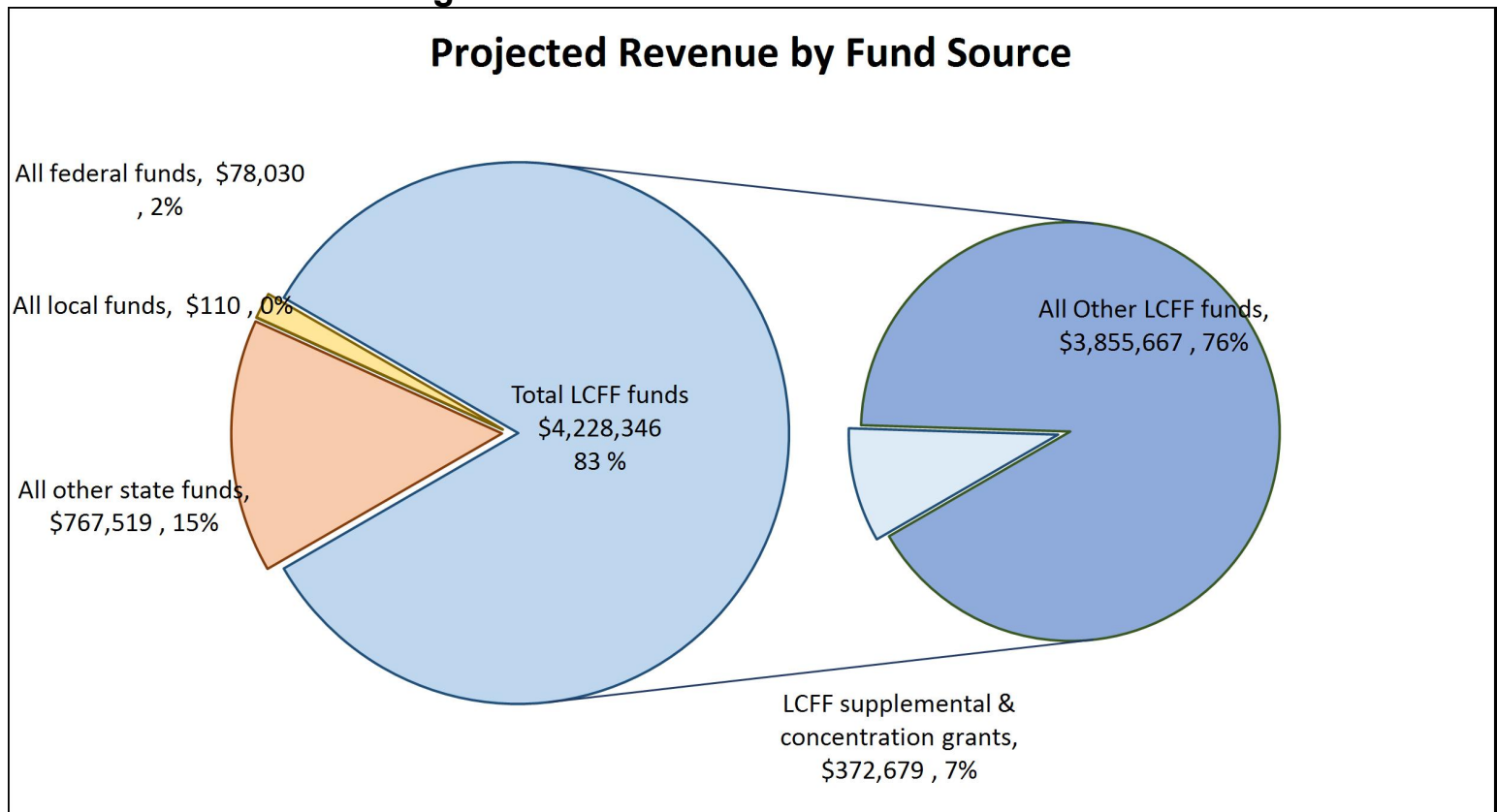

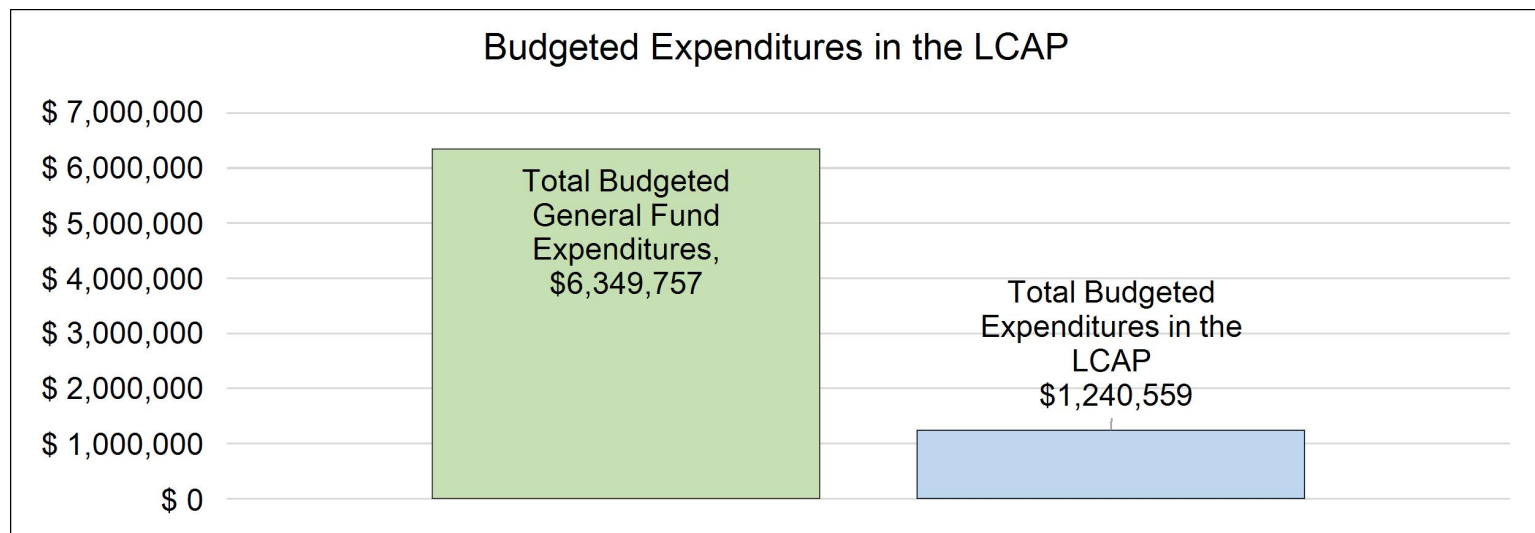


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Mountainside Middle College High School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Mountainside Middle College High School is \$5,074,005, of which \$4,228,346 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$767,519 is other state funds, \$110 is local funds, and \$78,030 is federal funds. Of the \$4,228,346 in LCFF Funds, \$372,679 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

General fund expenditures for Mountainside Middle College High School not included in the LCAP are utilized for administrative and office staff, facilities cost, books and materials, supplies for art and STEM classes, as well as furniture and technology needs for students and staff.

