Superintendent's Report - The Superintendent presented a report tied into the District's Culture of Excellence. An example was given of a recent band class Superintendent Shoemake attended at PGMS. He observed Band Instructor Mr. Manley teaching finer points of music sequences and addressing the attentive class as they improved on a piece in the minutes the Superintendent was there. The report also touched on school community events that include extended families from Grandparent Breakfast to Ice Cream Socials for visits from extended family and friends. These gatherings help to establish and maintain connectedness among students and greater investment in our schools.

2. RISE Summer Program 2025

(Information Only)

Lake Forest Principal and RISE Program leader Dr. Renee Mallot presented the report along with Debbie Faleschini, a teacher in RUSD and a program assistant who helped manage this past summer's RISE Program. This summer's RISE program had 520 kids enrolled. The program continues to grow. Curriculum and classes are well-rounded and include STEAM, Art, and P.E. Parents and students alike love the program for the enrichment opportunities and chances to meet new friends from schools across the District. Qualitative and quantitative data showed students' academic improvement in the program.

Regulation 5131.62: Tobacco

Original Adopted Date: 09/01/2004 | Last Reviewed Date: 10/07/2025

Tobacco-Use Prevention Education Program

The district's tobacco-use prevention program shall provide students in grades 6-8 instruction which addresses the following topics: (Health and Safety Code 104420)

- 1. Immediate and long-term undesirable physiologic, cosmetic, and social consequences of tobacco use
- 2. Reasons that adolescents say they smoke or use tobacco
- 3. Peer norms and social influences that promote tobacco use
- 4. Refusal skills for resisting social influences that promote tobacco use

As appropriate, the district shall provide or refer students to tobacco-use intervention and cessation activities. (Health and Safety Code 104420)

These services shall be directed toward current users and shall be voluntary for students who desire assistance in ceasing the use of tobacco.

Tobacco Use Prevention Education

Instruction for students in grades 4 through 8 shall address the following topics: (Health and Safety Code 104420)

- 1. Immediate and long-term undesirable physiologic, cosmetic and social consequences of tobacco use
- 2. Reasons that adolescents say they smoke or use tobacco
- 3. Peer norms and social influences that promote tobacco use
- 4. Refusal skills for resisting social influences that promote tobacco use

The district's program for grades 9 through 12 shall:

- 1. Target current smokers and students who are most at risk for beginning to use tobacco, including young women, low-achieving students, students from families whose members include tobacco users, and students who associate with peers who use tobacco
- 2. Offer or refer students to precessation readiness classes or cessation classes for current smokers
- 3. Utilize existing antismoking resources

Policy 5141.7: Sun Safety

Original Adopted Date: Pending

The Governing Board recognizes that overexposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun and artificial sources such as sunlamps and tanning beds is linked to the development of skin cancer, eye damage, premature aging, and a weakened immune system and that children are particularly vulnerable to the effects of overexposure. The Board desires to support the prevention of excessive UV radiation exposure by students and to assist students in developing sun-safe habits to use throughout their lives.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a developmentally appropriate prevention/intervention program for grades K-12 to prevent student overexposure to UV radiation. He/she may coordinate sun safety and UV radiation education and policy efforts with the California Department of Public Health, the local health department, and other local agencies and/or community organizations. He/she shall involve students, parents/guardians, and the community in support of such school-based programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall incorporate sun safety elements into the curriculum in order to increase students' understanding of the health risks associated with overexposure to UV radiation from the sun or artificial sources and to encourage students to engage in preventive practices.

Students shall be encouraged to take reasonable measures to protect their skin and eyes from overexposure to the sun while on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of district employees.

To encourage and assist students to avoid overexposure to the sun when they are outdoors:

- 1. Students shall be allowed to wear sun-protective clothing, including, but not limited to, hats. (Education Code 35183.5)
- 2. Students shall be allowed to wear UV-protective sunglasses outdoors.
- 3. Students shall be allowed to use sunscreen during the school day without a physician's note or prescription. (Education Code 35183.5)

Those students using sunscreen shall be encouraged to apply sunscreen at least 15-20 minutes prior to any outdoor activity that will require prolonged exposure to the sun. School personnel shall not be required to assist students in applying sunscreen.

