CREDITS AND GRADUATION

You can view your unofficial transcript on the Aeries Student and Parent Portal. If you see errors, please reach out to your counselor. You need to complete a minimum of 220 credits by graduation, including all individual subject requirements. Credits completed beyond the required amount in any subject will count as elective credits. If you are applying to a UC or CSU school, and most other colleges, you need to have earned at least a C in all the A-G subject requirements. Seniors who may be at risk of not meeting graduation requirements will meet with their counselors during the week of September 23rd-26th to review their progress and explore options for support. Please be sure to bring any questions you may have about credits and post high school plans.

University of California:

Application fee is \$80 per campus. Requires Personal Insight Questions. Applications are available online NOW. UC schools will only request a copy of an official transcript once they have offered you admission to their campus (March 2026). Questions? Email ucinfo@applyucsupport.net

Submit Applications: October 1st – December 1st. SAT/ACT scores are *not* used in admission. Scores may be used in course placement after admission. Please see the UC Admissions website for specific updates.

California State University:

Application fee is \$70 per campus. CSU schools will only request a copy of an official transcript once they have offered you admission to their campus (March 2026). **Submit applications**: **Oct. 1 – Dec. 1st. SAT/ACT scores** *not* **used in admissions decisions.**

Private / Out-of-State Schools: Many private and out-of-state colleges require students to use the Common Application (www.common app.org). This electronic application allows the student to apply to multiple schools using a more streamlined process. Application fees will vary. Refer to the colleges' websites for information and deadlines. You must INVITE YOUR COUNSELOR TO YOUR COMMON APP PROFILE in order for the school profile, transcript, letter of recommendation, and mid-year report to be uploaded by your counselor. Check the SCHS website for your counselor's email address.

Note: The senior class currently has 624 students - you may need this info. Also, there is **no more class ranking**. **Submit applications early!!** DON'T wait until the last minute. Systems tend to have glitches during the final days of the application window.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

UC and CSU do NOT require transcripts or letters of recommendation submitted with your application. However, most private schools and some out-of-state schools and scholarships require letters of recommendation and/or secondary school reports. There are two versions of the letter of recommendation request: one for your counselor and one for your teachers. Find them all at: www.sctritons.org/guidance/college We also have a brag sheet for your parents.

Due to the volume of requests, you need to give your school counselor at least two weeks to write a thorough letter. A late request will result in a generic letter or no letter at all. With the various due dates of college applications, and the Thanksgiving break and winter break, you need to complete the Letter of Recommendation Survey (via Google Form) by:

Monday, October 20, 2025

TRANSCRIPTS

Official transcripts can be ordered from www.parchment.com. There is a fee for each transcript ordered. Please note: The "self-view" version is NOT always accurate. But the version the SCHS registrar sends will always be accurate. If applying to a school using the Common Application or SEND EDU your transcript will be sent electronically, for no charge, as part of the counselor's report. You must invite/link your counselor in the Recommender's section.

All colleges, including UC/CSU, will require FINAL transcripts with second semester grades. STUDENTS will need to order these via Parchment.com by June 5, 2026. Students will choose "Hold for Grades/Wait for Final grades".

COLLEGE ENTRANCE TESTS (CEEB Code 052814)

Register online: SAT www.collegeboard.org; ACT www.actstudent.org

Students must send test scores directly to colleges. SCHS does not send any test scores. You may choose up to four colleges on the registration form, and you can add additional colleges for a fee via the SAT and ACT websites. Certain applications will allow students to report planned testing dates and then have scores sent at a later date. Many, but not all, colleges have continued to waive the requirement for SAT/ACT but can use it for placement purposes. Refer to individual college websites for details and score deadlines.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT TESTS

You must register for AP exams on BOTH College Board AND Total Registration. Make sure to have College Board send your AP scores to each college you apply to: www.collegeboard.org.

COLLEGE ATHLETICS

If you are planning to participate in Division I or II sports at the college level, you must meet NCAA requirements and fill out an NCAA student release form. You must create a profile with the NCAA Eligibility Center to make sure you're on track to meet NCAA requirements: https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/

COMMUNITY COLLEGE

No SAT or ACT scores are needed to enroll at a community college. Placement tests only required upon request by the school. Each of the community colleges hosts a Senior Day to introduce programs and visit the campus, typically in the spring. Make sure to look into the Freshman Advantage Program (early registration) and Honors Program at your campus. Some dates TBD.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid is available to eligible students at all colleges and community colleges. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application (CADAA) is now required for high school graduation. Access the applications through your CCGI account at www.californiacolleges.edu. Most colleges and trade schools also require these forms for financial aid, as well as scholarships. For Cal Grant consideration, you must file between October 1, 2025 and March 2, 2026, though you may create your account now. A CSS/Financial Aid Profile (https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/) is required by some private colleges and universities. Each college has a different filing deadline (September – February). Submit profile at least 4 – 6 weeks before filing deadline. Call 1-800-4-FED-AID or Commission's Student Support Services at (888) 224-7268 for assistance. Visit our Futureology counselor in the College and Career Center for more information.