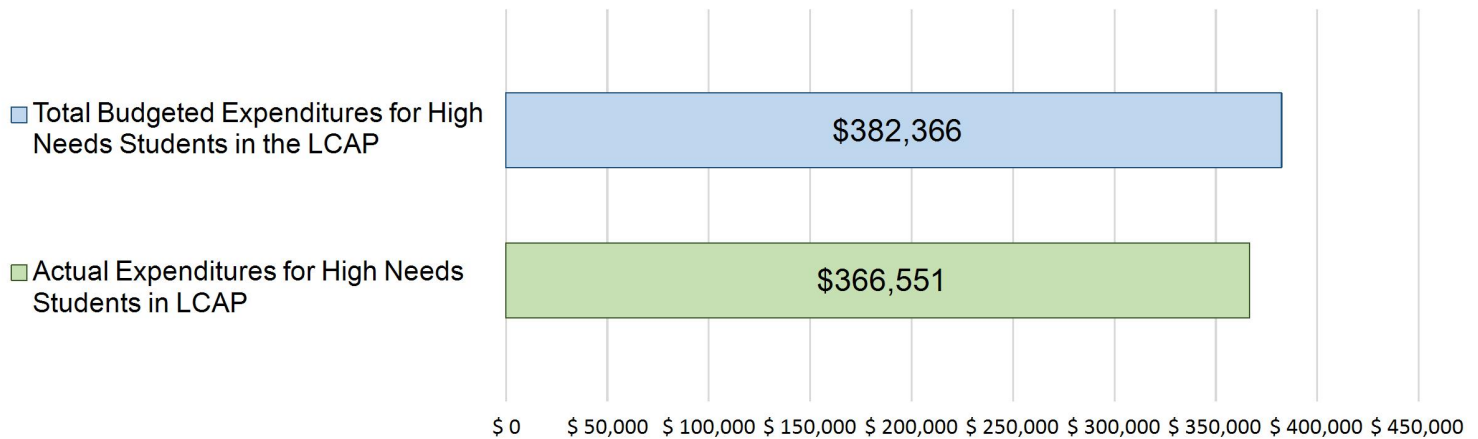

General Information

Mountainside Middle College High School is part of the Charter Alternative Programs, which provide diverse, high-quality alternative educational programs for students with a variety of needs. These programs were previously known as Charter College & Career Prep, Charter University Prep, and Charter Connections Academy. Also, part of the school is Mountainside Success Academy, which serves as the Community School for El Dorado County. The Success Academy is the only part of the school that serves 7th and 8th-grade students. These are middle school students who have been expelled from local districts. In 2023, the programs received a Middle College/Early College Grant through the California Department of Education and reorganized with a focus on Dual Enrollment.

The school offers three diploma options:

College Prep Diploma - This option focuses on the A-G requirements. Students complete 240 credits.

Traditional Diploma - This diploma track serves students who plan to attend community college, enter the workforce, or attend a trade school after high school. Students complete 220 credits to earn this diploma.

Community School Diploma - This is a credit recovery diploma for students who have fallen behind in credits. Classes focus on the state high school requirements. Students complete 180 credits to earn this diploma.

Mountainside Success Academy

Mountainside Success Academy serves students who benefit from an alternative setting. Students who are experiencing difficulty meeting behavioral, social, academic, and/or attendance standards may need assistance with goal setting or other supports to meet their individual learning needs. We create individual learning plans focused on student objectives, which include academic counseling, credit recovery, acceleration, and post-secondary options. Regardless of a student's placement, be it expulsion, juvenile detention center placement, or SARB placement, all students have access to MSA resources, and all students benefit from inclusive practices. Students and families also choose MSA due to its flexible scheduling, targeted interventions, and whole-child approach to learning.

Middle College High School

Students at MCHS have the opportunity to earn college credits while enrolled in High School and complete their CALGETC transfer requirements through dual enrollment with Folsom Lake College, which certifies that they have completed the general education requirements for the University of California or California State University. FLC also features a wide variety of Career Technical Education certificates for students interested in entering the workforce after high school. The program provides support for the dual enrollment college classes through a sequence of Advisory courses. These courses focus on the skills students need to succeed in both high school and college, such as study skills, time management, and communication. Students also have the support of a Homeroom teacher, who helps them track their learning.

MMCHS serves 250 - 350 students in grades 7-12 each year. Students come from throughout El Dorado County. The majority of students attend school two to four times per week.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The school performance overview indicated in the California School Dashboard indicates progress and/or success in the following areas:

- An increase of 31.2 points in ELA student achievement on the CAASPP to 33.2 points below the standard
- An increase of 27.7 points in Math student achievement on the CAASPP to 126.9 points below the standard
- Chronic absenteeism is maintained at 0%.
- Suspension rate declined 1.1.% to .3%, which is significantly lower than the state rate of 3.5%

The school performance overview indicated in the California School Dashboard indicates the following areas for growth:

- College/Career Indicator status decreased 18.9% to 23.4% prepared.
- Graduation rate maintained declined 5.2% to 73.6%

The low College/Career Indicator status indicates that students need additional support to succeed in their college classes. Additional support opportunities are being built into the program.

The school has a growing number of students with Individualized Educational Plans. These students are supported by their classroom teacher and additional staff, such as a Resource Specialist or Speech Pathologist, as required in their plans. The students receive this support in person on the days they attend school.

The school has a small number of English Language Learners. These students are supported by their classroom teacher in individual or small group ELD instruction, as appropriate. Their progress is regularly monitored through teacher observation, classroom assessments, and year-round assessments.

The school provides a Mental Health Clinician and an outside agency providing coaching and support groups for students. The Mental Health Clinician serves as the coordinator for all mental health support for students. A referral system was put in place that any staff member, student, or parent can access. The Mental Health Clinician received all referrals and then followed up with the student to ensure they were receiving adequate support.

The school conducted a needs assessment for the use of Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG)funds for the 2026-2027 school year. Although the school has made measurable gains in mathematics, this area still requires additional intervention and support for students. The LREBG funds will be used for small-group tutoring during the school day through a math support class. Our research indicates that early intervention in high school algebra and geometry will accelerate student growth in these areas. Specific actions align with Goal 1 in the LCAP.

