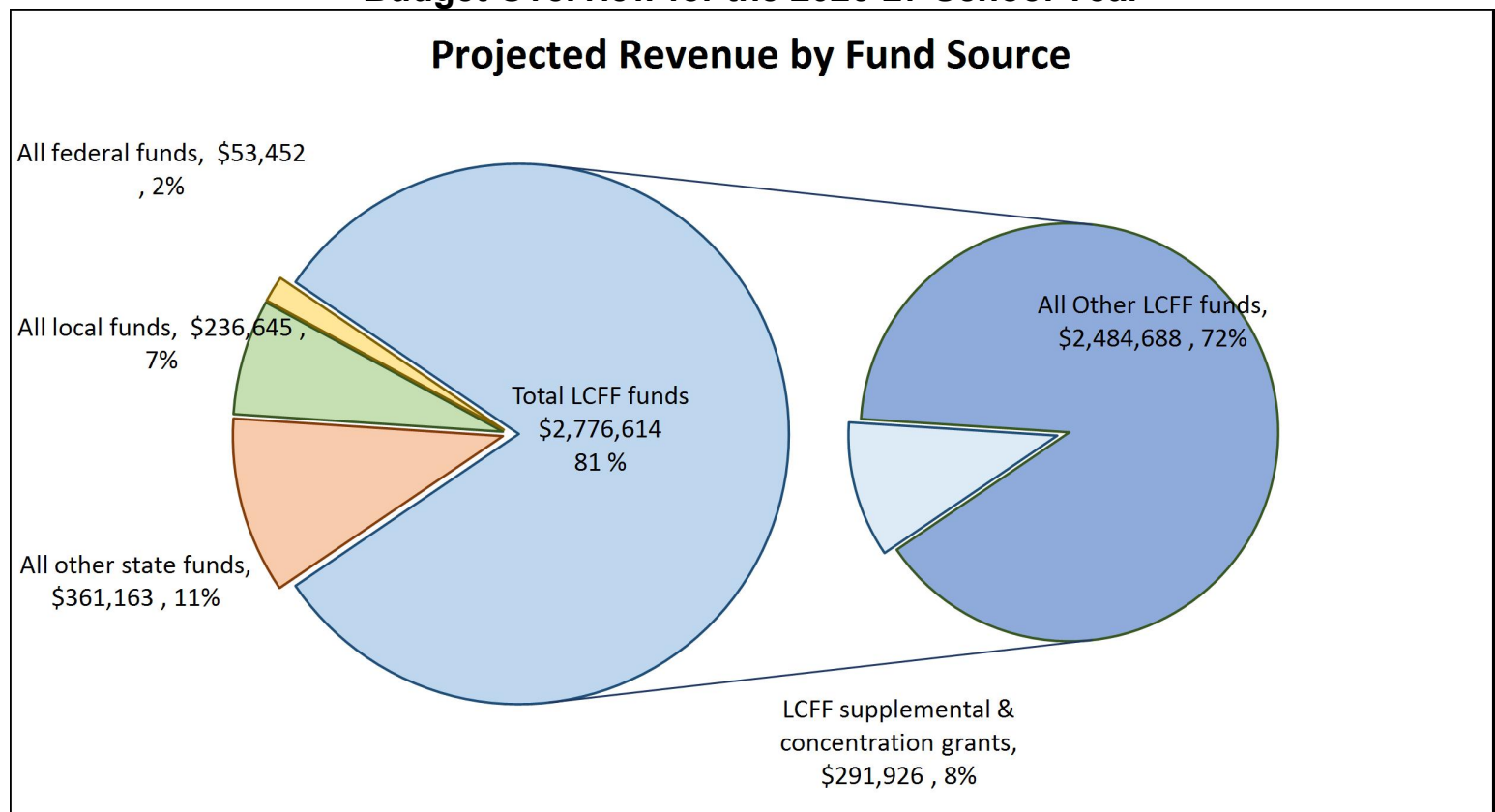

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

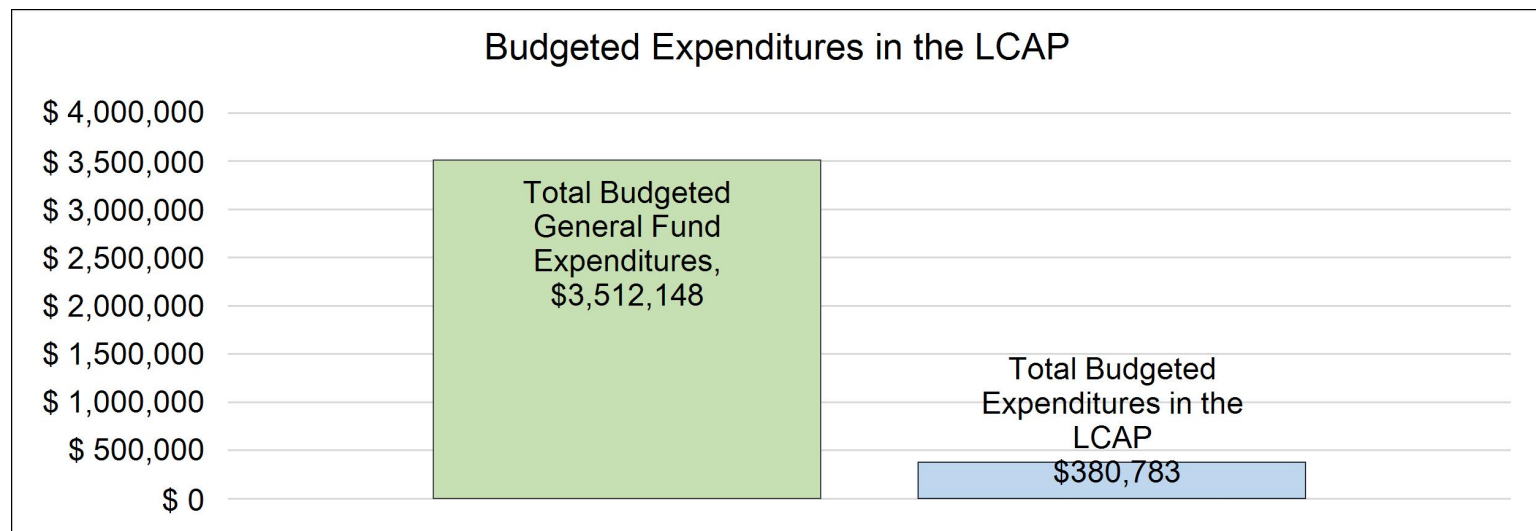


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Johnstonville Elementary School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Johnstonville Elementary School District is \$3,427,874, of which \$2,776,614 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$361,163 is other state funds, \$236,645 is local funds, and \$53,452 is federal funds. Of the \$2,776,614 in LCFF Funds, \$291,926 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

The text description of the above chart is as follows: Johnstonville Elementary School District plans to spend \$3,512,148 for the 2026-27 school year. Of that amount, \$380,783 is tied to actions/services in the LCAP and \$3,131,365 is not included in the LCAP. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

Expenditures not included in the Local Control and Accountability Plan include additional staff salaries and benefits (\$2,465,811), books and supplies (\$274,809) services such as electricity, phones, garbage removal, and facility maintenance/repairs (\$746,025), and contributions to support the cafeteria (\$35,898).