GPA OPT-OUT FORM

The SCHS Guidance Department will automatically submit GPAs for ALL twelfth grade students to the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) in order to be considered for <u>Cal Grant Funds</u>. If you wish to opt-out of the submission, you must pick up the "Opt-Out Form" from the Guidance Office and return it by Friday, September 19th.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Visit the SCHS Guidance website and select "Scholarships" from the drop-down menu. Apply to multiple scholarships; much of this free money goes unclaimed. This list is updated frequently during the school year, so be sure to visit weekly!

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION:

- Go to **My Colleges** in your common app and click on each of your schools to see if they require Recommenders, this can be found on the landing page if you scroll down to "Recommendations"
- Students should waive their right to Letters of Recommendations on the FERPA, this means that you are waiving your right to see what your teachers/counselors have written about you in their recommendations. This shows that you trust that your recommenders are writing strong letters for you!



Senior Financial Aid Worksheet

On Friday during tutorial, you can come in for support in launching your financial aid applications. You can also book a 1:1 appointment with your college and career counselor to complete your application.



What is Financial Aid?

Financial Aid is money to help pay for college or trade school. It can come in the form of grants (free money), scholarships (free money), and loans (money you have to repay after college).

How do you get Financial Aid?

First, you complete a financial aid application. Then, the information from the application is sent to the colleges you applied to, and they will use that information to provide you with a financial aid offer.


Why should I apply?

- You must complete a financial aid application to qualify for the Promise Program (free college for 2 years) at Saddleback College and other local community colleges. Note:
 Family income does not matter, you just have to complete an application to qualify!
- You never know how much financial aid you're going to get unless you apply and students who apply for financial aid are more likely to attend college/trade school after graduation.

Financial Aid Application Worksheet

STEP 1: Determine if you should complete the FAFSA or the CADAA. (You only complete one)

STEP 3: Gather the following information for the day you apply:

- Parent's Social Security Number (if applicable)

Note: We understand that this information is sensitive and private. If you would rather complete this part of the application at home, you're welcome to do so!



Creating your FAFSA Account

The student <u>and</u> parent must each create a StudentAid.Gov account to submit the FAFSA.



How does WUE work?

The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) is a tuition savings program that makes attending out-of-state colleges and universities more affordable for students. Through WUE, you receive a reduced tuition rate, giving you more education options for your money.

Out-of-state tuition is expensive, sometimes two to three times the cost of in-state tuition. With WUE, participating public colleges and universities across the West agree to charge out-of-state students no more than 150% of the school's in-state tuition. Tuition savings may vary depending on the college or major. The bottom line: You save big with WUE and almost always pay less than out-ofstate tuition.

How do I get started?

- 1. Check your eligibility by home state/territory, college and major through our online WUE Savings Finder.
- 2. Meet admissions requirements and deadlines for the WUE college.
- **3. Apply directly** to the college(s) of your choice.
- **4. Contact the college** it's the best source of information about how you can save money through WUE.



Division I Academic Standards

Division I schools require you to meet academic standards. To be eligible to practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship in your first year of **full-time enrollment**, you must meet the following requirements:




- 1. Register for an Academic and Athletics Certification account.
- 2. Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:



- 3. Complete 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in four consecutive academic years (eight semesters) from your initial start of ninth grade. If you graduate from high school early, you still must meet core-course requirements.
- 4. Meet the 10/7 requirement by completing 10 of your 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits, including seven in English, math and science, before the start of the seventh semester.



- » Students with solely international academic credentials are not required to meet the 10/7 requirement.
- 5. Earn a minimum 2.3 core-course GPA.
- 6. Ask your high school counselor to upload your final official high school transcript with proof of graduation to your Eligibility Center account.
- 7. Receive academic and athletics certifications from the Eligibility Center.




Division II Academic Standards

Division II schools require you to meet academic standards. To be eligible to practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship in your first year of full-time enrollment, you must meet the following requirements:



- 1. Register for an Academic and Athletics Certification account.
- 2. Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:



- 3. Earn a minimum 2.2 core-course GPA.
- 4. Ask your high school counselor to upload your final official high school transcript with proof of graduation to your Eligibility Center account.
- 5. Receive academic and athletics certifications from the Eligibility Center.

What if You Don't Meet Division II Standards?

If you have not met all the Division II academic standards, you may not compete in your first year of full-time enrollment at a Division II school. However, you will be deemed a partial qualifier. All Division II partial qualifiers may practice and receive an athletics scholarship but may NOT compete during their first year of full-time enrollment.

Division II Worksheet

Use the Division II Worksheet to assist you in monitoring your progress in meeting NCAA initial-eligibility standards. The Eligibility Center will determine your academic status after you graduate. Remember to check your high school's list of NCAA-approved core courses for courses you have taken or plan to take.

ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION DECISIONS

Academic certifications are required for all collegebound student-athletes planning to compete at an NCAA Division II school. If you're being recruited by a Division II school, below are the most common decisions you may receive once your academic certification has been completed.

Early Academic Qualifier


If you meet specific criteria after three consecutive academic years (six semesters) of high school, you may be deemed an early academic qualifier for Division II and may practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment.

Qualifier

You may practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of full-time enrollment.

Partial Qualifier

You may practice and receive an athletics scholarship but may NOT compete during your first year of full-time enrollment.
