



O1 Four Year Colleges





A-G refers to the minimum requirements to apply to CSUs, UCs and most private colleges and universities



A-G (College Requirements)

Students must pass classes with C- or higher to receive credit

"A": SOCIAL SCIENCE

California State University (CSU)



- 22 campuses across California
 - Cal Poly and Cal Maritime are integrating to one campus - will be official for Fall 2026
- Meet A-G requirements with C- or higher
- Maintain 2.5 or higher GPA in A-G courses in G.10-11
 - GPA between 2.0-2.49 may be evaluated for admissions based on <u>supplemental factors</u>
 - Supplemental factors may include:
 - Number of courses exceeding minimum "A-G" requirements,
 - GPA in math and/or science courses,
 - Household income,
 - Extracurricular and leadership involvement,
 - Educational program participation in high school
 - SAT/ACT no longer required for admissions

University of California (UC)



- 9 Undergraduate campuses across California
- Meet A-G requirements with C- or higher
- Maintain 3.0 or higher GPA in A-G courses in G.10-11
- SAT/ACT no longer required for admissions
- Application evaluated by 13 components including:
 - Number of courses beyond A-G requirements
 - Senior year courses
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Academic accomplishments in light of special circumstances such as:
 - Personal and family situations/circumstances
 - Need to work/low family income
 - First generation to attend college

Private Colleges

- Meet A-G requirements with C or higher (minimum)
 - Check with individual colleges for additional requirements
- Minimum GPA varies per college
- SAT/ACT requirement based on individual college
 - Required: students must take SAT/ACT
 - Test Optional: up to student whether or not submit test scores
 - **Test Blind:** students do not have to take SAT/ACT
- Over 80 private, non-profit private/independent colleges in California

Notable CA Private Universities: Stanford University, University of Southern California, Pepperdine University, University of San Francisco, St. Mary's College, University of the Pacific, Dominican University, Santa Clara University



SAT Information

- FREE School Day SAT for Juniors only March 4, 2026
 - Students must <u>opt-in</u>
 - Contact school's administration for more information.
- REMINDER UC and CSU systems <u>do not require</u> the SAT for college admissions
 - SAT scores will only be used for placement purposes in English and Math
- Some private schools require SAT for admissions; some are optional
- Releasing SAT scores to colleges:
 - Select college(s) as a recipient during G.11 SAT
 - If not, go to www.collegeboard.com to send your score report

Eligible vs. Competitive

Eligible

- Minimum A-G Completion
- Minimum GPA
- Easy 12th grade schedule w/ few A-G courses
- Few extracurricular or community activities

Does not mean that a student will be accepted to their 1st choice campus



Competitive

- Taking A-G courses beyond the minimum
- Higher GPA
- Competitive 12th grade schedule w/ A-G courses
- Several, recurring extracurricular or community activities

Better chance for students to be accepted to highly competitive or impacted majors

Spartan East Side Promise

- Agreement between ESUHSD and SJSU
- Students meet requirements → Guaranteed admissions to SJSU

O2 Community Colleges



Community College

- Two-year college to complete General Education (GE)
- Transfer to any four-year college upon completion
- CC's have transfer agreements with certain UCs and CSUs (TAG)
 - If completed requirements for intended major, guaranteed admissions to university
 - Different CCs have different transfer agreements
 - Check each CC individually to see if they have what you want
- Only requirement to attend CC is high school diploma or be 18 years old

Each community college has their own "promise program"

CSU - Transfer Success Pathway

Purpose: to increase access to any of the CSU's 22 universities

Eligibility: First time freshman student who either:

- Wasn't eligible to attend the CSU at the time you graduated from high school; Or
- Didn't attend a CSU because of personal or financial reasons
- Graduate from high school and did not receive college credit after high school graduation
 - Agreement cycle Aug 1-Oct 31 immediately after HS graduation

Eligible students can apply to the program to:

- Enter agreement with selected CSU and receive guaranteed admissions to degree program and campus
 - Students must meet all TSP requirements within three years.
 - Available degree programs vary by each CSU.

UC Transfer Program

Three different transfer paths:

Transfer Pathways

- Major is known
- Receive set of courses to get prepared for major
- Transfer to any of the nine UCs

Transfer Agreement Guarantee (TAG)

- Have desired campus (six of nine campus have TAG agreements)
- Submit separate TAG application to chosen campus
- Meet GPA and course requirements, → guaranteed admissions

Pathways+

- Major is listed under Pathways
- Freedom to explore other campus while ensuring a spot at one of the six TAG campuses

Best of both worlds: guaranteed spot at UC, receive support







Select either "CSU Eligibility" or "UC Eligibility" under "My Plan"




Subject Area Eligibility



- View which courses satisfy A-G requirements
- See which subject area requirements have been completed or which subject areas need to be met
 - Subject area off track →
 student has not met subject
 area requirement
- "UC Honors" → extra point added to GPA (weighted GPA)


Application Launch Through CCGI



- Launch CSU and/or UC college application through CCGI
- Coursework and grades will import directly into CSU and UC application
 - Import is rough draft be sure to double check courses and grades

Start Your College Journey

Grade 9 (Freshman)

- Use the Academic Planner at <u>californiacolleges.edu</u> to plan out your "A-G" courses
 - All ESUHSD students have access to California Colleges (CCGI) through their ARMS account
- Take the classes you need to be ready for advanced classes in your junior and senior year
- Build a strong math and English foundation
- Develop study skills to learn more effectively

Grade 10 (Sophomore)

- Meet with your counselor to identify the best academic pathway for your major of interest
- Focus on your grades. The CSU calculates your GPA for admission using your 10th and 11th grade courses
- If considering a STEM career, take an advanced math course or a course that prepares you for advanced math.

Focus on Your College Goals

Grade 11 (Junior Year)

- Continue to strengthen your English and math skills by taking advanced courses
- Select courses that match your career interests. If considering a STEM major, take an advanced math course
- Take community college or dual enrollment courses to earn college credit
- Do well on the CAASPP exam. Your CAASPP score may be used to place you in the appropriate English and math courses when you attend the CSU



Finish Senior Year Strong

Grade 12 (Senior Year)

- Meet with your counselor to discuss your transition to college
- Take your final English college prep course such as CSU ERWC, Honors English, AP English, or IB English
- Take an advanced math course that matches your career interest. If considering a STEM career take Pre-Calculus or Calculus
- Take community college or dual enrollment courses to earn college credit
- Stay focused on earning good grades in your final year.