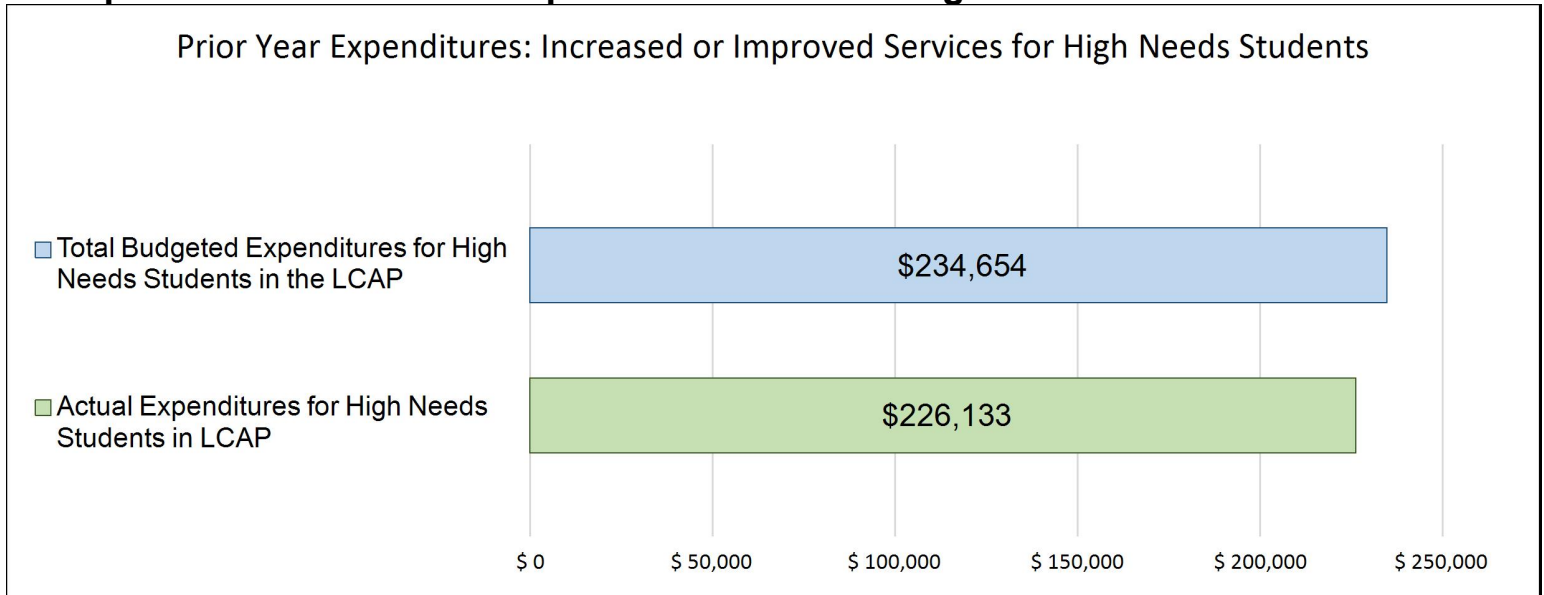
Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

In 2026-27, Johnstonville Elementary School District is projecting it will receive \$291,926 based on the enrollment of Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students. Johnstonville Elementary School District must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the LCAP. Johnstonville Elementary School District plans to spend \$291,924 towards meeting this requirement, as described in the LCAP.

In 2026-27 school year, Johnstonville Elementary School District is projecting it will receive \$291,924 to use to meet the needs of high needs students based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. Johnstonville Elementary School District intends to increase or improve services for high needs students as described in this LCAP document. These actions include providing staff to support smaller class sizes, provide small group instruction, keep the campus clean and safe, provide access to technology and books, make an afterschool program available, and make sure staff are provided the training needed.

The text description of the above chart is as follows: In 2025-26, Johnstonville Elementary School District's LCAP budgeted \$234,654 for planned actions to increase or improve services for high needs students. Johnstonville Elementary School District actually spent \$226,133 for actions to increase or improve services for high needs students in 2025-26.

The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$8,521 had the following impact on Johnstonville Elementary School District's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Johnstonville Elementary School District's vision states that "ALL Grizzlies are ENGAGED, EMPATHETIC, EMPOWERED, and EDUCATED." We are a single-school district and the smallest geographically-bound school district in Lassen County. Over half of our students transfer into the district from surrounding communities. Our small bedroom community has little industry or retail center and the majority of our families are employed at either High Desert State Prison or in the town of Susanville. Our small school atmosphere allows us to develop a community of learners with a dedicated team of educators who believe in the potential of every student.

We are a Transitional Kindergarten through 8th-grade school and our small school setting helps families feel a strong connection with the school at large. In partnership with our parents and our community members, we are ensuring that all of our students are competent in the basic skill areas and that all of our students are demonstrating continuous improvement toward educational excellence. Our goal is to help all students reach their highest potential as productive, responsible citizens. Our staff is highly trained in content areas and cooperative learning. We take pride in using a common language, common expectations, and in student academic achievement.

