehensive Literacy State Development program. This grant provides funding to strengthen literacy from birth through grade 12, focusing on underserved students. Funds support evidence-based reading interventions, teacher professional development, and family engagement. Together, we are working to improve literacy across the county, beginning with WUSD and Murdock. □ Glenn2Greatness is also sponsoring 2 buses to transport our freshmen students to the annual STEM Day hosted in Anderson. □ I was also able to attend the 2025 STRIVE together Cradle to Career Convening, in Atlanta. Community Engagement We have opened the positions for our third Wellness couch and for one Bilingual parent liaison.
☐ Our first District wide CCSPP Advisory committee met and approved the budget changes for the grant and we are moving forward with our initiatives.
Community outreach- Working with NorthState together and Glenn2Greatness we have supported 8 Glenn county residents to improve their journey to further their education in either the medical field or the education field. Three of the recipients are Willows High School CTE teachers.
