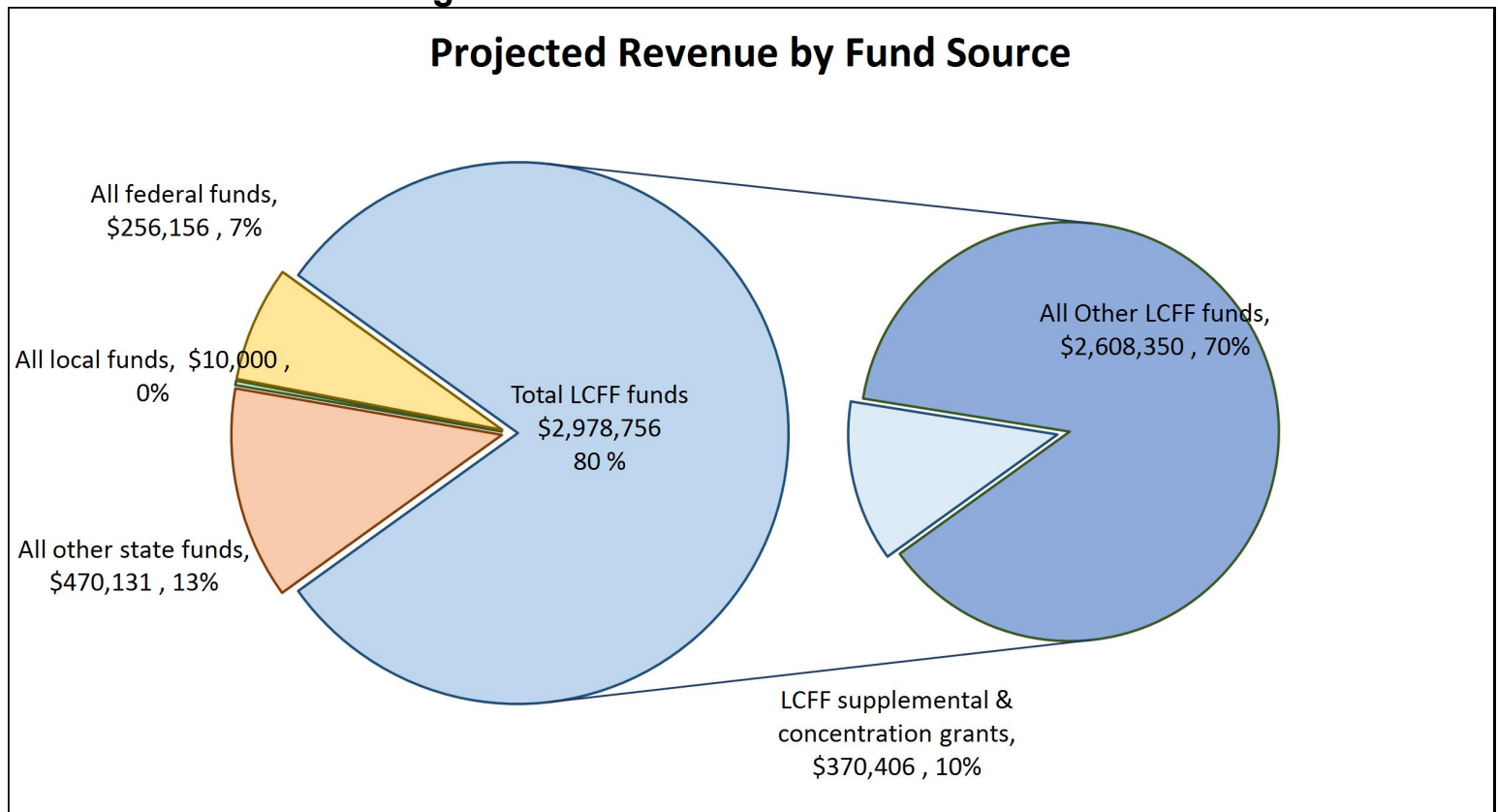

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

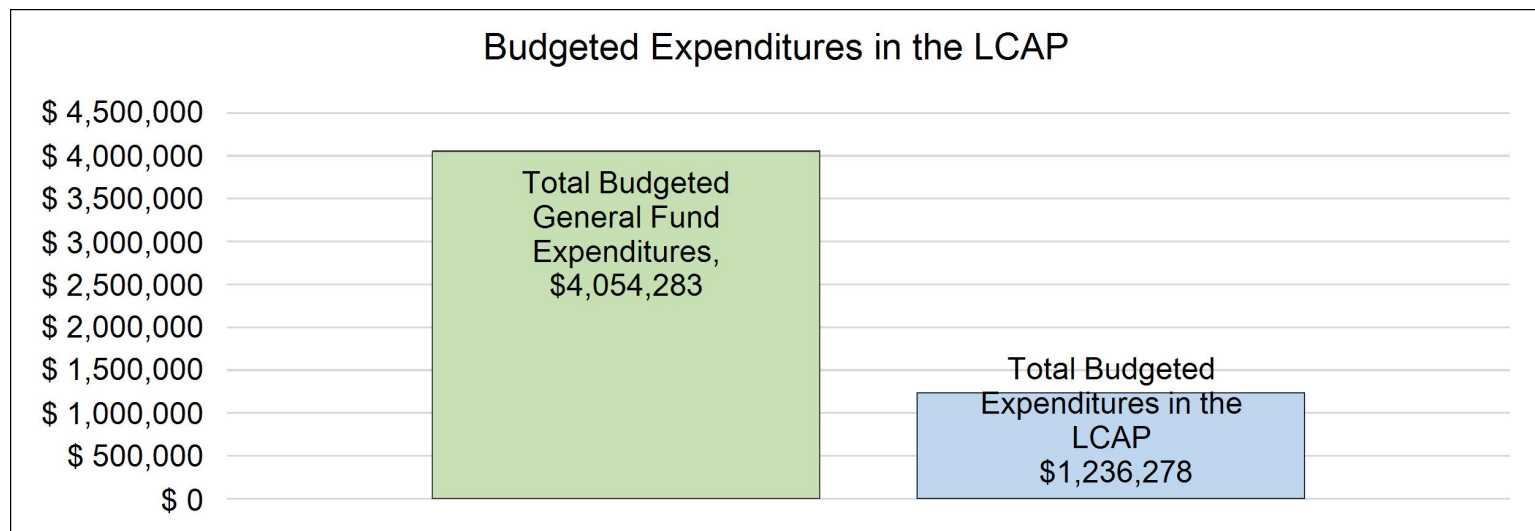


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Long Valley School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Long Valley School is \$3,715,043, of which \$2,978,756 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$470,131 is other state funds, \$10,000 is