At Johnstonville, we are a family of teachers and learners with a student body of two hundred (200) students and eleven (11) full-time teachers. We serve the following student populations: one hundred three (103) socioeconomically disadvantaged students, thirty-six (36) special education students, two (2) foster youth, ten (10) homeless students, and six (6) English learners, as of May 4, 2026. Johnstonville Elementary School District does not receive any Equity Multiplier Funds.

We have a part-time bilingual instructional aide to support our English Learners. In addition, we have a full-time special education teacher and a part-time special education aide. Though a small school district, Johnstonville Elementary has made it a priority to provide students access to a part-time socio-emotional counselor. Our counselor meets with students three days per week. Johnstonville School provides instructional aides in Kindergarten through sixth-grade classes during intervention time and other identified priority times. Johnstonville School provides needed services to all students and takes special care to address the needs of special populations such as the Homeless and Foster Youth. Johnstonville also offers an after-school program that is available to all TK-6th-grade students, but prioritizes unduplicated student participation. The program runs until 5:00 pm every school day and is split-funded through both the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) and the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). This split-funding model allows for additional resources to be placed with the after-school program to the benefit of the participating students.

Staff turnover has been a significant challenge for our Johnstonville Elementary School District over the past few years. Each year, the departure of experienced teachers and staff members creates gaps in our instructional continuity and disrupts the strong relationships that our students rely on for support and guidance. It takes time for new staff to acclimate to our school's culture and understand the unique needs of our student body, which can affect the overall learning environment. Additionally, the constant cycle of recruiting, hiring, and training new personnel strains our resources and diverts attention from our primary focus: delivering high-quality education. Stability in staffing is crucial for fostering a consistent, nurturing, and effective learning environment.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

Johnstonville Elementary School District staff has analyzed and reflected upon the annual data provided by the California School Dashboard and our local data to develop a sense of student progress and evaluate our academic rigor. It must be noted that the small nature of Johnstonville's student enrollment can cause large swings in the data from year to year. In addition, the state requires a minimum of ten (10) students within an identified sub-population for the group's performance to be published. As a result, the small enrollment in the school severely limits the number of sub-population groups within the school community. Analysis of the provided English Language Arts (ELA) and Math performance data reveals academic gaps both overall and among specific student groups, indicating a need for targeted interventions. While these indicators are in line with, or better than, other schools in the county, we know we can do better and help our students who struggle academically. Here's a breakdown:

ELA Performance Data Analysis:

- Overall student groups are performing 18.6 points below standard, which represents an improvement of 13 points from the prior year and places the district in the Yellow category.
- Socio-Economically Disadvantaged (SED) students and White students have both improved from the Orange category to the Yellow category during the 2024-25 school year.
- Overall, approximately sixty-seven (67%) percent of the students taking the SBAC assessment improved their English Language Arts score from the previous year. This has been identified as Average in the California Dashboard.
- Local data indicates the number of students needing Tier 2 or Tier 3 ELA supports increased by 8.21% in K-5th grades and 24% in 6th-8th grades.

Math Performance Data Analysis:

- Overall student groups are performing 39.1 points below standard, a significant improvement of 23 points from the prior year, placing the district in the Yellow category.
- Similar to ELA, both Socio-economically Disadvantaged (SED) and White student groups improved to the Yellow category on the most recent Dashboard.
- Overall, approximately eighty percent (80%) percent of the students taking the SBAC assessment improved their Math score from the previous year. This has been identified as being Accelerated in the California Dashboard.
- The number of students needing Tier 2 or Tier 3 Math supports shrank by 16.27% in K-5th grades and 15.84% in 6th-8th grades.

Suspension Rate: The district has seen significant improvement in this area, with the overall rate declining by 1.9% to a total of 1.4% of students suspended for at least one day. White students who were previously in the Red category, have improved to Green, as have Socio-economically Disadvantaged students. The Hispanic student group is currently identified within the Orange category.

