Celtic Origins of Halloween

Did you know that Halloween started about 2,000 years ago with the Celts? They held a yearly festival called Samhain (SAH-win) on November 1st. People would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts.

They also started the tradition of carving pumpkins, although they used turnips instead. There was an old tale about a man named Stingy Jack. He consistently trapped the Devil and only let him go when he agreed never to take Jack to Hell. When Jack died, he found out that he wouldn't be able to go to Heaven either. Now, he wanders the earth holding a gift from the Devil: A carved turnip with a piece of coal in the center.

There are two main theories about how trick-ortreating began. The first one is that people left food out for the wandering spirits in an attempt to appease them. Then, people began to dress as those spirits to receive offerings of their own. Finally, there is a theory that suggests poor people would collect food and money from people and, in return, would give prayers to the dead. Eventually, they stopped offering prayers and instead performed songs, games, and other "tricks."

Caramel Apple Pie Bombs

Apple filling

2 apples, peeled and finely chopped

2 tbsp brown sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

Pinch of salt

1 tbsp butter (melted)



1 can (16.3 oz) refrigerated biscuit dough

8 pieces soft caramel candy

2 tbsp butter (melted)

Cinnamon sugar (optional)

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°F and grease a medium baking dish

Melt butter in a medium saucepan over mediumhigh heat

Add in apples, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt Cook, stirring occasionally, for about 5 minutes until apples are fork tender and the mixture is bubbling

After cooked, set mixture aside to cool briefly Remove biscuits from can and stretch each biscuit slightly to form a thin, even circle

Add about 1 tablespoon of apple filling into the center of each biscuit

Add one caramel candy on top of the filling
Pinch dough together to seal filling into a ball
Place each dough ball into greased dish seam side

Brush top of all dough balls with butter and sprinkle cinnamon sugar on top

Bake for 30-35 minutes or until golden brown Make sure to let them cool before serving, for some extra pizazz top with vanilla ice cream and caramel