The El Dorado County Office of Education Charter programs collaborate with stakeholders in an ongoing cycle throughout the year as part of our process of planning, implementation, and evaluation of educational programs and services to develop the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP). Parents, community members, pupils, staff, and other stakeholders are actively involved in the development, review, and implementation of our LCAP—particularly through our all-program School Advisory Council, which incorporates input from students, staff, and parents.

Education partners were brought together early in the process, with our School Advisory Council serving as the representative body for all programs, to hear about the state programs, including an overview of the new systems, timelines for implementation, and the emphasis on the continuous cycle of improvement and stakeholder engagement. Education partners were given time to answer questions about the changes under LCFF and LCAP and to provide input and feedback as goals were developed together and reviewed across all state priority areas, including services for English Language Learners (ELL), expelled/at-risk youth, and Foster Youth.

Direct education partner input for the needs assessment was supplemented by a survey on quality school indicators and by discussions with staff, students, parents, and community members. The stakeholder survey is given at the end of the year to provide ongoing, comparative data. To ensure that ELL, Foster Youth, and expelled youth representatives were involved, a number of additional steps were taken, including sending home information in a variety of formats and using different communication media. Stakeholder engagement also includes rounding for each program and meetings with parent groups. The Advisory Council reviews and provides input on the goals and actions in the LCAP, and the El Dorado County Office of Education School Board approves the LCAP after a public hearing in June, when the LCAP and budget receive final Board approval.

Extensive information, including data on state and program priorities, is made available to stakeholders for discussion, goal drafting tied to priority areas, review, and final agreement through the annual process. Discussions and data related to student and program performance measures focus on a variety of measures, including state standardized testing performance (CAASPP), graduation rates, discipline rates, EL reclassification and proficiency rates, attendance rates, college and career readiness, stakeholder surveys, and the program's vision and mission.

Stakeholder involvement is instrumental in determining program-specific goals and actions. Through direct feedback and indirect feedback from other methods, leadership can identify the greatest areas of need and plan accordingly. As a result, we are proactive in ensuring that our sites are equipped with the resources needed for student success, including adopting and implementing new state-approved instructional materials, providing extensive professional development, and teaching methods that focus on helping all students succeed in their pursuit of college or vocational work and in life.

The educational partner engagement meetings provided a framework for discussing how to improve educational performance across the eight California State Priority areas. Survey data and feedback meetings provided input on strengths and needs. The School Advisory Committee reviewed the survey results, and they are directly reflected in Goals 1-3. The feedback from this process initiated action items to address areas of need.

The mid-year LCAP was reviewed, discussed, and approved at the School Advisory Council on December 15, 2025.

The 2026-27 LCAP was reviewed and approved at the School Advisory Council on May 20, 2026.

LCAP will be presented at a public hearing for public review and comment on June 9, 2026. The LCAP was approved by the El Dorado County Board of Education on June 16, 2026

SPECIFIC INPUT WHICH INFLUENCED THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE LCAP

Additional Collaboration Time: Teachers expressed the need for staff time to collaborate and plan together to improve teacher practices and student outcomes. Grade level, subject area, and tiered intervention collaboration time have been increased on the PD calendar as of the 24-25 school year. The Mid-term WASC was another opportunity for staff to collaborate to analyze progress on WASC goals and how they support the LCAP goals and development.

Communication: Parents expressed high satisfaction with the school programs; however, the survey results indicated improvement in positive communication, and they would like to hear more about how their students are performing, particularly about receiving more positive

feedback. The school will continue to work on systems for positive feedback. Metrics indicated that students, parents/caregivers, and their families are treated with respect at the school. The families feel the school provides a safe environment for their child to learn, and the school staff demonstrates care for their child. Trend data supports this; the response to "I would recommend this school to other parents" has consistently had a high rating. This indicates sustainability surrounding effective relationship building.

PD for Safety: Teachers expressed a need for additional training on safety and Universal Design for Learning. Multi-year professional development plans are being further developed to maximize effectiveness, and all stakeholders agree that professional development is key to meeting our LCAP goals. Professional development plans are aligned across grade levels and subjects, thereby strengthening outcomes in several ways. In addition, staff participate in professional development opportunities outside regularly scheduled dates, including conferences, off-site training, and EDCOE-offered training. Examples of training this past year: Universal Design for Learning, Eduprotocols, Threat Assessment, CPR/NARCAN, CPI/non-violent crisis intervention, CANVAS, mandated reporter training.

