Course Description/Student Learning Outcomes:

English III is intended to improve reading fluency, practice comprehension strategies, and provide structure for writing mechanics at the sentence, paragraph, and short-essay levels. Students have the opportunity to accelerate credit acquisition through focused practice on grammar and mechanics, vocabulary development, and self-paced independent reading. An introduction to rhetoric and argument writing is included to help prepare them for success in English IV.

a. Late work is accepted for full credit at any time during the academic year. However, if a student is missing a Summative Assessment or is more than 30 points behind, he or she will be required to attend 6th period until caught up.

8. Revision practices:

a. Students are expected to revise essays. As the rough draft is written, I will provide comments, suggestions, and directions for revision. For full credit, The final piece of writing must meet all requirements of the assignment and address all comments and suggestions provided by the teacher. After the writing is scored on the rubric, students may further revise their writing to achieve a higher score. This opportunity may be limited by the teacher's available time.

9. Extra credit practices:

- a. Extra Credit is available to any students in good standing in the class. To be in good academic standing, a student must:
 - i. Have completed all summative assessments and major assignments
 - ii. Have earned at least 70% of daily points
