Staff stated that ridership is currently down compared to the prior year third quarter for urban fixed route and rural paratransit.

Butte Regional Transit implemented a fare increase as of January 1, 2025. This quarter reflects the increase. All new fare prices can be found on the Butte Regional Transit website.

11: State Highway Operation and Protection Program Projects Update

There was discussion regarding the development of the 2026 State Highway Operations and Protection Program.

Multiple projects on the state highway system are being considered. BCAG staff met with Caltrans district 3 to discuss said projects.

BCAG staff presented the required plan to adopt a Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy to the Board.

12: TDA Triennial Performance Audits for FY 2021/22, FY 2022/23, and FY 2023/24

BCAG Executive Director stated that the California Public Utilities Code requires all Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPA) to conduct an independent Triennial Performance Audit in order to be eligible for Transportation Development Act funding.

BCAG selected Moore & Associates to prepare the Triennial Performance Audits. Moore & Associates is a consulting firm specializing in public transportation.

Butte Regional Transit will apply the FY 2025/26 allocation of \$382,151 for bus, bus shelter and stop improvements. This is a continuation of the FY 2024/25 SGR project.

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, establishing the State of Good Repair (SGR) program to fund eligible transit maintenance, rehabilitation and capital project activities that maintain the public transit system in a state of good repair; and

WHEREAS, Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) is an eligible project sponsor and may receive and distribute State Transit Assistance – SGR funds to eligible local agencies for eligible transit capital projects;

WHEREAS, BCAG is distributing SGR funds to eligible local agencies under its regional jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the region's share of SGR funds for FY 2025/26 is estimated by the State Controller's Office to be \$382,151; and

WHEREAS, BCAG concurs with and approves these funds for the following purposes:

Butte Regional Transit
Bus, Bus Shelter and Stop Improvements Project: \$382,151; and

WHEREAS, in order to qualify for these funds, the Butte County Association of Governments is required to submit a proposed project list to California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) on an annual basis; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Butte County Association of Governments hereby approves the SB1 State of Good Repair Project List for FY 2025/26; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Butte County Association of Governments that the fund recipient agrees to comply with all conditions and requirements set forth in the Certification and Assurances document and applicable statutes, regulations and guidelines for all SGR funded transit capital projects.

Summary: Annual outreach for recruitment to the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) has identified four existing Council members who would like to renew their terms, and six new individuals to add to the Council. Board approval is needed for these ten appointments under the TDA, Section PUC 99238 and will bring the total current SSTAC roster to 20 individuals

The SSTAC is required under the Transportation Development Act (TDA) to work with staff during the annual unmet transit needs process. The purpose of the SSTAC is to review testimony obtained through public workshops conducted during the annual unmet transit needs process, and to provide the BCAG Board of Directors with an unmet transit needs finding. The SSTAC also provides a forum to address other issues facing transportations' disabled citizens. The BCAG Board may make at-large appointments at any time.

A call for applicants was advertised in local newspapers in June 2025 and on the BCAG website, social media pages and the B-Line buses.

Summary: On October 18, 2023, BCAG entered into a capital construction contract with REM Construction, Incorporated of Chico, to build the Paradise Transit Center at a cost of \$1,706,554. The project was put into a weather suspension, with the first charged working day occurring on April 4, 2024. The project was completed June 30th, 2025 at a total cost of \$2,078,938 (+21.8%).

The largest contributor to the stated overage was a concrete quantity estimate error that was recognized in construction. Other realized increases were under the estimated construction contingencies. Identified federal and local funding sources identified prior to beginning construction were sufficient to cover the total project cost.



Enterprise (DBE) Program Document and Activity

Summary: The Department of Transportation (DOT) issued a Final Rule effective May 9, 2024, updating 49 CFR Section 26 in relation to the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program. As a recipient of funds from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and part of the agency's DBE program, BCAG is required to annually review and update, if necessary, its own DBE Program document, goal calculation and any related activity to ensure that it continues to meet standards required by this ruling and remains on track with goals and other requirements.

The full BCAG DBE program document was last updated in 2024. The full document does not expire, but any portions may be updated during the annual review process.

