### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

This English class aims to develop reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills essential to the subsequent level of English work. Specifically, students will be able to:

- 2. Draw evidence from various texts to support analysis, reflection, and research; Write routinely for multiple tasks, purposes, and audiences.
- 3. Evaluate a speaker's point of view, reasoning, and use of evidence and rhetoric.
- 4. Acquire and use general academic and domain-specific words and phrases.
- 5. Prepare for and participate in classroom conversations and collaborations.
- 6. Structure asynchronous time to complete and submit quality work demonstrating mastery of content standards.

Each category is weighted by the points assigned. Each point represents 30 minutes of work (excluding instructional time). Therefore, assignments (such as projects and essays) requiring more time will be assigned more points and weighted more heavily.

3. Grading scales: A grade will be awarded once a student has earned 75 points and, if applicable, meets specific criteria, such as completing and being proficient in the required project, essay, etc.

4. Homework/outside of class practices (AR 6154):

Revision practices:

Students are expected to revise essays. The first draft will never be the final draft. If, after revision, the student remains dissatisfied with the final grade, revisions are encouraged (with guidance from the teacher during after-school tutorials) to refine the grade further.

9. Extra credit practices:

Extra work can be done outside of class and is given on a case-by-case basis. No student shall receive extra work if they are not in class and are not producing points through regular coursework.