4. Students shall be allowed to use UV-protective lip balm.

The Superintendent or designee shall evaluate the adequacy of shaded and/or indoor areas for recreation at each school and shall consider the provision of sufficient shaded areas in plans for new construction or modernization of facilities.

The Superintendent or designee may monitor the UV Index and modify outdoor school activities with regard to the risk of harm associated with the Index level.

Staff shall be encouraged to model recommended sun-safe behaviors, such as avoiding excessive sun exposure, using sunscreen, and wearing hats and other sun-protective clothing.

The Superintendent or designee shall inform school staff and parents/guardians of the district's sun safety measures and shall encourage parents/guardians to provide sunscreen, lip balm, hats, and other sun-protective clothing for their children to use at school. The Superintendent or designee also may provide information to parents/guardians about the risks of overexposure to UV radiation and preventive measures they may take to protect their children

during nonschool hours.

With the passage of Prop 28 on November 8, 2022, Rescue Union School District schools have received funding for Art and Music programs. Each school site has received the funds and has three years to utilize their funds. This program is expected to continue annually, with new funds each year and three years to spend each allocation. Schools must ensure that at least 80% is spent on certificated or classified staff salaries.

STATUS:

Rescue USD schools have created plans to use their funds the year after funds are received to ensure if there are any delays in receiving the AMS funds, we have time to plan. In 2024-25, AMS funds were spent, and we are required to submit an annual report to CDE to include how many staff were funded and how many students benefited from AMS funds.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The AMS funds are included in the District Budget, and it is a self-sufficient program.

OPERATIONAL AGREEMENT between Rescue Union School District and New Morning Youth & Family Services

INTRODUCTION

The intent of this Operational Agreement between the Rescue Union School District and New Morning Youth & Family Services is to confirm a mutual commitment to work in partnership to support youth in at-risk environments with the aim of improving their emotional health and school performance. New Morning Youth & Family Services provides professional counseling for issues such as substance abuse, pregnancy, parental neglect, suicidal ideation, depression, anxiety, family conflicts, and physical, sexual or emotional abuse.

TERMS OF AGREEMENT

This Operational Agreement will be upheld between the period of **July 1**, **2025 and June 30**, **2028**, and will be considered renewable each year unless either party chooses to request this Operational Agreement be voided (given 30 days notice).

RESPONSIBLITIES

The Rescue Union School District agrees to:

- 1. Refer students and families to New Morning Youth & Family Services that would benefit from agency services;
- 2. Post relevant New Morning materials describing the agency's services and activities at its various school sites;
- When counseling is provided at a school site, provide New Morning counselors a room to conduct counseling sessions, with the understanding that the counseling location must enhance client confidentiality;
- 4. If a counselor is based on a district campus, provide locked file cabinets and telephone access and means to receive messages;
- 5. Provide office support (copying, phones, etc) as necessary to increase New Morning's capability to serve its clients;
- 6. Provide access to a computer network that provides information on student attendance, grades, schedule, etc. or staff who can provide input on school site information;
- 7. Obtain an up-to-date fire inspection clearance as required;

8. As funding permits, contract with New Morning to provide professional therapy to referred students at Rescue Union School District schools.

New Morning Youth & Family Services agrees to:

- 1. To the best of its ability and as funding allows, provide the following services:
 - Assign therapists on school sites to provide individual and/or group support for at-risk students, group support for parents, and individuals with substance abuse issues;
 - b. A substitute counselor will not normally be placed, in the event of illness, unless such illness becomes long-term; and
 - c. Collaboration/cooperation with other agencies participating in the other Rescue Union School District collaborative efforts.
- Prior to finalizing the assignment of New Morning counselors to particular school sites, the school's principal or his/her designee shall be given opportunity to meet with the prospective counselor and to provide input, as needed, to the Executive Director and/or Associate Director of Programming of New Morning;
- 3. Provide supervision of counselor(s) by New Morning's Associate Director of Programming and the assigned clinical supervisor;
- 4. Rescue Union School District with verification of therapist's fingerprint clearance from the California Department of Justice upon request;
- 5. Refer students and families as appropriate to other agencies; and
- 6. Coordinate with Rescue Union School District staff and with other service-providing agencies in the community as needed.