local funds, and \$256,156 is federal funds. Of the \$2,978,756 in LCFF Funds, \$370,406 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

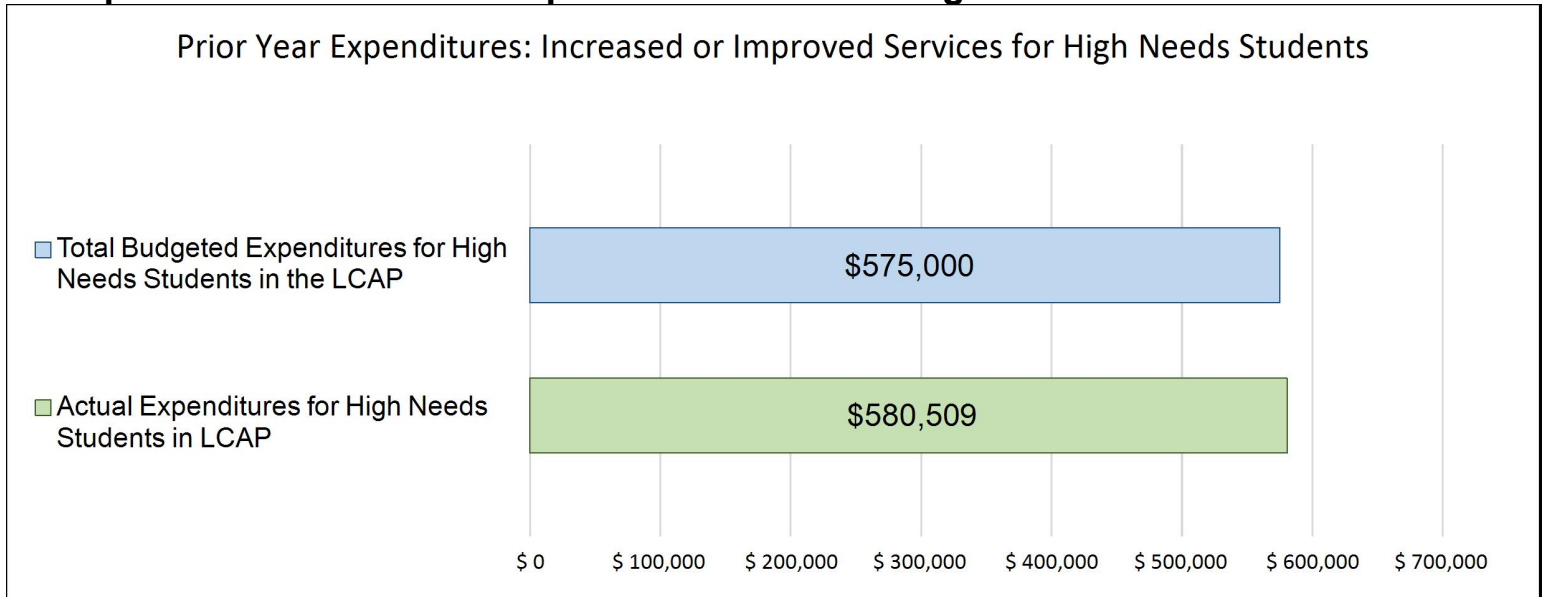
The school has \$2,828,005 not included in this LCAP. Those funds not included are salaries & benefits: \$2,063,070; materials/ supplies: \$142,441; operations/services: \$491,574; and other outlay/capital expenditures: \$112,920.

Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

In 2026-27, Long Valley School is projecting it will receive \$370,406 based on the enrollment of Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students. Long Valley School must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the LCAP. Long Valley School plans to spend \$556,500 towards meeting this requirement, as described in the LCAP.

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Long Valley School (LVS) is authorized by Fort Sage Unified School District for the charter period of 7/1/2019-6/30/2027.

Long Valley School is operated by Long Valley Charter School, a California non-profit corporation. Its main office is located in the Long Valley School in Doyle. The school currently serves students in grade TK-12 and includes the following programs:

- Doyle: TK-8 classroom-based program
- Doyle: TK-8 independent study program
- Doyle: 9-12 blended independent study program with the option to attend classes 2-3x per week
- Portola: Independent Study Resource Center located in Portola offering blended learning to TK-12 students.

The 1.4 CALPADS Snapshot Report for the 2025-26 school year provides the following ethnicity/race of the 225 enrolled Long Valley students.

According to the 1.17 CALPADS Snapshot Report for the 2025-26 school year, Long Valley School has a total enrollment of 225 students in grades TK-12. Of those, 134 students qualified for free or reduced-price meals. Two students are identified as homeless, one student is identified as foster, and two students are English Learners, respectively. The total unduplicated count is 147 students or approximately 65% of the school's student population.

As of May 15, 2026, SEIS records indicate 38 students as having exceptional needs, representing 17% of the school's population.

Long Valley School actively identifies homeless students as part of the enrollment process. To better serve students experiencing housing insecurity, a housing information form is included as part of the enrollment packet, and office staff are trained to help families complete the form while at the same time looking for signs of inadequate housing. Signage describing student rights under the McKinney-Vento Act are posted in conspicuous areas. Partnering with Lassen County's Foster Youth Coordinator and other local foster agencies, Long Valley Charter School works to provide a supportive environment for foster students, when enrolled. Credit waivers under AB 167 are available for consideration to assist such students in meeting graduation requirements.

The school collaborated with staff, families, and educational partners to update its vision statement and ensure that it accurately reflects our students. Long Valley School's vision statement is as follows: Long Valley Charter School envisions every student becoming lifelong learners, pursuing meaningful work, and participating in civic activities.

The charter is using this LCAP as its Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) as permitted by law. There are no schools identified to receive equity multiplier funds.

Reflections: Annual Performance

Dashboard Data Reflects -

Analysis of CAASPP Performance Data for 2025-26:

The 2025-26 CAASPP results for Long Valley School found growth over English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics from previous year results. In ELA, 34% of students met or exceeded grade level standards. Socioeconomically disadvantaged (SED) performed lower with 27% on or above grade level and only 12% of students with disabilities (SWD) demonstrated proficiency. Math performance increased from previous year results, 11% of students on or above grade level. 8% of SED students showed proficiency while no SWD met grade level standards. These outcomes highlight a need for additional focus in math intervention across all student groups.