Chronic Absenteeism Rate: The Socio-economically Disadvantaged (SED) student group has improved from the Red category to the Yellow category. The overall chronic absenteeism rate for the district is 12%, which represents a 2.6% decline from the previous reporting period and places the "All Students" group in the Yellow category. White students are also identified within the Yellow category.

Johnstonville Elementary School District has identified unused Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds that will be utilized for the 2026-27 school year. These funds are specifically allocated to support Action 2.7: Additional In-school interventions and supports under Goal 2. This action was selected based on a needs assessment indicating that unduplicated pupils in early primary grades often enter school with academic skill gaps in both reading, language usage, and mathematical skills.

The rationale for this action is to provide targeted, small group and individual instructional interventions during the school day to accelerate learning and ensure these students meet grade-level standards. This action is directly aligned with the allowable uses of funds identified in EC Section 32526(c)(2), as it focuses on evidence-based academic supports designed to close achievement gaps for high-needs student groups. By using existing instructional expertise to provide small group and individual interventions, the district addresses the area of need identified in the needs assessment, directly responding to local performance data (Metric 2.15) which indicates the number of students requiring Tier 2 or Tier 3 ELA supports increased by 8.21% in K–5th grades and 24% in 6th–8th grades over the past year.

Stakeholder Input

Johnstonville Elementary School District conducted two virtual stakeholder round tables and one in-person meeting in the evenings to elicit input for the refinement of the District's LCAP. In addition, stakeholders frequently gave input during informal meetings with district staff. The qualitative data that was collected during these meetings, along with comments from staff and parent surveys indicate stakeholders desire some revisions of the following items for LCAP planning:

Parents/Community Members:

- Valued the small-school environment, positive relationships, and students being known by staff.
- Continued academic and social-emotional supports.

Staff:

- Identified student behavior, attendance, and social-emotional needs as factors affecting learning
- Continue the implementation of a social-emotional program with its accompanying professional development

Foster Youth Services:

- Continued collaboration and information sharing regarding foster youth
- Expand online resources for easier access to resources when the students are not at school

Student Council:

- Increased number of potential activities during recess
- More engaging learning opportunities, hands-on activities, enrichment, clubs, and leadership opportunities

Overarching Themes:

The input from parents, staff, and students emphasizes a commitment to social-emotional well-being and student engagement within the district's small-school framework. Stakeholders consistently prioritize the continuation and refinement of social-emotional supports and structured curricula, identifying student behavior and mental health as critical components for academic success. This is further reinforced by the students' desire for more hands-on, engaging learning opportunities and recess activities, which aligns with the district's existing efforts to maintain high levels of school connectedness. By integrating staff professional development with direct student services, the district aims to sustain a nurturing culture where positive relationships are at the forefront and every student feels safe and known.

A secondary overarching theme centers on educational equity and the expansion of specialized support networks for high-needs student populations. Feedback from Foster Youth Services and parents underscores a collective desire for instructional continuity and increased resource accessibility, ensuring that support follows students beyond the school day. This theme is reflected in the district's ongoing refinement of its social-emotions program and the Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI²) model. By maintaining expanded learning opportunities, such as the after-school program, Saturday Academy, and summer enrichment, the district directly responds to stakeholder calls for sustained activities that bridge the gap between home and school environments.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

During the transition from the 2024-25 school year to 2025-26, Johnstonville Elementary School demonstrated a consistent ability to maintain high learning standards, though growth in certain professional areas remained stagnant. The district continues to maintain 100% student access to standards-aligned instructional materials and a broad course of study for all pupils, including those with exceptional needs and unduplicated student groups. Implementation success was also reflected in the ongoing maintenance of small class sizes through straight grade levels from TK to 5th grade, which allowed for more personalized, targeted support. Furthermore, the media and library technician position remained a cornerstone of the implementation strategy by bridging the resource gap for high-needs students, providing critical access to technology, essential books, and individual tutorial support.

However, there continues to be a lack of growth in other areas. The percentage of properly credentialed teachers remained at 91%, showing no improvement since Year 1 though there has been teacher turnover. While the district is monitoring this individual's progress toward the required credential, the metric has not yet returned to the 100% target. Similarly, professional development for English Language Development (ELD) standards showed little progress over the past year, remaining at the Level 2, or "Beginning Development" stage. This indicates that while the district is effectively maintaining foundational student services, it has yet to see measurable year-over-year growth in advancing teacher credentialing and ELD instructional implementation.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

For Action 1.1, more funds were spent on teacher salaries due to a teacher being out on partially paid leave and a long-term substitute needing to be hired.