Assessment: Staff have collaborated to develop effective assessment tools to measure student outcomes. After carefully considering input from teachers and students, it was determined that the NWEA/MAP assessment system was not meeting our needs. Staff piloted the IXL system in the Spring of 2024 and has moved forward with a new system. Teachers found IXL easier to administer and the data more valuable than other systems. Students found the IXL interface more user-friendly and that the tutorials, which help fill knowledge gaps, were effective.

Mathematics: Both CAASPP scores and student feedback indicate that our students struggle with Math. The school plans to adopt IXL to help with this and will expand the number of Math Support classes. In these support classes, MMCHS staff will support students in both their High School and college math courses.

Canvas: The school will continue to enhance our web-based learning management systems/student learning portal(s) and support the use of Canvas and Google Classroom. These online platforms support and enhance the quality of our study programs by providing improved content, access, and communication.

Mental Health Support for Students: A continued and concerning trend has been the steady increase in students who exhibit a wide range of mental health-related issues, including but not limited to anxiety, depression, and behavioral issues. Foster Youth, McKinney-Vento students, and students with special needs may have greater emotional needs; it is a priority to provide additional support and training to better meet those students' needs. Professional development is targeted to inform and support staff and stakeholders on best practices for students affected by the situation. Additional staff training is provided through consultants, workshops, and conferences. The addition of a full-time mental health clinician and additional associates for wellness services is evidence of the continued effort to meet students and families where their needs are and to support staff so they are well-equipped to address the myriad social-emotional student needs. Trend data continues to indicate and validate that stakeholders acknowledge social-emotional wellness as a positive and necessary focus.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

This goal was developed in response to the needs identified through data analysis and input from educational partners. The analysis of California School Dashboard (Dashboard) data indicated a clear need to continue supporting English Language Arts (ELA) and Math. This need is echoed in local benchmark assessments as described in the Measuring and Reporting Results section below. The Student Enrichment and Support Block grant will ensure that learning outcomes are set and tracked for each student and that academic interventions are in place through smaller class sizes, individualized learning plans, and small group academic support.

The metrics and actions for Goal 1 were implemented effectively. Student participation in CAASPP testing at the middle college program continued to increase. The disaggregated data by program indicate ELA scores at the middle college program well above the state average and the math scores at the state average. The school will continue to implement the metrics and actions associated with Goal 1 for the 2026-2027 school year.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no substantive differences between the budgeted and actual expenditures under Goal 1.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Actions taken toward the goals have been moderately effective, laying important groundwork while also revealing key areas for growth. Initial steps, such as professional development sessions, stakeholder meetings, and data collection, laid the foundation for understanding each program's distinct needs. However, these actions also highlighted a need for deeper alignment and clearer articulation of program-specific

goals. One of the most significant outcomes of the second year has been the realization that a one-size-fits-all approach is not effective. As LEA/District work to integrate two unique programs—each with its own culture, student population, and instructional priorities—they often encounter unanticipated challenges. For example, a strategy that works well for a career-focused program may not translate to a college-prep model, and vice versa. These variances necessitate an ongoing process of refinement. This involves revisiting and revising initial goals to reflect a deeper understanding of each program's strengths, challenges, and priorities. Effective practices will include using established feedback loops with staff and students, analyzing disaggregated data, and structuring with intention and collaborative planning across program teams. While progress does feel slow initially, this period of reflection and adjustment is critical. The student benefits of multiple program options are juxtaposed against the complexity of navigating continuous improvement.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

At MSA, over the past year (2024-2025), our staff's exploration and implementation of restorative practices have yielded meaningful and measurable outcomes and inspired our efforts to elevate our approach with a Restorative Justice focus. Through community-building activities, reflective conversations, and an inclusive system, we continue to strengthen our commitment to sustaining a positive school culture—one marked by increased trust, mutual respect, and a stronger sense of belonging among students and staff. Students are not only showing up more consistently, but also more fully. Persistence has grown, particularly among those who previously struggled to stay connected. Engagement in learning has deepened as students see their voices reflected in the classroom and recognize that their lived experiences matter. By prioritizing relationships and accountability over punishment, we have created space for more relevant, inclusive, and

empowering educational experiences. These early successes affirm that our efforts are not only worthwhile but also impactful. As a result, we will expand our work to explicitly include restorative justice practices as a key element in achieving our broader goal: cultivating a school environment where all students feel seen, supported, and inspired to grow.