Local Assessment Data for 2025-26:

I-Ready diagnostic assessment data for the 2025-26 school year demonstrates steady academic growth in both Reading and Mathematics. The percentage of students performing on or above grade level in ELA increased from 18% in the fall, to 26% in the winter, and reached 31% by spring. At the same time, the group of students at two or more grade levels below reduced from 50% to 35% from fall to spring showing movement out of tier 3. The median progress to annual typical growth for reading was 95% (48% of students met their typical growth goals).

The percentage of students performing on or above grade level in Math increased from 6.5% in fall, to 15% in winter, and 21% in spring. Movement out of tier 3 (2 or more grade levels below) was seen moving from 58% of students to 35% from fall to spring. The median progress to annual typical growth for mathematics was 66% (36% of students met their typical growth goals).

In review of the California school dashboard, no student groups scored in the lowest performance group.

English Learner Achievement for 2025-26

Not reported due to limited numbers and confidentiality.

The 2025 Long Valley School Dashboard shows a chronic absenteeism rate of 8.5%, a 5.2% decrease from the previous year. Using a more formalized process for attendance accountability, the school has seen this decrease.

For the 2024–25 school year, Long Valley School's graduation rate increased by 4.4% to 77.8%. This rate fluctuates annually due to the small size of the number of graduates.

Behavior Data for 2024-25: During the 2024–25 school year, Long Valley School reported a 3% suspension rate and no expulsions. While expulsions remained at zero, the suspension rate indicates a continued need for consistent implementation of restorative practices, positive behavior interventions, and staff training to support a safe and inclusive learning environment.

During the 23/24 school year, the school hired a mental health counselor to support our students, but regrettably, the counselor has resigned. In response, we are actively recruiting for this vital position and provide virtual counseling services in the interim. Additionally, the school continues to implement a Social Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum across all grade levels, from TK through 12th, to assist students in managing their emotions effectively.

CCI for 2024-25:

Long Valley School has 21 students included in the CCI report. Of these students, 29% were classified as prepared, 24% as approaching prepared. 8 students completed at least one CTE pathway. While no students met a-g requirements, 4 students completed at least two semesters of dual enrollment courses.. These results highlight the need to strengthen both academic and career readiness supports, including increased enrollment in a-g coursework and structured advising to ensure all students graduate college- and career-ready.

School Climate -

Student and parent survey data across both Doyle and Portola campuses highlighted strengths in school communication and caring adult relationships, as well as areas for continued improvement in student safety and engagement. Elementary students overwhelmingly reported feeling safe at school and supported by kind and caring adults. Many noted that classrooms were clean, learning was fun, and their teachers helped them track progress. Among grades 6–12, students reported positive relationships with staff. Parent feedback was largely positive, with most agreeing that their children feel safe and that school staff create a welcoming environment. Doyle parents expressed a stronger desire to feel connected to the school.

Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant

As planned, Long Valley fully expended this grant during the 2025-26 school year.

The school continues to be guided by our strategic plan, which outlines clearly defined priorities to enhance our educational environment and improve student outcomes. The first priority is the development of a passionate and innovative staff committed to making learning engaging and meaningful. The second priority focuses on elevating student academic achievement through the design of effective instructional models that serve both independent study and traditional classroom settings. The third priority is ensuring a safe, healthy, and supportive school environment that fosters the well-being and success of all students.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

The development of our adopted LCAP was significantly shaped by the feedback provided by our educational partners, encompassing teachers, students, and parents, community members, each bringing unique perspectives that directly influenced our strategic priorities and actions.

Teachers emphasized the importance of enhancing student achievement in mathematics and English Language Arts as measured by the CAASPP. They gave feedback to discontinue efforts on project-based learning as they are delving into Universal Design for Learning. They are especially interested in improving student engagement. They also noted they wanted to continue the efforts in improving students writing pre-arranged lessons. Recognizing the broader needs of our student body, teachers also highlighted the necessity of reinforcing our mental health support services as well as receiving supports with behavior management. These priorities are reflected in the actions.

Students voiced their appreciation for knowing what they are to learn and the kindness that the teachers show them. Actions to support this include student-led conferences and implementing a social-emotional learning programs. They also voiced they enjoy the fun activities they get to take part in at school.

Parents reiterated the importance of boosting student academic achievement and called for stronger behavioral supports. Additionally, they stressed the importance of sustained and effective communication between the school and families to ensure that parents remain well-informed and actively involved in their children's education. Actions to support this include the use of Parent Square communication, student-led conferences, and para-educators in the classrooms.