For Action 1.2, more funds were spent on the media/library technician salary due to a negotiated raise which took effect during the school year.

For Action 1.3, significantly less funds were spent for an instructional aide as this position was difficult to fill and when it was filled, it was for less hours than budgeted.

For Action 1.4, slightly less funds were spent for the maintenance position as there was a change in personnel toward the end of the school year which resulted in a change in the salary calculations.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The specific actions implemented under Goal 1 have proven highly effective in maintaining the foundational conditions of learning and ensuring equitable course access for all students. Action 1.4, which provides for facility upgrades and dedicated maintenance personnel, was instrumental in ensuring that 100% of school buildings maintained a "good" or "exemplary" rating, successfully meeting the target for the 2025-26 school year. Similarly, Actions 1.2 and 1.3, which fund a media/library technician and an instructional assistant, were effective in ensuring that 100% of students, including unduplicated pupils and those with exceptional needs, maintained full access to their own copies of standards-aligned instructional materials and were enrolled in a broad course of study. The district's commitment to maintaining straight grade levels (Action 1.1) to support small class sizes and personalized instruction has also been effective in sustaining a Level 4 "Full Implementation" rating for state content and literacy standards.

However, certain professional metrics indicate areas where actions have been less effective in driving growth. Progress toward the goal of 100% teacher credentialing was set back when the metric dropped to 91%. Furthermore, implementation has been ineffective in advancing professional development for English Language Development (ELD) standards, as this metric has remained stagnant at Level 2 (Beginning Development) since the baseline. These data points suggest that while the district is effectively maintaining student-facing resources and facilities, its actions have yet to produce the intended progress in teacher credentialing and specialized ELD instructional training.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

At this time there are no planned changes to the goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions. The district believes the percentage of credentialed teachers will meet the original goal at the end of next year due to the inclusion of staff members in the credential induction program run through the Tehama County Office of Education. In addition, the district believes planned professional development will help increase the implementation of the English Language Development (ELD) standards.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Analysis of student performance data as measured by the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) English Language Arts and Math assessments have shown the All Students category is Orange in both ELA and Math, as demonstrated on the California Dashboard. Further analysis of the SBAC data shows minimal academic gap between Johnstonville's two identified subgroups. Both the White and Socio-economically Disadvantaged groups are at the Orange level in both ELA and Math. This is probably due to the strong crossover of students within both the White and Socio-economically Disadvantaged sub-populations. Input from stakeholders through various surveys and input sessions has indicated a desire to increase the number of students, both as a whole and as subgroups, performing at, or above, grade level standards in both English Language Arts and math. The identified metrics specifically examines these areas of concern and utilizes a method to analyze both student scores and growth to provide a holistic view of student performance. The identified actions will help support and improve learning for all students, with a special emphasis on unduplicated students, and will measure progress toward our goal using the metrics below.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Over the past school year, Johnstonville Elementary School demonstrated a strong upward trajectory in academic achievement, particularly in mathematics, where the district realized a significant 23-point improvement that successfully elevated all student groups into the Yellow category on the California Dashboard. This acceleration was further highlighted by the fact that 80% of students improved their SBAC math scores compared to the 2024-25 school year, an achievement identified as "Accelerated" by state standards. Local data further expanded on these successes, revealing a significant reduction in students requiring intensive Tier 2 or Tier 3 math intervention, which shrank by 16.27% in grades K-5 and 15.84% in grades 6-8 over the last year. English Language Arts (ELA) performance also experienced growth, with a 13-point increase on the dashboard and 67% of students showing score improvements since the prior year. These successes were inclusive across student populations, as both White and Socio-economically Disadvantaged subgroups improved from the Orange to the Yellow category in both subject areas. It must be noted that Johnstonville Elementary School District has a small student population and the increase or decrease of a relatively small number of student assessment scores can create large swings, in either the positive or negative trajectories.