In 2025-2026, MMCHS and MSA focused on supporting positive, respectful student interactions on campus, both in the classroom and during unstructured time. School staff worked together to design a school safety agreement that promoted equity and transparency regarding student expectations and consequences. Staff participated in professional development (TISE), gaining a deeper understanding of students who have experienced trauma and of how we can support them both academically and behaviorally.

In 2025-2026, MMCHS had a significant increase in survey results for parents. The survey results indicated parents feel the school has a safe environment where students and families are treated with respect. They also indicated they receive positive feedback from teachers and teachers and staff have a genuine concern for their children. The school has made significant efforts to increase communication with families and will continue to do so during the 2026-2027 school year.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no substantive differences between the budget expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for Goal 2 during the 2025-2026 school year.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

MMCHS: The actions taken have been effective in initiating meaningful progress toward the goal of ensuring that all students and families experience a safe, welcoming environment that fosters health, resilience, and success. The significant increase in parent survey results during the 2025–2026 school year affirms that these efforts are working. Parents reported that MMCHS maintains a safe environment where students and families are treated with respect, receive positive feedback from teachers, and that staff demonstrate genuine concern for their children's well-being. After establishing baselines, the process helped develop a deeper understanding of the culture across our school community. One of the most impactful steps was embracing a mindset of inquiry, asking good questions in many ways, many times, and in many spaces. Through staff conversations, student focus groups, family engagement efforts, and surveys, we learned that the quality and consistency of our questions led to richer, more informative data. These insights revealed patterns in students' and families' experiences and helped identify where perceptions of safety and belonging were strongest and where more support is needed. The year was also valuable in helping us learn how to better listen. Rather than rushing to solutions, we focused on creating space for voices to be heard, particularly those of students and families who may not have previously felt included in shaping the school culture. This process affirmed that culture-building is ongoing and must be rooted in authentic relationships and trust. While significant improvements have been made, we can confidently say the actions taken over the last two years have created the conditions for sustained growth. A key driver of this progress has been the school's significant efforts to strengthen communication with families—an investment that will remain a priority throughout the 2026–2027 school year. Going forward, the challenge will be translating what we've learned into intentional practices and supports that meet the unique needs of our community.

MSA: Goals analysis and description: MSA continues to prioritize stakeholder participation. The 23-24 and 24-25 school years saw a decrease in family participation in our evening community events, prompting MSA to examine how we interact with families. MSA focused on

interacting with families during the school day, meeting them as they dropped off and picked up, and providing food and resources. We also offered time after work for families to get support with FAFSA. We are working to partner with community organizations in 26-27 to create evenings that involve families in their students' education while providing basic needs and connections to community partners.

There are no substantive differences for the metrics and actions in Goal 3 of the 2026-2027 LCAP. Both programs will continue to focus on improving feedback to students and families about student progress. The schools will continue to explore CTE pathways for students in both programs and increasing dual enrollment opportunities in partnership with Folsom Lake College.

There are no material differences between the budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for the 2025-2026 school year.

Progress toward ensuring that every graduate is college- and career-ready with a clear postsecondary plan has been steady, and the actions taken to date have established a meaningful foundation for continued growth. This year marked a critical step forward, particularly in building

the systems needed to track and support students on their path to graduation. Key initiatives included implementing student-tracking systems to monitor academic progress, credit accumulation, and readiness benchmarks. These tools empowered staff to identify students at risk of falling behind and respond with timely, targeted interventions, most notably through academic advising. Significant strides were also made in expanding awareness of and access to college and career opportunities. Students benefited from structured experiences across diverse industries, including job shadowing, career fairs, internships, and dual-enrollment opportunities. One-on-one advising sessions, postsecondary planning workshops, and intentional collaboration with families helped ensure that each student's plan reflects their individual interests and strengths, with progress supported by internal data tracking. While these efforts have had a meaningful impact, work remains to ensure that every student, not just those already on a defined path, receives this level of personalized support. To deepen effectiveness, the following actions will be prioritized going forward:

Establishing advisory periods where staff can consistently engage students in goal setting, progress monitoring, and plan refinement. Integrating college and career readiness standards across content areas so that students build relevant, transferable skills in every classroom.

Providing early and frequent exposure to postsecondary options beginning in 9th grade, rather than concentrating these efforts in the junior or senior year.

Strengthening data systems to enable real-time monitoring of student readiness, increasing student voice in the planning process, and ensuring postsecondary plans reflect both aspirations and realistic preparation.

The supports now in place provide a strong and promising framework, one that positions MMCHS to move from building systems to fully realizing their impact for every student.

 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

- **8. Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (%)**
 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