In response to these articulated needs, our LCAP has been intentionally crafted to prioritize key areas of focus. It includes strategic actions to elevate academic performance through enhanced instructional training and support for teachers (1.5 Standards Training, 1.10 Teacher Repository, 2.11 Tutoring/ Student Support and 2.14 Project-based Learning); expand mental health services to promote student well-being (3.3 SEL Training & Relationship Building and 3.4 Anti-bullying/ Behavioral Supports); and strengthen communication channels to ensure ongoing engagement with parents (3.7-Parent/Family Outreach). By integrating this feedback into the LCAP, we aim to create a more inclusive, effective, and supportive educational environment that reflects the needs and goals of our school community.

By identifying areas for growth and excellence, we ensure that our instructional staff is always improving. Additionally, we invest in professional development, specifically in mastery-based learning, to empower teachers to implement personalized, student-centered instruction that meets the varied learning paces and styles of our students. Encouraging enrollment in foreign language courses is another critical component, broadening students' cultural perspectives and enhancing their global competencies. Finally, we aim to instill a sense of student agency, helping students believe in their ability to influence their learning and outcomes. By fostering an environment where students feel empowered and engaged, we prepare them for lifelong learning and success. The school will measure progress towards this goal through the metrics listed below.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The actions identified within this goal were implemented as planned and adopted, reflecting strong progress toward the goal. Three actions were partially implemented due to staffing limitations:

1. Training/Support for Academic State Standards was not fully implemented, Action 1.5, due to lack of qualified staff available to lead and sustain the training calendar. Competing administrative priorities further constrained full implementation.
2. ELD trainings were not completed, Action 1.6, due to lack of staff available to lead trainings.
3. Essential Standards refinement beyond ELA was not fully completed, Action 1.11, due to staff shortages that limited the capacity to address the required components of the work.

Successes for this goal include the creation of a middle school repository of assignments and the refinement of a high school repository during 2025-26, providing all teachers access to a centralized collection of resources to support student engagement and instructional planning. Additionally, one hundred percent of students continued to have access to their own copies of standards-aligned instructional materials for use at school and at home, maintaining the baseline target with no decrease.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

- 1.1 Support Credentials Clearing Activities; 7,200-\$1,000; No teachers were in a credential clearing program this year.
- 1.2-Teacher Competencies; \$15,654-\$17,506; staff time didn't consider prior year increase.
- 1.3-Internet Servers & Support; \$30,000-\$46,165; services with LCOE were underestimated.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Based on a review of metrics and outcomes, the implementation of actions within Goal 1 reflected varying levels of effectiveness, with the majority of actions producing meaningful results.

Teacher Quality and Credentialing (Actions 1.1 and 1.2 | Metrics 1.1 and 1.11):

Actions 1.1 and 1.2 were effective in supporting teacher quality and growth. The increase in teachers without fully cleared credentials from Year 1 to Year 2 is likely attributed to the hiring of new teachers beginning the credential clearing process and the challenge of recruiting fully credentialed teachers in a rural community, rather than a lack of effectiveness of the action. Teacher self-reported ratings of instructional

practice reflected sustained growth from baseline, indicating that ongoing professional development and competency-based evaluation continued to positively support staff.

Instructional Materials and Technology Access (Actions 1.3, 1.4, 1.8, and 1.9 | Metrics 1.2 and 1.5):

The actions supporting instructional materials and technology access continued to demonstrate effectiveness in ensuring equitable access for all students. All students maintained access to standards-aligned instructional materials and a broad course of study with no change from baseline, and internet hotspot access ensured equitable access to online curriculum for low-income families.

Standards Implementation (Actions 1.5 and 1.6 | Metrics 1.3 and 1.4):

Action 1.5 was effective as staff survey data reflects significant growth from baseline across most content areas despite incomplete implementation. As the Curriculum and Instruction Administrator position was eliminated, administrators carried out standards trainings, demonstrating commitment to maintaining forward progress. Action 1.6 was ineffective as ELD trainings were not completed due to staffing limitations, and declines from Year 1 to Year 2 reflect the impact of those limitations on sustaining earlier gains. . The school contracted with a coach who began providing ongoing Universal Design for Learning (UDL) training in March 2026. The coach will continue working with staff throughout the 2026–27 school year to strengthen understanding and implementation of UDL principles. In addition, the recent hire of an instructional coach has increased the school's capacity to plan, coordinate, and deliver standards-based and ELD trainings, providing more consistent support for staff implementation in the coming year.