However, there was a lack of growth in specific local ELA indicators and specialized student outcomes. While state test scores rose, local March Istation and Winter NWEA MAP reports showed an increase in students needing Tier 2 or 3 ELA intervention assistance, rising by 8.21% for K-5 and 24% for 6th-8th grades. Furthermore, there has been no reported progress in the English Learner (EL) reclassification rate, which remained stagnant at 0%, while the percentage of EL students making progress toward English proficiency also showed no growth, remaining at 25% in the most recently available data. These findings indicate that while the district has been highly effective in driving broad academic gains in math and state-level ELA scores, it faces ongoing challenges in reducing the intervention needs for language usage and accelerating the proficiency of its English Learner population. Again, it is important to note the very small EL population enrolled at Johnstonville School. This small population can easily result in instability within the data. One student's, response, or unusual score can dramatically change schoolwide results.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

For Action 2.2, no funds were needed for the literacy program. Needs were met using Title IV funding instead.
For Action 2.3, the instructional aide designated for this often worked extended shifts which increased the payroll costs.
For Action 2.7, the instructional aides designated for this would occasionally need to work extra hours which increased the payroll costs.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The specific actions implemented under Goal 2 have been highly effective in driving strong mathematics achievement, though they have shown varied levels of success in addressing English Language Arts (ELA) intervention needs and English Learner outcomes. Actions 2.1 and 2.4, which focused on the development of a Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI²) program and targeted in-school supports, proved successful in mathematics, leading to a 23-point improvement on the California Dashboard and moving all student groups into the Yellow category. This effectiveness was further validated by local data, which showed a reduction in the percentage of students needing intensive Tier 2 or Tier 3 math intervention, shrinking by 16.27% in grades K-5 and 15.84% in grades 6-8. Additionally, Action 2.3, which provides instructional aide support for small-group assistance, contributed to an overall 13-point improvement in state SBAC ELA scores, with 67% of students showing year-over-year growth.

However, the implementation of Action 2.2 (Literacy Program) and associated intervention strategies has been less effective in reducing the number of students requiring intensive ELA support. Despite the rise in state test scores, local performance reports indicated that the percentage of students needing Tier 2 or Tier 3 ELA intervention actually increased by 8.21% in K-5 and by 24% in grades 6-8. Furthermore, actions targeted toward English Learners have remained largely ineffective to date, as the English Learner reclassification rate stayed stagnant at 0%, and the percentage of students making progress toward English proficiency showed no growth in the most recently available data. These outcomes suggest that while the district's RTI² and small-group personnel actions are yielding strong results in mathematics, the specific literacy and language supports have not yet produced the desired results in closing the internal intervention gaps for language usage or accelerating proficiency for English Learners.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

At this time there are no planned changes to the goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions. The district believes the large swings in both ELA and Math achievements can be partially attributed to the small population of test takers at Johnstonville. One student's, response, or unusual score can dramatically change schoolwide results. This, in no way, diminishes the hard-working staff at Johnstonville. The district will continue to monitor both instructional work and student assessments to determine if there is a trend in student achievement.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Johnstonville School strives to create an environment that is both academically rigorous and welcoming to students, families, and stakeholders. Analysis of schoolwide pulse surveys indicate approximately fifty-eight percent (58%) of 3rd-8th grade students feel connected with a school staff member at least most of the time and sixty-eight percent (68%) of 3rd-8th grade students feel safe on campus. In addition, a slim majority of responding parents (fifty-four percent, 54%) have indicated they feel included in the school’s decision-making process. The suspension rate is within the Orange category overall. The expulsion rate remains at zero percent (0%) and the attendance rate is 94.62%. According to the California Dashboard, the Chronic Absenteeism rate is Yellow for the All Student group and Red for Socio-economically Disadvantaged subgroup. In addition, both White and Hispanic subgroups are within the Orange rating for Chronic Absenteeism. While the attendance and chronic absenteeism rates have been improving, there is still additional work that needs to be done. The identified actions will help support student connectedness and safety for all students, with a special emphasis on socio-economically disadvantaged, homeless, foster youth, and EL students, and we will measure progress toward our goal using the metrics below.

