German is a sister language of English. So, many words that are easy to understand in German are, on the other hand, more difficult in other languages:

English

The house is brown. My brother sings well. The baby drinks milk. Here is my finger.

German

Das Haus ist braun. Mein Bruder singt gut. Das Baby trinkt Milch. Hier ist mein Finger.

Spanish

La casa es parda. Mi hermano canta bien. El niño bebe leche. Aquí está mi dedo.

French

La maison est brune. Mon frère chante bien. Le bébé boit du lait. Voici mon doigt.

Why study German?

Top Ten Reasons:

- 1. German is the most widely spoken language in Europe. German is spoken in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Luxemburg, Liechtenstein, as well as large populations in northern Italy, eastern Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark, and many parts of Eastern Europe.
- 2. German is an important language for business. Germany has the 3rd strongest economy and is the #1 export nation in the world. How many German companies in the US can you name? BMW, Mercedes, Audi, Siemens, SAP, BASF, and Bosch the list goes on. By the way, Japan is the 2nd strongest world economy and 68% of Japanese students study German.
- 3. German is a valuable language for STEM students because Germany is a global leader in engineering and innovation, offering excellent job opportunities in prestigious companies. Learning German provides access to cutting-edge research, prestigious universities, and tuition-free higher education programs in Germany and other German-speaking countries.
- 4. German gives you access to the rich, world-renowned cultural achievements of the German-speaking countries. Music, art, literature, philosophy, psychology, film –contributions to these fields by German speakers are so phenomenal that you can recognize them by last names only: Mozart, Bach, Beethoven, Strauss, Wagner, Dürer, Klimt, Kirchner, Goethe, Kafka, Brecht, Hesse, Kant, Hegel, Marx, Nietzsche, Freud, Jung, Dietrich, Lang, Lubitsch, Fassbinder are some names you may know.
- **5.** Germans form the largest single heritage group in the U.S. German Americans are the largest heritage group in the US. You probably don't even recognize their profound influence: kindergarten, Christmas trees, Levi's jeans, even hamburgers and hot dogs were introduced by Central Europeans.
- 6. German is the second-most commonly used research language. Natural sciences, social sciences, engineering, technology, the arts and humanities – German can greatly enhance your study of almost any field (many graduate programs even require it for reading knowledge).
- 7. Germany has a long history as a high tech center. You know about the printing press, theory of relativity, and diesel motor, but what about the MP3 all German innovations. Today, Germany is a leader in biotechnology, software and microchip development.
- 8. German is an important language for media and telecommunications. Germany's country domain .de is second only to the extension .com, 1 in 10 books in the world is published in German, and there are roughly 80,000 new titles in German each year (only Chinese and English have more). Munich is the 2nd largest publishing capital of the world.
- 9. The German-speaking countries are leaders in international education. Students from around the world choose to study numerous fields in Germany, Austria, and Switzerland. The German government alone sponsors over 60,000 international exchanges each year.
- **10.** It's fun to learn German and it's not as hard as you think. If your native language is English, you have a head start in learning German, which, like English, is a Germanic language, which means that there are many similarities in vocabulary and grammar. See for yourself......