Foreign Language Access (Action 1.7 | Metrics 1.6, 1.7, and 1.8):

Action 1.7 was effective in maintaining foreign language course offerings for middle and high school students at both sites. However, survey data reflects declines from baseline in positive responses across all student groups. To improve outcomes, the school will seek student input to better align course offerings with student interest.

Instructional Materials Inventory (Action 1.9 | Metric 1.9):

Action 1.9 was effective. The school followed the Governing Board's adoption cycle to purchase standards-aligned instructional materials, purchased devices and laptops according to the technology aging schedule, and utilized the Alexandria library system for maintaining inventory, ensuring all students had adequate access to instructional materials throughout the year.

Essential Standards (Action 1.11 | Metric 1.10):

Action 1.11 was ineffective. While ELA essential standards were developed in the prior year, no additional essential standards work was completed in math, science, or social studies during 2025-26. Staff shortages prevented the school from advancing the required components of this work beyond what had previously been established. The school will focus on math essential standards development in 2026-27.

Teacher Repository and Student Engagement (Action 1.10 | Metric 1.12):

Action 1.10 was effective in establishing a centralized resource repository for teachers at both sites, providing a foundation for collaborative instructional planning. However, survey data reflects declines from baseline in student engagement and agency, indicating that the existence of the repository alone has not been sufficient to produce the targeted result for students. To improve outcomes, the school will focus on providing staff training on how to effectively utilize the repository to design and deliver engaging lessons that promote student agency and ownership of learning.

Training/ Support for Academic State Standards (Action 1.5) will be modified to reflect the transition from the Curriculum and Instruction Administrator position to an Instructional Coach, and the training timeline will be updated to remove the specification of weekly trainings, allowing for greater flexibility in scheduling trainings to meet staff needs.

Essential Standards (Action 1.1) will be modified to focus solely on the development of math essential standards for the 2026-27 school year, reflecting the need to concentrate efforts on advancing the required components of this work before expanding to additional content areas.

All other goals, metrics, target outcomes, and actions remain unchanged for the coming year.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

This goal ensures all students demonstrate growth toward meeting or exceeding standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and math assessments, while increasing career and college preparedness, is a response to the significant academic challenges our students face. This goal aligns with State Priorities 4, 5, 7, and 8, emphasizing academic achievement and readiness for post-secondary success.

Recent assessment data highlights the urgency of this goal. In the 2022-23 school year, only 31.92% of all students met grade-level standards in ELA, with stark disparities among Students with Disabilities (SWD) at 8.33% and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (SED) students at 25.85%. Math results were even more concerning, with just 16.31% of all students meeting grade-level standards, 8.33% for SWD, and 10.12% for SED students. Additionally, the rate of A-G completers remains critically low, with 0% of students meeting this benchmark in 2022-23. Benchmark assessment data for the 2023-24 school year shows that only 20% of students in grades 1-6 are meeting reading expectations, and a mere 8% are meeting mathematics expectations. In grades 7-11, 28% are meeting reading expectations, and 15% are meeting mathematics expectations. These figures fall significantly short of the school's goals of 50% in ELA/Reading and 35% in mathematics for grades K-6, and 60% in ELA/Reading and 35% in mathematics for grades 7-11.

To address these issues, the school will prioritize Rtl, tutoring, MTSS Tier 1 supports, increased direct instruction in math and ELA for the independent study site, as well as improving writing skills across all grade levels. All of these actions were identified as a critical area of need through both quantitative and qualitative data.

This goal reflects our commitment to addressing academic deficiencies and ensuring all students are prepared for college and career success. Through targeted interventions, consistent assessment, and a focus on writing, we strive to create a supportive and effective learning environment that meets the needs of our student population.

The actions identified within this goal were implemented as planned and adopted, reflecting the school's continued commitment to improving instructional practice and supporting student learning. Two actions were not fully implemented:

1. Schoolwide Writing was not fully implemented, Action 2.7, due to staffing shortages that prevented the establishment of the planned cross-grade writing team. These staffing limitations also reduced the school's capacity to provide professional development focused on writing data analysis and slowed implementation of the schoolwide writing pacing guide.
2. Project-Based Learning professional development and course development were not completed, Action 2.14, due to staffing shortages and the elimination of the Curriculum and Instruction Administrator position. As a result, teachers did not receive the planned training and were unable to begin development of new project-based learning courses during the 2025–26 school year.

