


# Shared Time & Early College Options at Hartland High School

# Livingston County Early College (LCEC)

- Linked with one of the Shared Time programs and leads to college credits, an associate's degree, industry credentials, or technical certificates in a certain pathway
  1. Begins in 11th grade with correlating Shared Time/CTE program
  2. Continues in 12th with college coursework
  3. Completed with a full schedule of college coursework in a 13th year
- Don't receive diploma until 13th year is complete, but can participate in senior year activities during 12th grade