The current BCAG DBE Program document is available at the following link: https://www.bcag.org/documents/2024-BCAG-DBE-Program-Update-FINAL-8-22-24.pdf

For FY 25/26, these DBE related items have been reviewed and noted impacts are as follows:

- The only update noted in the program document review was a title change in the BCAG organizational chart (from Transit Manager to Transportation Grants Manager).
- There have been no significant changes in anticipated contracts or projects.
- The acquisition/loss of DBE contractors during the review year of FY 24/25 did not impact or require adjustment to the current three-year agency DBE goal of 1.35%.
 BCAG has been meeting or exceeding this goal over the course of the year, as noted in semi-annual reports submitted to the FTA and Caltrans.
- The next DBE Goal calculation for the 3-year period of 10/1/2026 through 9/30/2029 is due to the FTA on August 1, 2026.
- Other ongoing monitoring practices are being completed as required.

Action requested: Approve annual review of the DBE program, overall goal and related program activity.

Summary: Transportation Development Act (TDA) regulation requires the governing board of the regional transportation agency to approve by resolution all claims filed for the distribution of TDA funds. Fiscal Year 2025/26 TDA funds have been apportioned to each jurisdiction with the Findings of Apportionment approved by the BCAG Board on May 22, 2025.

Staff Report

A jurisdiction may file an expenditure plan to claim their TDA apportionment for projects in 2025/26 and may include unclaimed prior year apportionments. The expenditure plan allocates the apportionments to the prescribed uses within the TDA regulations and may also include allocations of previously distributed and unspent TDA funds that are in a locally held fund balance. If no projects are identified for the current apportionment, the funds are considered unallocated apportionment and are held by BCAG in the jurisdiction's name for use in future projects.

Use of the funds is prioritized by the TDA regulations. State Transit Act (STA) provides funding solely for public transportation services while Local Transportation Fund (LTF) allocation priorities are as follows:

- 1. TDA Administration
- 2. Transportation Planning and Programming
- 3. Pedestrian and Bicycle projects
- 4. Rail passenger and Transit services
- 5. Other transportation purposes, including streets and roads. These claims may only be apportioned when all other uses for the funds have been exhausted.

The Preliminary Expenditure Plan identifies the jurisdiction's use of funds in accordance with the requirements of the TDA. Butte Regional Transit (BRT) may claim operating and capital funds directly. The Cities and Town may claim funds for other transit needs, as well as bike and pedestrian, streets and roads projects. In the current year, the City of Biggs and the Town of Paradise have not submitted a preliminary claim and may do so a later time.

Staff have reviewed the attached claims and found them to be in compliance with TDA guidelines and within the apportionments approved by this Board. The attached resolution identifies the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and State Transit Assistance (STA) that has been claimed by the jurisdictions and allows for flexibility should minor adjustments to the form be necessary. Approval of the resolution initiates the distribution of current apportionments to the claimants.

The Final Expenditure Plans will be brought to the Board for approval later in the fiscal year after the FY24/25 TDA audits are complete.

BUTTE COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS RESOLUTION NO 2025/26-02

RESOLUTION OF THE PRELIMINARY ALLOCATION OF TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ACT (TDA) FUNDS TO THE BUTTE COUNTY JURISDICTIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025/26

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments has been designated by the Secretary of the State of California, Business and Transportation Agency, as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for Butte County, pursuant to the provisions of the Transportation Development Act of 1971, as amended; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Butte County Association of Governments, under the provision of the Transportation Development Act, to review transportation claims and make allocations of funds from the Local Transportation Fund and the State Transit Assistance fund based on the claims; and

WHEREAS, the Auditor of Butte County is required to pay monies in the fund to the claimants pursuant to allocation instructions received by him/her from the Butte County Association of Governments; and

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments has reviewed this claim for Transportation Development Act funds and has made the following findings and allocations:

- 1. The claimants proposed expenditures are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan.
- 2. The level of passenger fares and charges is sufficient to enable the operator or transit service claimant to meet the fare revenue requirements of Public Utilities Code Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.5, and 99268.9, as they may be applicable to the claimant.
- 3. The claimant is making full use of federal funds available under the Federal Transit Act, as amended.
- 4. The claimant has prepared and submitted the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and State Transit Assistance (STA) Fund Annual Project and Expenditure Plan.
- 5. The sum of the claimant's allocation from the State Transit Assistance Fund and the Local Transportation Fund does not exceed the amount the claimant is eligible to receive during the fiscal year.
- 6. Priority consideration has been given to claims to offset reductions in federal operating assistance and the unanticipated increase in the cost of fuel, to enhance existing public transportation services, and to meet high priority regional, countywide, or area wide public transportation needs.