Successes within this goal include the high number of CTE pathway completers, increase in students being prepared for college and career, and increase in grade level understanding for Spring 2025 i-Ready math and ELA for all students.

Based on a review of metrics and outcomes, the actions implemented within Goal 2 reflected positive progress toward the goal, with the majority of actions producing meaningful results for students.

Academic Achievement in ELA and Math (Actions 2.1, 2.2, 2.3 | Metrics 2.1, 2.2, 2.12, 2.13): These actions were effective in supporting student academic growth, with positive trends reflected in local assessment data across grade spans.

College and Career Readiness (Actions 2.4, 2.5, 2.6 | Metrics 2.8, 2.9, 2.10, 2.11): These actions were effective in expanding student access to college and career pathways, with CTE pathway completion and CCI combined rates showing improvement from Year 1 to Year 2.

Writing Instruction (Action 2.7 | Metric 2.15): Action 2.7 was effective, with writing scores showing improvement from Year 1 to Year 2. While the action was not fully implemented, the progress made is encouraging. To strengthen implementation in the coming year, administration will be participating in PLC training to improve data analysis practices, which is expected to better support the rollout of schoolwide writing efforts and accelerate continued growth.

Independent Study Support (Action 2.8 | Metric 2.12): Action 2.8 was effective in providing additional academic structure for independent study students, with positive growth trends reflected in local assessment data from Year 1 to Year 2.

Paraeducator Support (Actions 2.9, 2.10, 2.12 | Metrics 2.1, 2.2): These actions were effective in providing additional instructional support across classrooms, contributing to improved outcomes for low-income students and students with disabilities.

Academic Data Analysis (Action 2.11 | Metrics 2.1, 2.2): Action 2.11 was effective in building the school's capacity to analyze and utilize student performance data. A dedicated staff member was redirected to focus on assessment administration and data analysis, with findings regularly shared with administration to inform instructional planning and support more targeted intervention strategies.

Student-Led Conferences and Goal Setting (Action 2.13 | Metrics 2.1, 2.2): Action 2.13 was effective in building student agency and ownership of learning. Through the student-led conference process, students were supported in reviewing their own academic performance data to set meaningful goals in both academic and social-emotional areas. This process fostered a deeper sense of personal accountability and self-awareness, strengthening the connection between students, teachers, and families while supporting students in taking an active role in directing their own educational journey.

Project-Based Learning (Action 2.14 | Metric 2.16): Action 2.14 was ineffective. No documented PBL projects were completed within standards-based courses in either Year 1 or Year 2, and planned professional development to support teachers in PBL design and implementation was not completed due to staffing limitations. As a result, the school has determined it is necessary to remove this action

from the LCAP at this time, as the staffing stability and administrative capacity needed to support effective implementation could not be sustained.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Tutoring and Support (Action 2.1) will be modified to reflect the use of AI tools for personalized tutoring support, rather than specifying a particular platform, allowing for greater flexibility in tool selection. Additionally, HIT Tutoring will be added as a schoolwide tutoring program to provide targeted academic support for students in need.

Focus on Foundational Mathematics (Action 2.2) will be modified to reflect the designation of a staff member to serve in the role of math specialist, providing direct support to students in foundational mathematics instruction.

Career/College Counseling (Action 2.6) will be modified to reflect the transition from a dedicated Career and College Counselor position to a staff member who will assume the responsibilities of college and career advising, ensuring continued support for students in grades 7-12 in navigating college and career pathways.

Schoolwide Writing (Action 2.7) will be modified to replace references to professional development with trainings, allowing for greater flexibility in supporting staff implementation of schoolwide writing efforts.

Project-Based Learning (Action 2.14) will be eliminated from the LCAP due to staffing limitations and the school's need to focus energy and resources on other priority actions that reflect a greater need for improved academic outcomes.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Analyzing the metrics of priorities 3, 5, and 6, which address "engagement," led to the development of this goal. As a school of choice that emphasizes parent involvement, we have many positive metrics in areas such as parent input and involvement, connectedness, and safety. Some actions are focused on maintaining and increasing these positive statistics. However, there are areas of concern, including a high chronic absenteeism rate of 13.77% and reported rates of student stress.

