Since 1973, California High School, locally known as Cal High, has provided students with an enriched and challenging academic program by piloting and implementing innovative programs and instruction. Located in San Ramon, our student body is reflective of the surrounding community and greater San Francisco Bay Area. Situated approximately 35 miles east of San Francisco, San Ramon is a suburban community whose residents are professionals in the high-tech industry, retail, education, healthcare, business and service industries. The CHS student body mirrors its community's socio-economic and educational diversity. The approximate ethnic/racial make-up of our student population is: 50.7% Asian, 26.9% Caucasian, 11.4% Hispanic, 8.3% Two or more races, 1.9% African American, 0.4% Pacific Islander, 0.3% American Indian/Alaskan Native. There are 117 certificated teachers on staff this year.

Dual Enrollment Programs

College Connect – This program offered by the school district to support students in completing up to 30 units of transferable college credits at Diablo Valley College prior to graduation from high school. These credits are aligned with Inter-segmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) requirements.

Welding Certificate Program – This program is offered in partnership with Las Positas College in Livermore. Through this program high school juniors and seniors enroll in a shortened high school schedule to attend college courses to earn a Production Certificate in Welding.

Construction Certificate Program – This program is offered in partnership with Diablo Valley College. Through this program high school juniors and seniors enroll in a shortened high school schedule to attend college courses to earn a Pre-Apprenticeship Certificate in Construction Trades.

Information & Policies

Grading System

- Students earn 5 credits per semester course they pass with a D- or higher. GPA is calculated on a 4-point scale, with C's or higher in Honors (H) or Advanced Placement (AP) courses receiving an additional honors point. +/- do not impact GPA. Athletics and Teacher's Aide do not earn letter grades, earning a P/NP instead and are not factored into GPA.
- Rank/Decile is not computed per District Policy.
- Quarter grades cannot be provided as they are for internal use only.

Academic Policies

- Students must enroll in a 5 or 6 period day for all four years of high school.
- Students may enroll in a seventh class, but freshman and sophomores are only able to if the class is part of a specific academic or co-curricular program (Academic Studies, Journalism, Leadership, Mock Trial, Performing Arts, Publications, Project Lead the Way or AVID).
- If a student withdraws from a class after the 3rd week of a semester, they will receive a NM (No Mark) or F on their transcript, per teacher discretion.
- Students may opt to take up to 40 credits of subject/elective requirements through approved outside institutions. There are other flexible options available to students through our Personalized Learning program. SRVUSD Personalized Learning [website](#).

Updates

- Due to significant district-wide budget reductions, students may not have received their top choice course selections at a higher rate than previous years.
- Students may only enroll in one lab science course per academic year. They may request an additional science elective or pathway course.
- AVID was reimplemented at Cal High for the class of 2028.

ACT/SAT

Per District Policy, we will not be reporting on ACT/SAT data for the class of 2026 due to low sample size.

Advanced Placement Scores

In May 2025, 2525 exams were taken by 1147 students with a percentage of 91.8% total AP students earning scores of 3+.

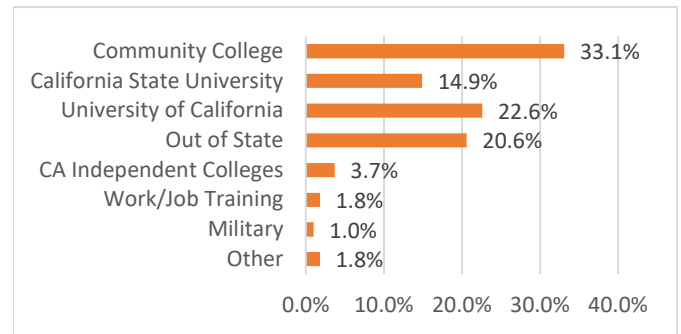

Project Lead the Way Pathways (PLTW)