- 7. The regional entity may allocate funds to an operator for the purposes specified in Section 6730 of the California Code of Regulations only if, in the resolution allocating the funds, it also finds the following:
 - a) The operator has made a reasonable effort to implement the productivity improvements recommended pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 99244. This finding shall make specific reference to the improvements recommended and to the efforts made by the operator to implement them.
 - b) For an allocation made to an operator for its operating costs, that the operator is not precluded by any contract entered into on or after June 28, 1979, from employment of part time drivers or from contracting with common carriers of persons operating under a franchise or license.
 - c) A certification by the Department of the California Highway Patrol verifying that the operator is in compliance with Section 1808.1 of the Vehicle Code, as required in Public Utilities Code Section 99251. The certification shall have been completed within the last 13 months, prior to filing claims.
 - d) The operator is in compliance with the eligibility requirements of Public Utilities Code Section 99314.6.

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Transportation is authorized to make grants to states through the Federal Transit Administration to support capital projects for non-urbanized public transportation systems under Section 5310 of the Federal Transit Act (FTA C 9070.1G); and

WHEREAS, the California Department of Transportation (Department) has been designated by the Governor of the State of California to administer Section 5310 grants for transportation projects for seniors and individuals with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) desires to apply for said financial assistance to permit operations of paratransit service in Butte County; and

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) has, to the maximum extent feasible, coordinated with other transportation providers and users in the region (including social service agencies);

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) Board of Directors does hereby authorize Andy Newsum, Executive Director, or Sara Cain, Transportation Grants Manager, to file and execute applications on behalf of the Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) with the Department to aid in the financing of capital projects pursuant to Section 5310 of the Federal Transit Act (FTA C 9070.1G) as amended.

That Andy Newsum, Executive Director, is authorized to execute and file all certification of assurances, contracts or agreements or any other document required by the Department.

That Andy Newsum, Executive Director, or Sara Cain, Transportation Grants Manager, are authorized to provide additional information as the

Department may require in connection with the application for the Section 5310 projects.

That Andy Newsum, Executive Director, Sara Cain, Transportation Grants Manager, or Julie Quinn, Chief Financial Officer, are authorized to submit and approve request for reimbursement of funds from the Department for the Section 5310 projects.

Project nominations are due September 4, 2025. Staff issued a call-for-projects at the August 7, 2025, Transportation Advisory Committee meeting.

Staff Report

The RTIP development process includes: 1) CTC development of a statewide 5-Year regional share fund estimate; 2) CTC update of STIP guidelines; 3) Regional submittal of RTIP's; and 4) CTC consolidation of RTIP's with the Caltrans Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP) for approval of the 2026 STIP. The RTIP development timeline is identified below:

The process for BCAG is to: 1) establish new programming capacity for the RTIP/STIP period for the 5 fiscal year period from FY 26/27 through FY 30/31; 2) assess current regional project needs including cost estimate updates; 3) develop a proposed program of projects consistent with the adopted RTP/SCS; and 4) adopt the 2026 RTIP in December for submission to the CTC by December 15, 2025.

Fund Estimate for FY 2026/27 through FY 2030/31

The CTC has made available the draft Fund Estimate for new programming. BCAG's share for the 2026 RTIP/STIP Period is \$3.603 million. This figure includes funds that would be directed to support BCAG's Planning, Programming and Monitoring efforts for the allowable 5% of regional share funds. The Fund Estimate breakdown is as follows:

Total Regional Target Share - \$3,603,000 Planning Programming and Monitoring - \$-339,000 New Programming Capacity - \$3,264,000

Requirements For All Projects

Implementing agencies are required to have master agreement with Caltrans. BCAG has identified 4 requirements for new project programming consideration. These requirements are defined in the STIP guidelines.

- Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy All projects are required to be included in the current <u>Regional TransportationPlan/Sustainable</u> Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS).
- **Project Study Reports** A complete project study report (PSR) or, for a projectthat is not on a State highway, a PSR equivalent.
- Criteria for Measuring Performance and Cost-Effectiveness Depending on the project, an appropriate level of performance metric demonstration is required. The criterion in the guidelines aims to capture: vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reductions, air quality benefits, mode shift, distance to transit service and safety benefits <u>as relevant to the project</u>.
- ePPR An Electronic Project Programming Request (ePPR) form is required. This
 electronic form identifies the basic scope, benefits, funding, and schedule for the
 proposed project. The ePPR can be generated thru CalSMART at:

BCAG Project Criteria Evaluation

Evaluation criteria will be based on the goals of the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI) built from the Governor's Executive Orders (EO) EO N-19-19 and N-79-20. These Executive Orders and the CAPTI are the basis for which ALL transportation funding is programmed thru BCAG. Additionally, BCAG is required to report progress on the Federal Performance Measures to FHWA and to California Air Resources Board (CARB) under SB 375 for achieved GHG reductions.

In an effort to meet the various existing state and federal goals including reporting requirements, RTIP project evaluation criteria are expected to focus on:

- Green House Gas (GHG) reduction
- Vehicle Miles Travel (VMT) reduction
- Development and integration of public transit with multimodal rail, bicycle, and pedestrian infrastructure (Mode Shift)
- Significant expansion of equitable transportation opportunities to underserved communities
- Safety

A RTIP public workshop was held on August 14, 2025, at 4:30 – 5:30 p.m. at the BCAG offices and via zoom.

Subject: State Route 70 Demonstration Funds Balance – Repurposing Project

Summary: BCAG has become aware of unused federal earmark funds originally secured for State Route 70 (Marysville Bypass to Oroville Freeway) as part of the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century for the period of 1998-2003. These funds were secured with the assistance of Congressman Wally Herger at the time. BCAG may "re-purpose" these funds provided certain criteria is met. Caltrans has identified \$879,918 that may be re-purposed.

Staff Report

Staff has reviewed the current FTIP projects in consultation with Caltrans and have identified the City of Oroville's Table Mountain and Washington Blvd Complete Streets Projects as meeting the requirements identified in the guidelines. A contributing factor is being able to obligate the funds immediately once they become available by Caltrans and FHWA before the end of the 2024/2025 federal fiscal year which ends on September 30, 2025.


The availability of these older funds was recently disclosed by Caltrans and guidance from FHWA was made known in July 2025. If these funds are re-obligated to a new project they are secured to the region without the threat of any potential recissions by the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Staff reached out to member agencies on potential projects that could meet the repurposing requirements and immediately obligate the funds. The City of Oroville's Table Mountain/ Washington Avenue Complete Streets project is currently obligated with Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Program and Highway Improvement Program (CMAQ/HIP) funds for Preliminary Engineering (PE). However, PE is funded at 50% design. The additional repurposed funds will bring the project to 100% design and support City staff resources needed for managing the project. This project will also be competing for Active Transportation Program (ATP) Cycle 8 funds. These resources will put the City of Oroville in a stronger position in competing for ATP Cycle 8 funds.

If the request to re-purpose the funds is approved, staff will amend the 2025 FTIP for the City of Oroville for the \$879,918 in federal funds and work with Caltrans and the City of Oroville to obligate the funds. Attachment 2 is 2025 Repurposing Timeline prepared by Caltrans.

Subject: Regional Traffic Data Collection – 2025/26

Contact: Brian Lasagna, Regional Analyst

Summary: BCAG has contracted with National Data & Surveying Services (NDS) to collect traffic data at 313 locations this coming fall beginning September 9, 2025. NDS will be utilizing cameras to collect volume, speed, and vehicle class data. NDS recently deployed cameras in the Chico area, for other projects, with success. In cases where cameras are not suitable, traditional tube counters will be utilized.

The current schedule calls for most of the locations to be collected between September and November 2025, with the remaining locations to be collected February – May 2026. BCAG staff is currently coordinating with local agencies to review roadway construction schedules and obtain permits/approval prior to collection.

All final deliverables are to be completed by June 30, 2026. Once finalized, the data collected will be used by BCAG in preparing the travel demand model for the 2028 RTP/SCS and distributed to local agencies for planning purposes.