Johnstonville intends to maintain the progress made on this goal through a continuation and expansion of the actions that brought some success during the last LCAP. The initiative to expand the hours of our mental health counselor and their ability to provide socio-emotional supports, particularly for socio-economically disadvantaged students, foster youth, and English learners, will significantly enhance school connectedness and mental health, fostering a safe and engaging environment. By developing attendance incentives and partnering with county agencies to address chronic absenteeism, the district aims to reduce absenteeism, especially among unduplicated students, ensuring consistent student participation. In addition, the collaboration with the Johnstonville School Community Association (JSCA) volunteers to offer fun days and field trips as attendance incentives further promotes active student involvement. Finally, the continued implementation of a life skills course for sixth to eighth graders, in partnership with Lassen County agencies, equips students with essential skills, enhancing their engagement and fostering a supportive school community.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Johnstonville Elementary School District recently increased mental health counselor hours and specialized socio-emotional supports which were validated by significant growth on the California Dashboard, where suspension rates and chronic absenteeism for "All Students" and

Socio-economically Disadvantaged groups improved from Yellow and Red categories into the Green category. Success was further expanded through a collaborative partnership with the Johnstonville School Community Association to offer fun days and field trips as attendance incentives, which, along with the continued middle school life skills course, helped maintain a 0% dropout and expulsion rate.

In contrast, the district observed a notable lack of growth in parent engagement and formal participation metrics over the past year. While parent perception of the school's efforts to promote involvement grew by 4% to reach 82%, actual participation in schoolwide surveys fell from 23% to 21%. This disconnect was further evident in decision-making indicators, where the percentage of parents who felt the school sought their input decreased from 70% to 65%, and the active participation of unduplicated student families in formal board or advisory meetings dipped from 16% to 14%. Additionally, the average student attendance rate saw a year-over-year decrease of 1.76%, falling from a high of 96.83% down to 95.07%. These figures suggest that while the district's actions have been effective at transforming the student experience and dashboard accountability markers, they have yet to successfully reverse the downward trend in broader family participation and formal parent meeting attendance.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

For Action 3.2, less funds were spent on attendance awards as the end of the year field trip had to be downsized due to weather concerns. It was too cold to go to the outside community pool.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The specific actions implemented under Goal 3 have been effective in improving behavioral outcomes and reducing absenteeism, although they have proven less effective in reversing declining trends in formal parent engagement. Action 3.1 (Social-emotional Counseling) and Action 3.5 (SEL Curriculum) were instrumental in improving the district's standing on the California Dashboard, where suspension rates for "All Students" and Socio-economically Disadvantaged groups moved from the Orange into the Green categories. These behavioral supports, complemented by the Action 3.4 Life Skills course, contributed to a campus environment where the expulsion rate remained at 0%. Furthermore, Actions 3.2 and 3.3, which provided attendance incentives and leveraged community partnerships, successfully reduced the chronic absenteeism rate by 2.6%, elevating the "All Students" group to the Yellow category and moving disadvantaged students out of the Red category.

However, the actions have been somewhat ineffective in driving measurable growth in formal parent participation and meeting attendance. Despite a 4% increase in parents agreeing the school promotes involvement, actual survey participation fell from 23% to 21%, and the percentage of parents feeling included in decision-making dropped from 70% to 65%. Specific efforts to engage families of unduplicated students in formal meetings were also ineffective, as participation dipped to 14%, while total family participation in board or advisory meetings remained stagnant and low at 5%. Additionally, despite the focus on attendance incentives, the average student attendance rate saw a year-over-year regression of 1.76%, falling to 95.07%. These results suggest that while the district's actions have been successful at improving accountability markers like suspensions and chronic absenteeism, they have yet to produce the intended result of increasing broader parent and family engagement.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

At this time there are no planned changes to the goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions. The continued effectiveness of current actions in improving student outcomes, such as elevating suspension and chronic absenteeism rates into more positive categories on the California Dashboard. Educational partner feedback also indicates a strong desire to continue established programs like the Expanded Learning Opportunity Program (ELOP) and counseling program as currently implemented.

 - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