Parent feedback indicates that 78% of students at both Doyle and Portola school sites feel connected to the school community. To increase this, the school will focus on relationship building, trainings, and school events where families are encouraged to attend. Mental health counseling, primarily directed at low-income pupils but provided schoolwide, is a key action in this plan.

Additionally, safety planning has been completed, and training will ensue. Efforts to support anti-bullying and classroom management are also prioritized actions within this goal. By addressing these concerns, we aim to create a more supportive and engaging school environment for all students.

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Based on a review of metrics and outcomes, the actions implemented within Goal 3 reflected positive progress toward the goal, with the majority of actions contributing to a safe, supportive, and inclusive school environment for students, staff, and families. One action was not fully implemented as adopted.

1. Parent/Family Outreach was not fully implemented, Action 3.7, due to the elimination of the Community School Coordinator position. In the absence of this role, administrative and clerical staff assumed responsibility for supporting families. As a result, this action will be removed from the LCAP for the upcoming school year.

Successes for this goal included a decrease in chronic absenteeism, demonstrating the positive impact of attendance monitoring and family outreach efforts. Additionally, students continued to receive social-emotional learning instruction and access to mental health supports, contributing to a safe and supportive school environment.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions and services associated with this goal were implemented effectively and contributed to positive outcomes in student attendance, school climate, and student well-being.

Attendance and Student Engagement (Actions 3.1, 3.2, and 3.7 | Metrics 3.1 and 3.2): Actions 3.1, 3.2, and 3.7 were effective in supporting student attendance and engagement. Attendance monitoring, family outreach, and intervention efforts contributed to a decrease in chronic absenteeism and increased communication between the school and families.

Social-Emotional Learning and Mental Health Supports (Actions 3.3 and 3.5 | Metrics 3.3 and 3.4): Actions 3.3 and 3.5 were effective in supporting students' social-emotional well-being. Students continued to receive social-emotional learning instruction and access to counseling and mental health supports, helping to promote a positive and supportive school environment.

School Safety and Behavioral Supports (Actions 3.4 and 3.6 | Metrics 3.3 and 3.4): Actions 3.4 and 3.6 were effective in promoting a safe school climate. Staff continued to implement behavioral supports, restorative practices, and anti-bullying efforts, contributing to a learning environment where students reported positive relationships with staff and a sense of safety at school. To further strengthen reporting and response efforts, the school made the decision to transition to the Say Something platform in place of the Stop-It platform, selecting a tool that better aligns with the needs and culture of our school community.

Family and Community Engagement (Action 3.7 | Metric 3.5): Action 3.7 was effective in strengthening family engagement and communication. The continued use of ParentSquare, family outreach activities, and opportunities for parent participation helped maintain communication between the school and families and supported increased family involvement in the educational process.

Family and Community Engagement (Action 3.7) will be eliminated due to the removal of the Community School Coordinator position. Responsibilities related to family communication and outreach will be incorporated into existing administrative and site staff roles to ensure continued engagement with families while aligning actions and expenditures with current staffing capacity.

- **Student Group(s):** Indicate the student group or groups who will be the primary beneficiary of the action by entering "All," or by entering a specific student group or groups.
- **Contributing to Increased or Improved Services?:** Type "Yes" if the action **is** included as contributing to meeting the increased or improved services requirement; OR, type "No" if the action is **not** included as contributing to meeting the increased or improved services requirement.
- If "Yes" is entered into the Contributing column, then complete the following columns:
 - **Scope:** The scope of an action may be LEA-wide (i.e., districtwide, countywide, or charterwide), schoolwide, or limited. An action that is LEA-wide in scope upgrades the entire educational program of the LEA. An action that is schoolwide in scope upgrades the entire educational program of a single school. An action that is limited in its scope is an action that serves only one or more unduplicated student groups.
 - **Unduplicated Student Group(s):** Regardless of scope, contributing actions serve one or more unduplicated student groups. Indicate one or more unduplicated student groups for whom services are being increased or improved as compared to what all students receive.

The LEA reviews the original estimated cost for the action and determines that had it hired additional staff to collect and analyze data and to coordinate supports for students that estimated actual cost would have been \$169,500 due to a cost of living adjustment. Contributing Actions Table

- **4. Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (LCFF Funds)**
 - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
 - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

Pursuant to EC Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **8. Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (%)**
 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**

- If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.

The amount of LCFF funds is calculated by subtracting the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (11) from the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (10) and then multiplying by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9). This amount is the amount of LCFF funds that is required to be carried over to the coming year.
